Many volunteers and BCS faculty and staff created a welcome environment for students and families on August 28 on a very humid afternoon for the annual Back to School Picnic.

Hot dogs, chips, macaroni salad and watermelon were consumed. Sno cones, cotton candy and popcorn were unlimited and free. Dan Borden, Board of Education member (pictured here) said, "it was great to see the happy faces of returning students and new students."

A new feature this year was a learning experience for students in grades 6-12 (with an adult from home) to try various tasks while wearing "drunk goggles." Second Grade



Second grade was a very exciting place to be in September! The students brought in over 17 Monarch caterpillars and we enjoyed watching them grow from teeny-tiny caterpillars to great, big, beautiful butterflies. Jackson even brought in a caterpillar egg! We loved watching them go through metamorphosis. All the 2nd graders got a chance to hold a butterfly and help release them. Since our first unit of study was Cycles in Nature, it was exciting to see first-hand, a butterfly's life cycle. The 2nd grade students and their families made their own life-cycle posters and had the opportunity to share them and compare egg-layer life cycles and mammal & live-birth life cycles. Some of our students were able to share their experiences of animal life-cycles of horses, cows, chickens, cats, dogs, and other animals that they have encountered. Second grade also visited Alfred State College farm for Kiddie Ag. Literacy Day and got a chance to visit with many animals, see how cows were milked by a robot, tour the milking parlor, learn about plant life cycles through a tour of the vegetable garden and the composting bins, and enjoyed tasty dairy snacks. What a month it has been!

Third Grade is off to a fantastic start this year. We spent the first week of school doing several STEM activities to get to know each other and practice our skills for working in a group.

Nurse's Corner

Happy new school year! I hope everyone is settling into this school year well.

I would like to remind parents to send me your child's physicals and immunizations charts if you have not already done so.

Keep children at home if they are not feeling well. The decision to do so is sometimes very clear. Your child looks awful, and you can't imagine sending them anywhere. But sometimes your child does not look sick, and the decision is less clear.

Here are symptoms that mean your child must stay home:

- 1. Fever. Any temperature of 100.4° Fahrenheit (38° Centigrade) is a fever, and children shouldn't go to school with fevers. Not only are fevers a sign of some sort of infection, it also usually means that they are shedding germs right and left. There's just no way you can know whether things will get better or worse and while giving them medicine might bring the fever down, it won't stop them from being contagious.
 - Your child should be fever-free for 24 hours before going back to school. What if your child has a temp of 99.9 or 100? Officially that's not a fever. I'd suggest going by how your child is acting; if they are acting sick, keeping them home and keeping an eye on them might be a good idea.
- 2. Vomiting or diarrhea. It's unfair all around to the child and the school— to send a child with vomiting or diarrhea no matter how well they might look to you. The same 24 hour rule applies, although it's worth checking with your doctor for advice. Some viruses, such as norovirus, can be contagious for an extra day or so.
- **3. Bad pain.** If your child has a sore knee or a mild headache but is otherwise acting okay, it's likely fine to give some medicine and send them off. But if the pain is anything more than mild, don't

do it. Pain is always something you want to keep an eye on. Keep them home and call your doctor instead.

4. Coughing that won't stop — or anything different about your child's breathing. If we kept every child with a cold home during the winter months, there would be a lot of empty classrooms. But a really bad cough not only makes it hard for a child to learn or play, it also warrants a call to the doctor, as does breathing that sounds or looks different from usual.

If you are not sure, please call your doctor for advice. You can always bring your child in a bit later if you get the go-ahead. When it comes to your child's health and the health of all the other children at school, it's better to be safe than sorry.


not take place and would impact the scholarship. Over 30 past winners and families were on hand to help make the tournament a great success. We look forward to the tournament next year on September 7, 2019.

After a thorough review of the Long-Range Facility Plan for Belfast Central School, the District is proposing a capital project that will require a renovation to the current building to increase additional academic programs, as well as address building security, and the overall organization of programs in the building. If approved, the proposed project will

- Create an auditorium with retractable seating (in current space)
- Create two new music rooms (in current multi-purpose (gymnatorium) space)
- Create a secure entrance for students and visitors
- Create central office/ meeting location
- Create a new nurse's office with privacy for students
- Upgrade/ remodel all restrooms in the building
- Repair/replace cracked flooring
- Add parking on South Street (by new entrance)
- Replace wall pads in the gym
- Repair brick on the front of the building
- Replace exterior windows
- Replace classroom doors
- Install handicapped accessible push buttons on main entrance doors
- Replace wall tile
- Upgrade Home and Careers room
- Move and/or replace greenhouse

Why does the District need to change the current multi-purpose space?

The original intent of the multi-purpose room was to create a space that would meet instructional and extracurricular needs of the District. As an auditorium, the space is used for concerts, musical productions, drama productions, and student and community assemblies. As a gymnasium, the space is used for physical education classes (if available), varsity volleyball, basketball practices, indoor recess, and advisement. The multi-purpose room is also a Red Cross safety center in the event of a natural disaster. However, as the space has been utilized over several years many challenges have arose from the space being a 'multi-purpose' space. Because the current room is utilized as an auditorium and a gymnasium, there are issues with seating, program equipment, sound, physical education classes, athletic events, and scheduling for

extracurricular activities.

Seating. Because the space is currently a multi-purpose space, the seating does not meet the needs of the school and community when there is an event such as concert, musical, or special program. There is no useable permanent seating for large group events. There are bleachers in the room that can be pulled out for small student assemblies (which do not need to focus on the stage), volleyball matches, or opening assemblies that do not involve the stage. However, when the stage is to be utilized, there is no permanent seating in the facility. There are bleachers and BCS currently utilizes approximately 350 chairs that must be moved around and set up before any large group gathering, which involves the utilization of the auditorium stage. The District maintenance staff works diligently to set up and take down the seating whenever there is an event. The process usually takes 2-4 hours to set up and take down all the chairs, and because the space is also used during the school day, the seats can not simply be set up and left in the multi-purpose room. (For example, from August 2017-January 2018, the full seating arrangement has been set up and taken down at least 11 times, requiring approximately 44 hours of manpower to set up and take down chairs.)

How does the District intend to solve the facility issues related to the multi-purpose room?

Belfast Central would like to convert the current multi-purpose room into a true auditorium, with two new music rooms in the back of the space.

Auditorium. The creation of a true auditorium would address the seating, sound, program equipment, and many of the scheduling issues that exist in the current multi-purpose room structure. BCS would like to renovate the current space to hold approximately 500 permanent seats in a true auditorium design. If a true auditorium is created:

- Everyone would be able to attend performances, assemblies, graduation, and other events and be able to see the stage.
- An auditorium would be able to increase the realistic capacity of people who are able to attend school events.
- Adjustments will be able to be made to the sound system in the auditorium for all students to be heard during musical and theatrical performances.
- Handicapped seating will be able to be installed in the room (there currently is no designated handicapped seating for events or programs).
- The amount of labor required to set up and tear down events will be drastically decreased.

- The music department would be able to keep risers and instruments in the auditorium, which will reduce the likelihood of instruments and equipment being destroyed when being transported round the building.
- The music department will be able to rehearse in the auditorium throughout the year and not just a day or two before a performance.
- Belfast will be able to host countywide music programs, which the District is unable to do without an auditorium. This opportunity would allow the students and school to showcase the music program.
- Belfast will continue to be a community safety center in the event of a natural disaster.

Additionally, the creation of new music rooms behind the auditorium will dramatically improve the organization of the music program and support the increased number of students who are participating in the vocal and instrumental music programs. By creating music rooms connected to the auditorium, Belfast Central will be able to have increased access to their performance area. The new rooms will also be located closer to other instructional space, which will help students maneuver back and forth for music classes and lessons more easily.

Why is it necessary to move and create new offices in the District?

Unfortunately, instances of school violence have forced schools across the nation to review safety procedures and general security of schools. Over the summer, the District moved offices to the South Street entrance to create a more secure entrance. The proposed project would create a secure vestibule, which will drastically improve security beyond moving the offices to a centralized location. Visitors will be buzzed into a secure area where they will need to present a photo ID and a stated reason for entering the building. This will allow District staff to know who is in the building at all times. Visitors will not be permitted to get through the second set of doors without a reason to enter the building.

Why does BCS need more parking?

With the main entrance in a new location, there will be a need for increased parking throughout the day on South Street. Additionally, during school events such as the Back to School Picnic, family literacy nights, concerts, musicals, and graduation there is not enough parking with our current spaces. The new parking spaces will also increase parking for athletic events and allow the District and Town to make South Street a no parking area.

The new parking spots will also increase parking for community access to the newly relocated fitness center, which will be open to the community sometime during the Fall of 2018.

General Maintenance

The remainder of the capital project focuses on much needed general building maintenance and facility upgrades. The majority of the restrooms in the building need to be remodeled. We have windows in the building that have cracks, do not seal properly, or do not keep out cold temperatures. The older doors in the building are not fire rated and are not safe for potential emergencies.

The current nurse's office does not provide for privacy when a student is sick, is participating in an athletic physical, or needing any medical attention. The proposed plan would create an exam room, an office for the nurse, a separate area for a sick student, and a waiting area.

The Home and Careers room is in need of additional electrical outlets, new cupboards, new seating areas, and new appliances.

The public hearing for the proposed capital project will be on October 10, 2018 at 6:00 in the new cafeteria. The vote for the project will be on October 23, 2018 from 12:00-8:00 by the new main entrance. 












From the desk of Mrs. Hess, PK-4 Principal

Back to school has brought about many exciting changes for our faculty, staff, students, and families. We are still working on demonstrating a growth mindset. I've read a story to your child's class titled "Bubble Gum Brain: Ready, Get Mindset...Grow!" This book is about two children; one with a bubble gum brain that grows and stretches, and one who has a brick brain with a fixed mindset. Throughout the story, the child with the bubble gum brain pushes himself to do things that are hard because he knows that mistakes help him grow. The other child does not push himself and talks very negatively about things that are hard for him. However, once his friend with the bubble gum brain shows him that he too has a bubble gum brain, he begins to try to tackle new challenges and grow from his mistakes. All it took was removing the wrapper, and his fixed mindset, from his own bubble gum brain. When your child struggles with a task or is unwilling to attempt a difficult problem, remind them that they can stretch their bubble gum brain just like the boys in the story!

We are also applying our growth mindset



to our behaviors with our PBIS initiative. We launched our PAWS work (Practice Safety, Act Responsibly, Work Towards Success, Show Respect) with an assembly on the first day of school. Students and teachers wore their PAWS shirts, were taught some new language (KAHFOOTY, PLANT, THINK), reviewed expectations for different areas of the school, and played a fun game of "Mrs. Hess says..." using the signals from our new voice levels poster. When students are caught having PAW-some behavior, they are rewarded with specific praise and a PAWS ticket for a chance

to earn a prize. On Fridays, one student from each elementary classroom will have the opportunity to spin the prize wheel and win a small prize. During our Family Literacy Night, we will draw for our big prizes that all students who have earned a PAWS ticket are eligible to win. I have also challenged all students to earn 1,000 PAWS tickets. When we reach 1,000 tickets, one student will be chosen to throw a pie in my face! Students have been earning tickets like crazy, so I don't think it will take long! Please feel free to reach out if you have questions about our growth mindset or PAWS work. Carry over at home will only make this more powerful!

Thank you to all our families for your attendance at and support of our Back to School Picnic. This is such a great opportunity for everyone to get together to kick off the school year. I always look forward to seeing our students as they return from summer vacation.

In keeping with our focus on a Growth Mindset, something we have been stressing with our staff and students for the past few years, I thought I would touch on Math. We have all heard (or maybe even said) "I can't do math, I'm just no good at it." Instead of using this type of statement, if we follow a Growth Mindset we would add "yet," and then see what we can or need to do to make it so that we can do "it."

Growth Mindset in Math

In general, a growth mindset is the belief that intelligence and 'smartness' can also be learned and that the brain grows from experience and effort. The opposite, a fixed mindset, is the idea that you are smart, or you are not. In math, that translates into "some



people are good at math, and some are not." Did you know that praising efforts rather than intelligence or results can impact your child's ability to persevere in challenges?! The goal is to have children thrive on challenges and see failures, not as a sign of low intelligence, but as a learning opportunity. Brain research tells us that making mistakes actually wires more connections into the brain! When a person has a growth mindset, they accept challenges, see their efforts as worthwhile, and are open to learning from mistakes. Students with a growth mindset achieve at higher levels than those with fixed mindsets. How can you help? Some simple ways:

- Adding "yet" when they claim they are "not good at this" (Respond: "You are not good at this yet.")
- Ask questions that focus on their effort and choices and get them to reflect on satisfaction of that effort (e.g. What did you learn today? What mistake did you make that taught you something? What did you try hard at today?)
- Model this yourself as you share about your day
