Assessments

Why do we assess students?

• Assessments are a tool to determine if students have learned information that has been presented. Assessments also help teachers and administrators determine if we are providing students with the correct information they need to be successful readers, writers, and mathematicians.

Are all students expected to master the same information?

No. Our job is to help students learn at their own rate and help them be successful.
 Every child is different and will master skills at their own pace. Our job is to help them learn from their mistakes and grow as learners.

NYS 3-8 Assessments

- The NYS ELA and math assessments in grades 3-8 fill a federal education requirement. The NYS Department of Education has made changes to the 3-8 assessments over the last three years to help ease stress, for students and teachers, which was associated with the tests in the past.
 - O During the 2015-16 school year, the time limits were removed from the assessments and students are now able to have as much time as they need to complete the assessment.
 - O During the 2016-17 school year, the number of assessment questions was reduced for both the ELA and math assessments.
 - o For this year's assessments, the number of days used for assessment administration was reduced from three to two days, which reduces testing time and missed instructional time. The Commissioner of Education has listened to feedback from parents and teachers to make the assessments a much more reasonable task.
- The NYS assessments are one measure to see what skills a student has learned. The assessments do not determine if a student advances to the next grade level.

Regents Exams

- Regents exams are the only state assessments which have an impact on grade placement and ultimately graduation.
- Students must pass Regents exams to earn a diploma in New York State. These are the only high stakes assessments required of our students.

As we move into the second half of the year, it is important to remember that our students follow our lead regarding NYS assessments. If we encourage them to do their best and not stress over the assessments, our children will follow our lead. If you have questions about assessments, please do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher, principal, or me.

IMPORTANT Attendance Reminder

Please remind your child that they are required to be IN first period class at 8:05 a.m.

Note that excused and unexcused Absent, Tardy, and Early Dismissal dates are documented. At the end of each quarter a letter will be sent home with report cards to inform parents of attendance dates. Excuses are required in order to change "A"=(Absent) to "E"= (Absent Excused), and "T"= (Tardy) to "L"=(Tardy Excused). Excuses should be sent in within 24 hours of returning to school. A list of excused absences is in the student handbook.

When a parent request is made for a student to be excused early for a Doctor/Dentist/Ortho/Counseling/Professional visit, a note from the professional's office should be turned in to the school within 24 hours of returning to school. You may also request doctor's notes be faxed to 585-365-2648. You do not have to take your child to a doctor to have an illness excused. A note stating that your child is ill, briefly tell why (symptoms), with a signature and dates of absence is still an acceptable excuse.

Sources of Strength

Twenty seven students, administrators, school board members, faculty and support staff were trained on Monday, December 4 at BCS for year two of Sources of Strength. The University of Rochester continues to track data and developments for this evidence based suicide prevention program. Senator Cathy Young gifted the program to BCS in 2016. Locally, Salamanca High School is also funded for the program. Peer leaders and adult advisors meet on a regular basis and develop interactive activities that focus on hope, health and strength.





Peer leader, Mack Cox, was impressed by the emphasis on fun at the training. Sources of Strength veteran, Julia Lindo, felt that identifying trusted adults and developing strengths is the best way to counterbalance the drama often prevalent in a high school setting. Emily Nelson, a new school counselor at BCS who is funded by a grant from the New York State Education Dept. through Literacy West NY, Inc./CORE, likes the proactive approach using the strength wheel. Emily is enthusiastic about working with BCS students and feels warmly received by the BCS community.

New Friends in Pre-School

One of Mrs. Ross's favorite stories to share with Preschoolers is <u>The Little Red Hen.</u>

Mrs. Ross reads multiple versions of the story and the children talk about how the stories are the same and how they are different.

In each story, the Little Red Hen asks her animal friends "Who will help me?", but they say "Not I". After each refusal, she says "Then I will" or "Then I'll do it myself." AND SHE DID! (Mrs. Ross's favorite 3 words!)

In the end, she bakes something delicious like bread or cake, and then the animals want to help eat it. In some stories she shares, in others she does not. We discuss who would share with their friends even if they hadn't helped.

At the end of our story unit, we bring in a REAL HEN to compare her to the hen in our story. Does a real hen plant and cut wheat? Does a real hen bake? Board member Patty Krotz brought in her little red hen named Fancy Pants to share with our preschoolers.



Tune Into These Stations for School Closings and Delays

The decision to close school or delay the opening of school is generally reached by 6:15 a.m. and is then passed on to various television and radio stations by about 6:45 a.m. Please tune to the television and radio stations listed below. We will also be using a mass communication system. Should the school close, you will also be notified via phone, or text, or email. If you do not receive the closing information through one of these methods, please update your information with the school.

The decision to close the school may be made due to unfavorable road conditions, extreme cold and wind chill, or other variables associated with the weather and/or wintery conditions. Occasionally, when only part of the school district is experiencing poor driving conditions, only those parts will be closed to bus travel. In some instances, the bus may travel to a pick-up point that requires children to cross the road to catch the bus. If parents refuse to allow children to ride the bus for this or any reason, their decision will be respected, and in these cases, we ask that parents make arrangements to transport students to school if/when conditions improve.


