From the Desk of Mr. Roche

As most families are aware, students in grades 3-8 will be taking ELA and Math tests this spring. Here are some strategies that you can use at home to help your son/daughter.

If you have concerns about the test or testing situation, talk with your child's teacher.

Discuss your concerns with the teacher and/ or school administrator. If you believe that your child's difficulty with standardized tests may be the symptom of a problem such as a language or learning difficulty, speak with your child's teacher to learn if your child qualifies for any assessment accommodations.

On Test Day

- Make sure your child gets a good night's sleep and eats a healthy breakfast
- Many teachers report that students who don't

do well on tests haven't gotten enough sleep, and haven't eaten breakfast on the morning of the test. Doing both of these things will ensure that your child is working at full capacity (Narang, 2008).

<u>Remain Positive</u>

Staying calm will help your child stay calm. If she gets nervous about the test or is likely to experience anxiety during the test, help her practice some relaxation techniques that she can try once she's taking the test (Narang, 2008).

<u>After the Test</u>

What about the results? Assessments vary from test to test, but the test scores should include information that helps you interpret the results. Talk with your child's teacher if you have any questions about the test results. You may also suggest that the school offer a testing information session to parents (Narang, 2008).

On a Daily Basis

In addition to these strategies, there are a number of ways that you can maximize your child's learning capabilities throughout the school year, which can lead to confident test-taking. Some of these strategies include:

- Assisting your child with homework and ensuring that your child is completing all homework assignments
- Helping him/her to develop good study habits, thinking skills, and a positive attitude towards education from an early age
- Ensuring that your child has good attendance at school
- Staying in communication with your child's teacher
- Encouraging your child to read as much as possible, and to increase her vocabulary even reading magazines, newspapers, and comic books regularly will help improve her reading skills
- Looking for educational games and programs that engage your child
- Helping your child learn how to follow directions carefully (Dietel, 2008; IRA (2002); Narang, 2008).

Finally, remember that standardized tests and grading systems are not perfect; each format has its own limitations. As you help your child do his/ her best on the tests he/she takes and in all of his/ her schoolwork, also remind him/her that testing is just one part of his/her education. With your support and involvement, he/she will be well on his/her way to his/her own bright future.

From the Desk of Mrs. Hess

Does your child have GRIT???

Michael Jordan once said "I've missed more than nine thousand shots in my career. I've lost more than three hundred games. Twenty-six times I've been trusted to take the game-winning shot, and missed. I've failed over and over and over again in my life, and that is why I succeed." Michael Jordan has grit. He faced challenge after challenge throughout his career, yet he never gave up. Celebrities like Michael Jordan, along with others such as Bill Gates, the Wright brothers, Walt Disney, and Oprah Winfrey did not stumble upon success or have a mythical natural ability that they were born with. All of these success stories were able to achieve their goals with grit and perseverance while having a growth mindset.

Carol Dweck, a leading researcher in growth mindset, says there are two types of goals – performance goals and learning goals. Performance goals are designed to make a person look smart or capable - getting an A on a test, scoring three goals in a soccer game. Learning goals help a student learn, regardless of performance - learn how to speak Spanish, learn how to apply the scientific process in an experiment.

Working with your child to set goals will help them decide what is important to them, what tools or supports will be necessary to achieve their goal, and how the goal will apply to real life situations. With a well-defined goal, students will begin towards a path of accomplishment. While working towards their goal, encourage them to show qualities of determination and grit. They also need to be willing to face a challenge and persevere through the challenge. Dedicated, deliberate practice to learning challenges can result in improvement. Next time your child struggles with an assignment or "fails" at a task, use it as an opportunity to talk to your child's grit. Do they have what it takes to set a learning goal and work hard to achieve it?

Nurse's Corner

Greetings from the School Nurse. My name is Amy Giboo, RN. I started here at Belfast on October 23, 2017, and I would like to introduce myself. I have been a nurse for a total of 17 years. I have worked in a hospital, nursing home, and pediatric office. I am married and have three children. I live in the Franklinville area. And I have 2 cute cocker spaniels!

I have been enjoying meeting all of your children over the last few months. They are all great! Whether it was sickness, injury, or just a quick stop in that brought them in, they are very welcoming!

As we all know flu season has been in full swing! So just a reminder to parents and guardians that if your child is ill, and has a fever, or vomiting please keep them home 24 hours after the last episode, so we don't spread our germs to anyone else, especially any child that is immunocompromised. Thank you for your help!

I want to inform parents and guardians of two new state requirements for next year. The first new change are physicals for grade levels. It is now state mandated that children entering Pre-K or Kindergarten, 1,3,5,7,9, and 11th grades are to have is physicals. Most doctors require yearly physicals anyway, so it should not be too much of a hassle. Our school physician comes in to do physicals here at the school twice a year. The second change is that New York State requires physicals on an approved health form, which your physician should have. If not, when they become available to me, I will have some to disperse! Any questions, concerns, or comments please do not hesitate to contact me!

When to Keep a Child Home with Illness

It can be hard to know when to send children to school if they tell you that they do not feel well. Usually, the best place for them is in school, but there are some times when keeping them home to rest or call for an appointment with your health care provider is recommended.

Please keep your child home and/or contact your child's doctor for:

- Fever greater than 100.4° (taken by mouth)
- Vomiting and/or diarrhea within the last 24 hours

100 Day Celebrations



- Severe sore throat along with fever and feeling ill for more than 48 hours, or after exposure to Strep throat infection
- Honey-crusted sores around the nose or mouth or rash on other body parts
- Large amounts of mucous (liquid) from their nose, with face pain or headache
- Severe ear pain or fluid coming from the ear
- Severe headache, especially with fever

If your child has a fever, it is not a good idea to give them medicine like Tylenol or Advil and send them to school because as soon as the medicine wears off, the fever may return and you will be called to come and pick up your child.

Please keep children home for 24 hours after the fever ends or they have completed 24 hours of medication if prescribed by your health care provider.

If you find your child is frequently asking to stay home from school, if they are falling behind or appear anxious about school, or if there does not appear to be any physical symptoms, contact your school nurse and your health care provider to discuss your concerns.

Remind children to throw away used tissues, cover their mouths when they cough or sneeze, keep their hands away from their face, and to wash hands often with soap and warm water. This will help keep everyone healthier.

Tune Into These Stations for School Closings and Delays

The decision to close school or delay the opening of school is generally reached by 6:15 a.m. and is then passed on to various television and radio stations by about 6:45 a.m. Please tune to the television and radio stations listed below. We will also be using a mass communication system. Should the school close, you will also be notified via phone, or text, or email. If you do not receive the closing information through one of these methods, please update your information with the school.

The decision to close the school may be made due to unfavorable road conditions, extreme cold and wind chill, or other variables associated with the weather and/or wintery conditions. Occasionally, when only part of the school district is experiencing poor driving conditions, only those parts will be closed to bus travel. In some instances, the bus may travel to a pick-up point that requires children to cross the road to catch the bus. If parents refuse to allow children to ride the bus for this or any reason, their decision will be respected, and in these cases, we ask that parents make arrangements to transport students to school if/when conditions improve.


