INFORMATION FOR STUDENTS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS



WHAT IS THE HELP PROGRAM?

The H.E.L.P. program supports students experiencing homelessness through the funding of the McKinney-Vento Act. We collaborate with campus and district personnel to assist with identifying, enrolling and providing wraparound services to these students.

HOMELESSNESS

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act defines homelessness as any individuals who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence.

This can happen for a variety of reasons including, but not limited to:

» Economic Challenges

Loss of job, poverty, affordable housing availability

» Health challenges

Mental health, physical health, substance abuse

» Trauma

Natural disasters, abuse, domestic violence

POSSIBLE LIVING SITUATIONS



Doubled-Up

Living with friends or relatives



Unsheltered

Living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, or substandard housing



Shelters

Living in emergency or transitional housing



Hotel / Motel

Includes trailer parks, campgrounds, or similar settings

UNACCOMPANIED YOUTH

The student's living arrangement meets the McKinney-Vento Act definition of homelessness.

AND: The student is not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian.

This may look like students who:





Are couch surfing

Have run away

Have been kicked out of their home

HOW TO HELP (TEACHERS & CAMPUS STAFF)

Help us identify students experiencing homelessness. Notify student support services personnel if you believe a student may be experiencing homelessness and you do not see that they are currently identified in Focus.

SIGNS

» Poor health

» Withdrawn

» Vague statements

such as:

- » Inconsistent attendance
- "We've moved a lot"
- "I don't remember my » Behavior inconsistent last school"
 - "We're staying at my uncle's for now"
- with peers their age
- » Lack of stability
- » Monitor student progress and provide interventions when necessary.
- » Communicate with student support services personnel if you notice sudden declines in academic performance or changes in attendance.

PARENT/STUDENT RIGHTS

- » Immediate enrollment even if lacking normally required documents
- » Enrollment in the local school; or continued attendance at their school of origin (the school where they were enrolled before becoming homeless and moving out of the zone) if this is requested by the parent/quardian and is feasible
- » Free breakfast and lunch
- » Transportation to and from their school of origin, if requested by the parent/quardian and if feasible
