

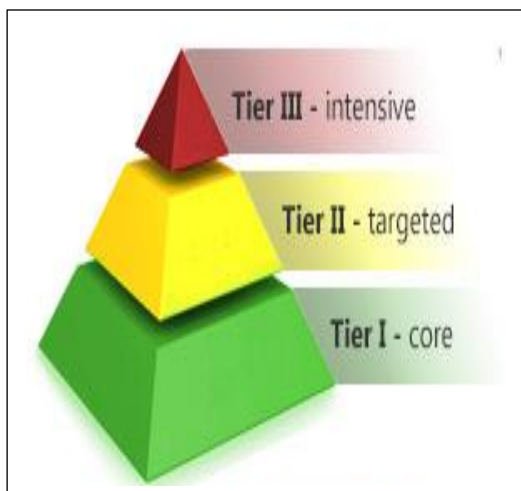
Discipline Matrix

Westminster Public Schools developed a level system to help identify and provide appropriate interventions to address student misconduct. While every attempt will be made to maximize the time that students are engaged in the learning process, schools should select interventions that support students and maintain an orderly and safe learning environment. Discipline of students with disabilities: Schools should review and be familiar with the [WPS Discipline of Students w/ Disabilities](#) and [BOE Policy JK-2](#) before undertaking discipline of students with disabilities (IEP or 504 plans). Discipline of students PK-2: Schools should make every attempt to remediate any disciplinary issues with PK-2 students in an age-appropriate and restorative manner. Suspension, while an option, should be used as a last resort and only in extreme situations. All disciplinary responses for PK-2 students should be handled at either Level 1 or 2. Any Level 3 responses must be directed to the Director of Elementary Education prior to consequences being given to students.

Note: The information below is intended to be a guide for staff members to teach and correct behavior. Lesser consequences are always permitted. Repeated acts of misconduct, more serious misconduct and/or extenuating circumstances may warrant a higher-level response. **Building Principals have the ultimate authority and discretion to determine the particular level of an offence/incident.**



Level 5 discipline infractions require a recommendation for expulsion. The school will consult with Student Services and seek a 10-day suspension. Student Services will seek to provide alternative educational services.

Level 4 violations will generally result in interventions or disciplinary responses that involve the school administration, the supervising Director and/or Director of Student Services. These actions aim to correct behavior by stressing the seriousness of the behavior and may result in removal from the school environment, education opportunities (suspension/expulsion) around the behavior.

Level 3 violations will generally result in interventions or disciplinary responses that involve the school administration. These actions aim to correct behavior by stressing the seriousness of the behavior and may result in removal (half-day up to five days) from the school environment as well as education opportunities around the behavior.

Level 2 violations will generally result in interventions or disciplinary responses that involve the school administration. These actions aim to correct behavior by stressing the seriousness of the behavior while keeping the student in school

Level 1 violations will generally be addressed by the staff member supervising the student when the violation occurs. The staff member's response should teach the correct, alternative behavior so that the student can learn from his or her mistake and demonstrate safe and respectful behaviors in the future. Staff members are expected to use a variety of teaching and management strategies.

<u>Bullying/Harassment</u> “Bullying” means any written or verbal expression, or physical or electronic act or gesture, or a pattern thereof, that is intended to coerce, intimidate, or cause any physical, mental, or emotional harm to any student. Harassing conduct may take many forms, including verbal acts and name-calling, as well as non-verbal behavior, such as graphic and written statements, or conduct that is physically threatening, harmful or humiliating. <u>Threats of Physical Attack** (w/ or w/o a Weapon)</u> Includes displaying, brandishing, or discharging a weapon, but with no actual physical contact of any person. A threat is made in person. <u>Allegations of harassment or bullying on the basis of sex**</u> An allegation is a claim or assertion that someone has done something wrong or illegal, typically made without proof. Harassment or bullying on the basis of sex includes sexual harassment or bullying and gender-based harassment or bullying. Sexual harassment or bullying is unwelcome conduct of a sexual nature, such as unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal, nonverbal, or physical conduct of a sexual nature. Gender-based harassment or bullying is nonsexual intimidation or abusive behavior toward a student based on the student’s actual or perceived sex, including harassment based on gender identity, gender expression, and nonconformity with gender stereotypes. Harassing conduct may take many forms, including verbal acts and name-calling, as well as non-verbal behavior, such as graphic and written statements, or conduct that is physically threatening, harmful or humiliating. The conduct can be carried out by school employees, other students, and non-employee third parties. Both male and female students can be victims of harassment or bullying on the basis of sex, and the harasser or bully and the victim can be of the same sex. <u>Allegations of harassment or bullying on the basis of race, color or national origin**</u> An allegation is a claim or assertion that someone has done something wrong or illegal, typically made without proof. Harassment or bullying on the basis of race, color, or national origin refers to intimidation or abusive behavior toward a student based on actual or perceived race, color or national origin. Harassing conduct may take many forms, including verbal acts and name-calling, as well as non-verbal behavior, such as graphic and written statements, or conduct that is physically threatening, harmful or humiliating. The conduct can be carried out by school employees, other students, and non-employee third parties. Bullying on the basis of race, color, or national origin constitutes racial harassment. Harassing conduct may take many forms, including verbal acts and name-calling, as well as non-verbal behavior, such as graphic and written statements, or conduct that is physically threatening, harmful or humiliating. The conduct can be carried out by school employees, other students, and non-employee third parties. Bullying on the basis of disability constitutes disability harassment. <u>Sexual Violence/Battery (other than Rape)</u> Acts of sexual violence on school grounds, in a school vehicle, or at a school activity or sanctioned event. Incidents of sexual violence/battery (other than rape) - An incident that includes threatened rape, fondling, indecent liberties, child molestation, or sodomy. Both male and female students can be victims of sexual battery.
