Danielle Blalock is humbled to be receiving this award from the East Brunswick Education Foundation. East Brunswick has been home to Danielle and her family since she was in First Grade at Bowne Munro School. With her husband Jack, teacher at East Brunswick High School, they are raising their two children, Mallory, 16, Patrick, 14, along with their foster daughter Allie, 10.

She has worked as the Supervisor of Student Services; Health and Wellness, for the past 11 years. Prior to that she served as a School Counselor at Hammarskjold Middle School and prior to that a Special Education teacher in Colts Neck. She is also an adjunct professor at Kean University in the Graduate School of Counseling.

As the Supervisor of Student Services, she oversees the district's Crisis Counselors (Student Assistance Specialists) and School Nurses. Her and her team work closely with children and families experiencing a variety of hardships. She serves as the District's Homeless Liaison, helping to support families struggling with housing and food insecurities. She also serves as the liaison to DCPP.

Danielle has a Bachelor's degree from Seton Hall University in Special Education, a Master's degree from Monmouth University in School Counseling, and her Administrative Certificate from NJEXCEL. She has served on many committees such as the East Brunswick Board of Education's Student Services Committee as well as the Safety Committee.

In addition, she serves on the East Brunswick Municipal Alliance for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse. She has been an active member of the community since she started working for Recreation Camp at 14 years old, and eventually went on to become a supervisor there while teaching. In addition, she spent many years working at Crystal Springs (where she met her husband) and became a manager there. One of her favorite jobs of all time was at Camp Daisy where she worked in High School and college as a counselor and eventually a supervisor.

Danielle is especially thankful to the East Brunswick Education Foundation for their generosity. The grants that the foundation provides, benefit students in so many ways and help to make their school experience even more enjoyable!



Marilyn Edge



Marilyn Edge has been a passionate and dedicated educator at East Brunswick High School for over 20 years. An engaging biological sciences teacher, she also advised the EBHS Academic Team for 5 years, served as liaison to the EBEF's Student Association, and is currently the Assistant Director for the High School's drama productions. In 2021, Marilyn was recognized by Monmouth University - William Roberts Charitable Foundation with an Outstanding Teaching Award. This award is especially meaningful as winners are nominated by their former students, who, as they get ready to graduate with a Bachelor's degree, reflect on the secondary school teachers who made the greatest impact on where they are as students.

In addition to her student advising roles, Marilyn has volunteered countless hours as a union representative for the local, state and national

education associations. She currently represents East Brunswick High School for the East Brunswick Education Association (EBEA) as a member of the Middlesex County Education Association's (MCEA) Representative Council. She previously served as an Executive Committee member and as the Government Relations Chair for the MCEA. Marilyn was also on the Board of Directors for the National Education Association and was a member of the New Jersey Education Association Delegate Assembly.

Marilyn is also an active volunteer with the EBEF and is often found behind the scenes helping at events, including the EB Dance Off! She was also the recipient of a few EBEF grants and is always encouraging and assisting her colleagues to apply.

Marilyn earned her Bachelor of Science in Biology with an emphasis in secondary education, her Bachelor of Elective Studies in Science, and a minor in theater from Saint Cloud University. She started her teaching career in 1994 at Roosevelt High School in Minneapolis, MN. After arriving in New Jersey in 1996, Marilyn worked with the New Jersey State Museum's Education and Planetarium Education departments, where she focused on programming for homeless and home-schooled children to help meet educational standards.

Before joining the East Brunswick community in 2001, Marilyn participated in revolutionary war reenactments and programs for Washington Crossing Park as part of an artillery crew, and she taught at the Samuel Dewitt Proctor Academy in Trenton.

In her "spare time," Marilyn has also been a Renaissance Fair actor, a horse and carriage driver, and a Sierra Club hike leader. Some fun facts about Marilyn are that she has appeared in a few plays and has lived in ten states.

Dr. Arvin Gopal is the orchestra director at East Brunswick High School, where he has overseen the program for the past 10 years. Under his direction, EBHS groups have performed around the northeastern United States, and have consistently received superior ratings at festivals and competitions. Students in the East Brunswick orchestra program regularly fill the honors orchestras at the region, state, all eastern and national level.

EBHS Orchestras are a mainstay at East Brunswick Education Foundation events. The chamber orchestra participates in the annual Barnes & Noble fundraiser at the Brunswick Square mall, and regularly performs at the Partner in Excellence Dinner. Grants received from the EBEF have diversified instruction and the use of technology in the orchestra classroom, as well as aided in programming, production and

guest artist costs for EBHS Orchestra family concerts. Each of these grants have directly benefited students and the greater East Brunswick community, and the EBHS Orchestra program is eternally grateful for the support received by the East Brunswick Education Foundation.

In addition to Dr. Gopal's responsibilities at EBHS, he is dedicated to furthering the quality of string education in New Jersey. He maintains professional affiliations with the National Association for Music Education (NAfME) and the American String Teachers Association of New Jersey (ASTA). He has served as president of the New Jersey chapter of ASTA and is currently the high school orchestra division chair for the Central Jersey Music Educators Association (CJMEA). Prior to his career as a high school educator, Dr. Gopal performed as a soloist, chamber musician and orchestral violist throughout Europe, Asia and the Americas. For two years, he served as assistant principal viola of the Minas Gerais Philharmonic Orchestra in Belo Horizonte, Brazil. Dr. Gopal holds a BA in Violin Performance from Penn State University, and MM and DMA degrees in viola performance from the University of Maryland at College Park.

Lindsay B. Schiappa is a local attorney in private practice specializing in residential and commercial real estate transactions for the past 25 years where her motto remains "legal counsel you can trust." She is extremely humbled to receive this most prestigious honor from the East Brunswick Education Foundation for which she served as the Vice President for the past decade, dedicating her time and effort to such events like the Fall Fashion Show, EB Celebrity Dance Off, Barnes and Noble Day and most recently, Casino Night. She remains an active and dedicated Trustee of the EBEF today. She is also a proud member of the East Brunswick Regional Chamber of Commerce where she continues to cultivate community connections.

Prior to her involvement with the EBEF, she volunteered her time with the Warnsdorfer PTA holding every board position including serving as President for 4 years. She simultaneously held the position of President of the PTA Presidents Council for 6 years where she guided and mentored other PTA Presidents. During this busy time, she also served on the

school district's calendar and safety committees, as well as interviewed candidates for the Board of Education.

Lindsay is a life-long resident of East Brunswick and graduate of East Brunswick High School Class of 1986 where she cultivated her passion for volunteerism participating in student government and establishing the first ever chapter of Students Against Destructive Decisions (SADD). To this day, students and parents at EBHS still sign the Contract of Life, an agreement wherein teens will never accept a ride from a driver who has been drinking alcohol or using drugs and instead reach out to their parents who agree to provide a safe ride home with no questions asked. In addition to being active in student government, she also played tennis for and captained the girl's tennis team winning the GMACs her junior and senior years.

She attended Boston University as an undergraduate and earned a JD from Seton Hall School of Law. She was the last walk-on to the BU Women's Tennis team playing singles and doubles and serving as captain of the team her junior year. While in law school, she dedicated long hours to the Disability Law Clinic preparing SSI and SSDI applications on behalf of indigent clients. After law school, she clerked for the Honorable Robert A. Longhi, P.J.S.C. as well as the Honorable C. Judson Hamlin, J.S.C. at the Middlesex County Courthouse. Thereafter, she worked for Convery, Convery & Shihar, a MIDJIF defense firm. She was also entrusted with attending hearings on behalf of the Middlesex County Board of Social Services to assist hearing officers with resolving child support and visitation issues. Judge Hamlin fostered her sense of caring and compassion by regularly appointing her a Special Medical Guardian for incapacitated persons with no family members available to assist doctors and other medical staff in vital medical decisions.

While in law school Lindsay met her husband, Jack Dobrzynski, also a graduate of EBHS and they married in 1994. Jack works tirelessly for his family business, Eighteen Lumber, Inc., a past PIE honoree. They chose to raise their two children, Jake (23) and Alexandra (20), in East Brunswick knowing the excellent quality of the school system firsthand and the profound sense of community in town. Both children have flourished due to the strong education they received at EBHS. Jake graduated in 2022 from the University of Vermont with a Parks, Recreation and Tourism degree and is currently working for the City of Bozeman as a Parks Lead Worker. Alex is a junior at Penn State University majoring in Nutritional Science with a concentration in Dietetics; she plans on obtaining a masters in clinical nutrition and then her RDN credential.

Brian Selznick is the author and illustrator of many books for children, including The Invention of Hugo Cabret, winner of the Caldecott medal and the basis for the Oscarwinning movie Hugo, directed by Martin Scorsese. For Todd Hayne's film adaptation of his book Wonderstruck, Brian wrote the screenplay. Brian also wrote the story for a new version of The Nutcracker at the Joffrey Ballet in Chicago, choreographed by Tony Award winning choreographer Christopher Wheeldon, and his newest book, Big Tree, inspired by an idea from Steven Spielberg,

was named one of the best books of 2023 by the New York Times. Meryl Streep narrated the Grammy nominated audiobook. Brian and his husband Dr. David Serlin divide their time between San Diego, California and Brooklyn, New York.

Michael Barkann



Michael Barkann has become an indelible part of Philadelphia's sports landscape, and one of the market's best-known and most-respected sports media figures, during a 26-year tenure as a host and anchor for NBC Sports Philadelphia and over three decades overall covering the city's teams, athletes and events.

An original member of NBC Sports Philadelphia, Barkann has held a variety of prominent on-air roles including bringing the network on the air at its inception in 1997 as Comcast SportsNet. He currently serves as the host of the network's Philadelphia Eagles and Philadelphia Phillies pregame and postgame coverage.

Previously, Barkann led NBC Sports Philadelphia's daily sports talk and entertainment program, "Philly Sports Talk," previously entitled "Daily News Live," for more than 20 years. He's also been the lead anchor for the network's Flyers and 76ers game day programs, specials and original programming.

In addition to his work with NBC Sports Philadelphia, Barkann has been a high-profile contributor to other media outlets, including radio. For more than five years, he co-hosted a radio program on SportsRadio 94.1 WIP with former Eagles player Ike Reese, entitled the "Mike & Ike Show."

Barkann has covered several national and international sporting events for USA Networks and CBS Sports, including three Olympic Winter Games (1998, 1994 and 1992), two NCAA Final Fours (1996 and 1995) and the U.S. Open Tennis Championships for nearly two decades, beginning in 1991.

Barkann joined NBC Sports Philadelphia after five years as sports director for Boston's WLVI-TV. Prior to that position, he was a sports anchor and reporter for Philadelphia's KYW-TV (CBS) for five years and for New Jersey Network in Trenton for more than four years. Barkann began his career with NBC News in Washington, D.C.

Barkann has collected numerous professional honors throughout his career, including six Mid-Atlantic Emmy Awards, and has been named the Pennsylvania Sportscaster of the Year seven times.

Barkann is involved in numerous charities throughout the Philadelphia area including the ALS Association of Greater Philadelphia; Legacy Youth Tennis and Education. In 2013, he and his wife Ellen founded the Barkann Family Healing Hearts Foundation. The charity provides grants to local organizations and families throughout the Delaware Valley who are overcome by the financial burdens caused by family crisis, long term illness, or sudden loss of life.

In 2010, Michael was inducted into the Philadelphia Jewish Sports Hall of Fame and was honored by the Greater Philadelphia Chapter of the ALS Association for his work with the organization.

A native of East Brunswick, N.J., Barkann is a graduate of the S.I. Newhouse School of Public Communications, Syracuse University. He lives in Newtown Square, PA with his wife, Ellen. The Barkanns have two children, Emily, 27 and Matthew, 23.

The East Brunswick Education Foundation (EBEF) is an independent, non-profit corporation created in 1993 by parents, citizens and members of the local business community to support programs designed to enhance and enrich the curriculum in the East Brunswick Public Schools.

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Student Association

In collaboration with the administration at East Brunswick High School, the EBEF launched the EBEF Student Association, to mirror the Foundation's philanthropic activities in school. The Student Association is run by a group of students who are "hired" to run the organization after a series of interviews with EBEF members and Faculty Liaisons. The organization is run by students, with the support and guidance of Liaison Marilyn Edge. Recently the EBEF Student Association has expanded to Churchill Junior High School with the support and guidance of Liaison Alexia DeLuca.

The charter of the group is similar to the EBEF - they raise money to fund grants for clubs and activities at EBHS and CJHS. When the EBEF launched the Student Association, Dr. Vinella established the policy that only student leaders of a club, not the faculty advisors, can write the grants to the Allocations Committee for approval. Since inception, the EBEF Student Association has awarded \$42,000 in grants.

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




Alumni Hall of Fame

2024 Grant Recipients

WE THE PEOPLE GRANT

With this grant, the Foundation matches amounts donated by outside donors in support of East Brunswick High School students' participation in the National We the People: The Citizen and the Constitution Competition. Among these supporters are East Brunswick High School alumni, parents, teachers, local businesses, and community organizations.

East Brunswick High School - We the People National Competition Marc Mondry

On January 24, 2024, seniors enrolled in the AP United States Government and Politics course competed in the *New Jersey We the People Competition* where they earned the right to be named State Champions, thus the opportunity to represent New Jersey at the national competition in Washington DC April 13-15, 2024. This is the 36th out of a possible 37 times that the EBHS students have won this honor. Grant funds will match those funds donated by supporters to defray the cost of their trip to DC.

FIRST LADY OF THE FOUNDATION GRANTS

These grants, awarded during the fall of each year for amounts that are more than a mini grant, recognize Amy Fisher, a co-founder and past honoree of the Foundation. Amy was instrumental in the Foundation's successful growth.

Bowne - Munro Elementary School - Choose Love

Nancy Kaboski, Karyn Grant, Michelle Marrone, Jennifer Oranchak, and Wendy Tepper

Bowne's Climate Committee collaborated to identify resources meant to enhance the social and emotional learning (SEL) curriculum. In doing so they discovered the *Jesse Lewis Choose Love Movement*, whose mission is to create safer and more caring communities. Components of this program will be purchased with grant funds, including posters, bracelets and pencils, as well as postcards and stamps that will provide the means for developing a home-school connection.

Churchill Junior High School - Climate Change Composition Susan Meuse, Mary O'Mara, and Sarah Franchino

The New Jersey Student Learning Standards for Visual and Performing Arts require that teachers provide a process for students to analyze and contrast how art forms are used to reflect global issues, including climate change. With grant funds the orchestra instructors will commission a local professional musician to create an original piece with a theme focusing on climate change. One of the most beloved core texts of the AP Literature curriculum is the play, Doubt, by John Patrick Shanley. It raises questions, fosters debate, and hurls students into moral quandaries. Each building will provide one hundred \$50 grants to students whose kindness projects are accepted for participation in the program.

The goal of this grant is to match the funds donated and raised by the EBHS Chorus and Orchestra Program for the upcoming *Festival Disney* competition in Orlando, Florida in March 2024. MINI-GRANTS

Awarded monthly: Up to \$500 awarded for a classroom. At the elementary level – up to \$2,100 awarded for a grade level. At the secondary level - up to \$2,500 awarded for programs that include all students in a grade level or a department.

Warnsdorfer Elementary School

Dr. Renee Soccodato-Dutka

This grant will provide funding for the purchase of rhythm instruments that will be made into "toolkits" to be used by students in the Autism program.

East Brunswick High School - EBHS Marching Band Technology Upgrade Brian Toth

Funds will allow for the purchase of a laptop computer, a protective case and cover for the laptop, additional hardware, and the MainStage app that will allow for the integration of all electronic components through one device. Students will receive training on how to integrate the updated tools into their performances.

Bowne-Munro Elementary School, Central Elementary School, Chittick Elementary School, Frost Elementary School, Irwin Elementary School, Lawrence Brook Elementary School, Memorial School, Warnsdorfer Elementary School, and Hammarskjold Upper Elementary School - Eclipse Double Header Ryan Higgins

By including families in shared activities, teachers hope to foster a strong home-school connection.

Warnsdorfer Elementary School - Paws for Reading Rachel Solomon

The goal of the Paws for Reading program is to create a supportive and non-judgmental environment in which basic skills students can improve their reading skills and develop a love for reading. Twice a month, a certified therapy dog will visit Warnsdorfer where they will be read to by basic skills students.

Warnsdorfer Elementary School - Improving Phonology and Articulation One Picture at a Time Laura D'Onofrio

The goal of this grant is to provide additional materials that will enhance the speech instruction for a wide range of students of different ages and abilities. Most of the students who will benefit from this project are in self-contained special needs classrooms where they receive highly individualized instruction.

Warnsdorfer Elementary School - 2023 Literacy Grant Heather Rettberg

Research shows that half of preschool-age children with language impairments develop significant literacy learning difficulties. Literacy-based therapy is a contextualized framework where intervention activities are organized around a book or story. The goal for this grant is to enhance an already stellar preschool program with new and inventive materials that will enable the therapist to provide students with literacy-based therapy. A variety of age appropriate books and a Literacy bundle from Teachers Pay Teachers to be used during therapy sessions will be purchased with grant funds

Warnsdorfer Elementary School - Sunshine Through Sensory! *Maddie Neuman*

Kindergarten and first grade students on the autism spectrum that have wide ranging skills, as well as varying strengths and needs, will benefit from this grant. Funding will provide students with new sensory opportunities to help them engage in learning, reach their IEP goals, and improve their functional skills. By implementing these sensory opportunities into their everyday classroom routine, the teacher will be able to help students learn to self-regulate, generalize skills, and increase their functional communication, all of which are vital to their continuing success.

Churchill Junior High School - Bringing the "Calm" to the Classroom Melissa Grigal and Beth Shobe

Teachers have noticed a significant increase in the number of students suffering from anxiety since the end of the pandemic. Additionally, when students are asked to identify what they see as the top health concerns among adolescents at least 50% of the students report that they feel that anxiety and stress are huge concerns for teens. Grant funds will allow for the purchase of "Calm Strips". Calm strips are textured sensory stickers with a special reusable adhesive. They're convenient and discreet fidget tools that cannot be used as a distraction or toy. They are crafted to provide sensory stimulation. Sensory input is used to help regulate breathing and releases restless energy resulting in increased emotional regulation and focus throughout the day. This tool is recommended for anyone, but it is especially effective for fidgeters, individuals with anxiety, ADD/ADHD, BFRB (Body-Focused Repetitive Behavior), those in Autistic communities, and students needing sensory stimulation or social-emotional release.

Irwin Elementary School - PBSIS Sticker Grant Krystal Weeks

This grant will enhance Irwin's PBSIS program and support the school theme, "Strong Minds Grow Here". Funds will provide students with positive behavior rewards to encourage character development. Strong character development is deeply rooted within the *New Jersey Student Learning Standards* and the district's current curriculum design. Using the stickers will give students a visible reminder of growing their brain towards becoming stronger learners, and leaders.

Hammarskjold Elementary School - Scholastic Magazines to Support Language Arts Instruction Kristy Ferris

Three Scholastic resources will be purchased with grant funds to enhance students' ability to read and comprehend nonfiction texts: Storyworks, Scholastic News, and Science Spin. Each of these resources have both print and digital elements that will motivate and engage students in nonfiction learning, while also connecting aspects of the ELA, Social Studies, and Science curriculums.

Churchill Junior High School – Orchestral Audition Workshop Sarah Franchino, Mary O'Mara, and Susan Meuse

The goal of this grant is to bring in two professional orchestral musicians to give students who will audition for Region/All State Orchestras a 2-hour masterclass on taking part in auditions. Students will learn how to best prepare for an audition, what judges listen for during a blind audition, and tips for how to stay calm and focused while performing. Students will also have the chance to perform audition repertoire for the visiting clinicians and receive their expert feedback.

The materials that will be purchased will be used in the treatment of apraxia of speech, speech sound disorders, and expressive and receptive language delays.

Memorial Elementary School - Bjorem Speech

Big Box of Bjorem Speech Sound Cues will be purchased with grants funds. These evidence-based picture cues are designed to help young children acquire, use and combine sounds by giving each sound a meaning that that makes sense and that is developmentally appropriate. This resource can be easily incorporated into reading programs, classroom settings, play-based therapy or drill work. They complement any program that involves working with children on: Childhood Apraxia, Early Acquisition of Speech, Speech Sound Disorders, Phonological Awareness, Early Literacy, Vowel Differences, and Dyslexia.

Warnsdorfer Elementary School - Creative Native

Jennifer Traversone, Iman Shah, and Annmarie Kurdes

The goal of this grant is to fully immerse third graders in researching and understanding Native American tribes. Students will become experts as they research, write, and participate in projects to better understand the daily lives of indigenous people. As a culminating event, they will engage in Native American crafts and games to celebrate all they have learned. Grant funds will support teachers' efforts to enhance the third grade ELA/Social Studies unit of study.

East Brunswick High School - Polymerization in Chemis-tree

This project is designed to introduce high school students to the fascinating world of polymers through engaging, educational activities using Shrinky Dink paper to create ornaments for a Chemis-tree. Shrinky Dinks, to be purchased with grant funds, are polystyrene sheets that, when heated, undergo a remarkable transformation that vividly illustrates the concept of polymerization. Incorporating Shrinky Dink paper into the curriculum can make the abstract concept of polymers more concrete and relatable for students. It provides a creative and interactive way to teach students about the properties and behaviors of polymers in real-world context.

Churchill Junior High School - Fidget Frenzy for Study Skills Students Celine Clark, Elizabeth Kaplan, Bridget LaPlante, Elizabeth Canillo and Melissa Novak

Since the pandemic many students have been struggling with increased levels of anxiety. As a way to improve student performance, Study Skills teachers will provide students with a means for self-regulation while maintaining or improving their productivity. Included in the proposal were detailed statistics and personal comments from students describing the "fidget" that would benefit them and why. These fidgets are among those that will be purchased with grant funds.

Churchill Junior High School - Grounding Kits for Kids Elizabeth Stankiewicz

With grant funds "Grounding Kits," small, tangible, discrete containers filled with various sensory items, will be created. For example, textured tape, pop-it keychains, or fidget rings can provide students with stimuli that engage their sense of touch, where scratch and sniff magnets can help engage their sense of smell, and so on. Students who experience significant anxiety can be provided with a grounding kit from their counselor to help practice techniques for grounding.

Bowne – Munro - The 3D Pen is Mightier than the Sword! Wendy Tepper and Andrew Scanlon

The goal of this grant is to create an innovative and engaging environment where elementary students can explore the realms of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) through the use of 3Doodler pens. A 3D pen is a pen that extrudes warm plastic from the pen's nozzle. Twenty-four 3D pens and related supplies will be purchased with grant funds to be used during Media time for multiple STEM activities, from creating art to building a part needed for an engineering solution.

Central Elementary School - A Spot of Social Emotional Learning Sara Enis

This grant will provide the means for the purchase of the SPOT Social Emotional Learning Resource. The SPOT program materials requested include: books with accompanying activity sheets, feelings posters, activity cards, and more. The program will be implemented during whole class lessons, as well as individual and group counseling sessions to support students as they develop skills in emotional regulation, conflict resolution, communication, empathy, and cooperation.

Churchill Junior High School - Mayhem Poets - State Theatre New Brunswick Miriam Berotte-Francis and Jessica Loux

Mayhem Poets are a New Jersey-based "slam poetry" trio who met while studying together at Rutgers University. The goal of the grant is to expose students to this form of poetry that combines the elements of performance with writing, competition, and audience participation. Funds will cover the cost of admission for 100 grade eight students to attend a performance at the State Theatre. A study guide, provided by the theater, includes activities to both prepare students prior to the performance as well as to extend their learning following the performance.

Grant funds will allow for the purchase of a culturally diverse, cross curricular collection of high-quality texts that teachers will utilize to connect their ELA lessons to topics being addressed in both Social Studies, and Science. Incorporating iPad Minis into the PE classroom will create a dynamic learning environment that promotes student engagement, advances skill development, and encourages lifelong physical fitness habits.

Churchill Junior High School - Bringing Shakespeare to Life Natasha Cuiffo, Mitchell Pollock, and Miriam Berotte-Francis

Grant funds will provide the means to bring a performance of A Midsummer Night's Dream from the Shakespeare Theatre of New Jersey to the CJHS cafetorium so that 8th grade ELA honors students can appreciate and celebrate this classic work. Excellence Grants; \$500 to \$2,500 awarded annually for special projects.
