COMMUNITIES

The Bolivar-Richburg Central School District is located in southwestern New York, 75 miles directly east of Jamestown and 75 miles west of Corning, just above the Pennsylvania State border. The school district's nearly 5300 inhabitants reside in the beautiful rolling hills and valleys characterizing the rural towns of Bolivar, Richburg, Clarksville, Genesee, Alma and Wirt. A short commute east to Wellsville (pop. 7000) or west to Olean (pop. 13,000) provides access to employment, business and other resources. The district is divided into three buildings that are all located within two miles of each other: a preschool building in Bolivar, a PK-5 building in Richburg and a 6-12 building in Bolivar.

SCHOOL

Accreditation: Bolivar-Richburg Central School is a public school registered and accredited by the University of the State of New York.

Enrollment: 718 total student population in grade Pre-K - grade 12
294 total student population in grades PK- grade 5 at the Richburg building
320 total student population in grades 6- grade 12 at the Bolivar building
104 total student population in the PK building and out-of-building K-12 placements

Classes: The average class size is 14 students in core 6-12 courses; all classes (except labs & P.E.) meet for 40 minutes a day, over four ten-week marking periods. 61% of all high school students matriculate in a college-preparatory course of study.

COVID-Schedule: A five-day fully in-person schedule is in place for this year.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES

Bolivar-Richburg supports a broad range of extra-curricular activities to enhance physical, mental and social development. The interscholastic athletic program boasts 32 teams for boys and girls who wear the Wolverine red, black and white in competition in 18 sports. **Other popular organized activities include:** The Claw yearbook, The BR Sentinel school newspaper, SADD-Students Against Destructive Decisions, Student Council, FCCLA-Family Career and Community Leaders of America, Junior and Senior National Honor Society, Wolverine Club, Science Club, FFA, Ecology Club, Ski Club, Trap Club, Odyssey of the Mind, Lego League,

CURRICULUM

Bolivar-Richburg offers dual enrollment college-level courses in English Composition 1 and 2, Literature, Public Speaking, Statistics, Math Problem Solving, College Trigonometry, and College Pre-Calculus through Jamestown Community College's College Connections program as well as an Advanced Placement (AP) course in Calculus AB. College Spanish I and II, Intro to Sports Management and College Sports in Society are also available through Alfred State College. College Sociology and Psychology are offered online asynchronously through Houghton University. On-site CLEP testing is available to students as is the ability to take online coursework through CA BOCES. Regents, or college preparatory courses, are offered in English, Global History, U.S. History, Government and Economics, Earth Science, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II, Pre-Calculus and Spanish. Other courses come from these general headings: English, history, mathematics, science, business, computer, technology, art, health, physical education, FACS (Family & Consumer Science), driver education, and numerous trade occupations at the Career & Tech Center in Belmont, New York which prepares students for vocational careers. All Bolivar-Richburg, students working for a high school diploma are required to take Regents examinations in Earth Science, Living Environment (Biology), CC Algebra I, ELA 11, Global History and U.S. History & Government. Students with disabilities working for a high school diploma are instructed using the "inclusion" model, where the special education direct consultant teacher is "included" in the instruction process and aids by attending the student's core subject classes.

GRADING AND CLASS RANKING

GPA is numerical and includes all credit-bearing courses. AP, College and Honors courses are weighted, by adding seven points to the final average up to a maximum score of 100. Optional Advanced regents courses are weighted with five additional points due to their rigor with a maximum score of 100. These specific courses are: Geometry, Algebra II, Pre-Calculus, Spanish 2, Spanish 3, Chemistry, and Physics. For GPA, all courses are weighted by their credit factor, i.e. one-credit courses are weighted as 1.0, half-credit courses are weighted as .5 and two-credit vo-tech courses are weighted at 2.0.

Class rank is computed for all students who are working for a high school diploma. Students are officially ranked for the first time at the end of their freshman year; the final rank is calculated after 20 weeks of the senior year for valedictorian and salutatorian. Class ranks are not weighted in any way.

Units of credit are assigned according to the length of the course. One-credit courses meet an average of 5 days a week for forty weeks. One credit is awarded for a 40-week course, one-half credit for a 20-week course. BOCES vocational-tech courses are awarded two credits for a 40-week, two-period block of time.
