MEF And Community Partners Collaborate For Mental Health Training

Thanks to a \$21,000 grant from the Lauren & Emily Failla Foundation (LEFF), all Morristown High School staff received a full day of training to identify, understand, and respond to signs of mental health challenges among students. Community members also attended a parent education program led by

facilitators from the Mental Health Association in New Jersey, Inc. Fantastic conversations between facilitators and attendees revolved around how to support students.

This grant is the bedrock for a long-term investment, with the next phase occurring in the 2024-2025 school year when staff will be certified to train peers to recognize and support mental health challenges in students.

"School years are difficult enough for children, but the impact of COVID, social media, and the increasing suicide rate moved us to find ways to help through the LEFF and MEF," said Frank Failla on behalf of himself and his wife, Kay Faiila, Founders of the Lauren & Emily Failla Foundation.

The project represents a unique partnership of strong organizations, including the Community Foundation of New Jersey-Mental Health Foundation Collaboration and will act as a pilot for other communities

STEM Education Through Elementary




MHS Unified Flag Football Soars High with the New York Jets





Golf: Morristown Golf had an incredible season in 2024. The team won the state sectional tournament and placed second in the Morris County Tournament. In addition, the team had plenty of individual achievements. Caroline Fixter won the Girls Morris County Tournament (MCT) and Maya Burton placed second in the Girls Morris County and NJAC Tournaments. Cormack Meldrum placed 3rd in the MCT and shared first place with Liam Pasternack in the State Sectional Tournament. Additionally, Liam Pasternak placed 2nd in the MCT and won the State Tournament of Champions.

Girls Lacrosse: The Girls Lacrosse team continued to make history in 2024. The team captured the first-ever triple crown – Stars & Stripes Red Co-Championship, back-to-back County Championships, and NJ Group 4 Sectional and State Championship. The team's senior captains collectively guided them in the right direction under their tremendous and collaborative efforts.



Softball: Morristown Softball went through a lot, facing many mental and physical hardships, including a tremendous obstacle in the first half of the season. Through resilience, teamwork, trust, and motivation, the team found and reignited their spark. They were ranked 12 out of 16 in the state tournament and went on a historic run defeating, the #4, #5, #8, and #3 seeds, ultimately winning the Group 4 State Sectional Championship for the first time in proaram history



Boys Tennis: It was a very competitive year for Boys Varsity Tennis. They came in 2nd place as a team in the National Conference and reached the North NJ Group 4 Section 1 Team Tournament Quarterfinals. They also placed 3rd as a team in the Morris Invitational Tournament, making it to the finals at two positions

Boys Track: The Colonials had a winning dual meet season with 3-1 in the NJAC Conference. Jason Meza set a new school record in the Discus and Ronald Morgan also set a record in the Javelin. One of the highlights this season was watching the team score enough points to win the NJAC Conference title in the Large School division. The boys placed third at the Morris County Championships and were the Runners Up at the NJSIAA North I Group IV Championships.

Girls Track: MHS Girls Spring track had an amazing season. For the dual meet season, the team went 3-1, losing only to Chatham. They successfully ran at the Penn Relays with a time of 52.3 in the 4x100 relay and in the 4x400 relay, the Colonials ran the fastest time of 4:00 in Morris County this season. Highlights of the Varsity season included capturing 3rd place in the Morris County Relays, 5th place in the NJAC Championships and 6th place in the NJSIAA Group 4 sectionals.

The excitement of "Friday Night Lights" may have been the most publicized addition, but many athletic improvements had an immediate impact. Refinished floors in the MHS main and auxiliary gyms, new uniforms across MHS and FMS sports, new metal team benches at all MHS and FMS sports venues and a new weatherprotected scorer's table to house student scorekeepers were noticeable changes.

Aesthetics helped increase morale, and several small but significant changes resulted in a visible shift in Morristown athletic pride. Enhancements included consistent Colonials signage and banners installed on light posts and windscreens around Memorial Field, new field mats and protective coverings, and the beautification of MHS and FMS grounds and storage spaces.

Athletic staffing received a boost in attention as well. The scope of responsibility for the MHS Athletic Director was changed to a new Districtwide focus. A new FMS Athletic Director position was filled to place additional focus on middle school athletics. As a result, the coaching staff at MHS reports to the MSD Athletic Director and coaches at FMS will report to the FMS Athletic Director, Jess McGinn. All coaches are also supported with professional development opportunities.

The District hired a dedicated FMS Athletic Trainer – a first in NJ for middle school sports. A new MHS Equipment Manager position was created to oversee sports-related inventory and equipment and a new MHS Athletics Security position was made to attend games and oversee sports facilities.

Coaches are creating a continuous studentathlete pipeline from elementary to middle to high school by attending recreation games and collaborating with Guidance to identify highperforming student-athletes proactively.

To honor student-athletes and their dedication to their team, congratulatory Senior Banners were hung at all MHS athletic complexes during their team's season. In addition, banners for Division 1-committed student-athletes hung in the MHS atrium proudly showcasing their college commitments - of which the District celebrated the following 12 this year! C.
