We are also in the middle of our 175th anniversary celebration. We are looking forward to Homecoming Weekend (September 27-29) with old and new friends, and welcome you all to join us in Spartanburg! If you have never visited our beautiful campus or it's been a while, please come spend a day with us—you'll be glad you did.

Strategic Plan Update:

Student Achievement

Interim Goal: By May 2024, 81% of students in kindergarten through 5th grade receiving instruction from the SCSDB Reading Interventionist will demonstrate growth related to reading fluency as measured by the Fountas & Pinnell Reading Benchmark Assessment.

SCSDB has met the interim goal for kindergarten through 5th-grade students who receive instruction from the SCSDB Reading Interventionist demonstrating growth. Staff continues to be focused on providing research-based instruction with fidelity. SCSDB partnered with Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind (AIDB) to provide professional development in reading strategies and assessment for students in the low incidence population. Within the schools, teachers participated in data analysis to address identified weaknesses. SCSDB remains focused on increasing the percentage of students demonstrating growth.

• Teacher/Administrator Quality

Interim Goal: By May 2024, 70% of certified teachers at the School for the Deaf, the School for the Blind, and Cedar Springs Academy will demonstrate active monthly usage of the Learning Object Repository (LOR), the shared online curricular content database utilized by SCSDB, as measured by LOR usage reports.

SCSDB has surpassed the interim goal for Learning Object Repository (LOR) usage. All current teachers have completed the Safari Montage certification process. They have also participated in trainings with the Curriculum and Testing Coordinator to support usage. More in-depth analysis shows that teachers are beginning to move from using it mostly for playbacks to increasing content creation and uploading materials for others to use.

School Climate

Interim Goal: By May 2024, SCSDB will develop and implement a Social Emotional Learning (SEL) program, with ongoing training each year facilitated through Professional Learning Communities (PLC), with 85% participation for certified staff.

SCSDB surpassed the interim goal of certified staff participation in Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) regarding Social Emotional Learning. SCSDB has prioritized the implementation of school-wide support by hiring a fulltime School Climate Coordinator. The coordinator has developed teams within each school to identify gaps and address needs. The coordinator has also coordinated and provided training to certified and non-certified staff in each school, as well as, Residential Life staff, in de-escalation techniques and strategies. Across campus, Zones of Regulation training has been conducted, with pilot programs occurring in each school. The teams have developed

ways to make the information accessible to students with sensory loss. Steps are in place to implement the program campus-wide for the next school year.

Agency Priority

Interim Goal: By May 2024, 70% of certified staff will demonstrate increased proficiency with targeted assistive technologies as measured by pre- and post-survey data.

SCSDB has surpassed the goal of certified staff demonstrating increased proficiency with targeted assistive technologies. Survey data demonstrates that most teachers have moved from emerging knowledge to more proficient knowledge and use of targeted technologies. An Assistive Technology team, with members from all schools, continues to meet monthly to identify needs and discuss new technologies that may be appropriate to utilize. The team also facilitates trainings and leadership in assistive technology in each school.


and other bakery items are made in the bakery sections. Students got to compete for their own cake in a counting game with the bakery staff.




Harbor Freight Fellows

Elizabeth (Liz) List, art teacher at the School for the Blind, had a lesson plan selected as an exemplar arts/arts integrated lesson from SCSDB's current Arts in Basic Curriculum Review Cycle.

The lesson will be published with ABC through the SC Department of Education's Instruction Hub. The lesson will also be featured in the ABC District Arts Integration Toolkit on www.abcinstitutesc.org.

The three lesson plans provide an introduction to texture as an element of art. The first lesson takes students through the process of using the See, Think, Wonder thinking routine to explore artworks that feature either actual or implied texture for comparison. The second lesson engages students in the process of experimenting with how different kinds of art materials can be used to create textures (actual or implied.) Finally, the third lesson involves having students create an original artwork that features texture as a primary element of art using their own choice of materials.




Kelly's Kids Educarer of the Year, Teacher of the Year
