Spring into Motion begins!

It's time to get moving, Mapleton, with our annual wellness challenge! This year, we're using the *Spring into Motion* app, presented by our partners at Kaiser Permanente. The app takes wellness to a whole new level by tracking your movement and encouraging you to participate in heart, body, and mind-healthy activities. The app also provides resources like healthy recipes and fitness tips.

Using a tracking device, or the app's tool to convert exercise minutes to steps, participants can accumulate points through a wide array of activities, from walking or running to playing ping pong or pickleball. Doing so, and accruing enough points through the month, will earn participants badges and prizes. Participants will join *Spring Into Motion* as individuals and will have their own individual score, but they can also join an optional team competition, where individual points will count towards their team score.

Welby Community School of the Arts student wins 2024 District Science Fair

Congratulations to Jacob B., a sixth grader from Welby Community School of the Arts, for being named this year's overall District Science Fair winner! His project "How Much Acid Is In This Fruit?" researched the acidic levels of lemons, limes, and grapefruits using red cabbage water as an acid-base indicator. Jacob found the pH levels in lemons had the highest amount of acid among the selected fruits.



For the Fair, all K-12th grade projects had to use the scientific method to test and answer various academic prompts. Judges selected winners based on many variables, including the depth of a

student's understanding, coherence of their presentation, their research, and their creativity.

Other students' projects at the Science Fair answered questions such as: Can you regrow produce from the grocery store? Why do Mentos react to soda? Does the five-second rule really work? Congratulations to all our participants on their projects!

Academy High School science teacher earns STEM grant award

And speaking of science, Academy High School biology and environmental science teacher Lindsay Schultz was one of 41 educators around the country to earn an award from the nonprofit Society for Science through their STEM Research Grants program. The program is dedicated to advancing hands-on science education in middle and high school classrooms nationwide.



For her grant, Schultz requested lab materials to help students study water systems and their relation to other parts of the environment, like wind or obstructions. Those materials will also be shared with science classrooms around the district. Schultz said she hopes the materials will help broaden students' perspectives.

"Water is a huge part of our world, but not a lot of kids in Colorado have access to large, natural bodies of water," she said. "These tools will help us get real world applications by seeing how things work on a smaller scale."

CMAS starts next week. Prepare your students!

We are less than a week out from the 2024 Colorado Measures of Academic Success (CMAS) testing window, which opens on Monday, April 8, and runs through Friday, April 28. Students' unfamiliarity with the assessment can cause anxiety and may impede their ability to demonstrate what they know. To prepare students for CMAS testing, please familiarize them with the platform, TestNav, and assessment items by using the <u>Colorado Practice Resources</u>. These provide students with an opportunity to:

- Practice with item formats such as true/false, multiple choice, grid-in answer, fill-in-blanks, dropdown boxes, and click and drag.
- Become familiar with the process of clicking back and forth between passages when they are asked to compare texts.
- Navigate multiple-part items. Many items on CMAS have two or more parts. If a student is not familiar with the format, they could easily miss answering part of a question.
- Practice using tools such as answer elimination tools, notepads, math symbols, and bookmarks.
- Become familiar with accessibility features such as text-to-speech.

Please also encourage students to get plenty of rest before they take these assessments, stress the importance of attendance on testing days, and tell them to do their best.

PSAT and SAT testing starts soon, too

High school teachers, please also remind your students and families that our students are scheduled to take the State of Colorado's assessments in April, which include:

• **Grade 9**: PSAT 9

• Grade 10: PSAT 10

• Grade 11: SAT and CMAS Science

Testing Schedule (April 15 - April 19):

- Monday, April 15: Regular school day for all students in grades 9-12.
- Tuesday, April 16: PSAT 9 for 9th-grade students only. No classes for grades 10-12.
- Wednesday, April 17: PSAT 11 for 11th-grade students. No classes for grades 9, 10, and 12.
- Thursday, April 18: PSAT 10 and Science CMAS for 10th and 11th-grade students. No classes for grades 9 and 12.
- Friday, April 19: No school for all students.

Make-up testing is scheduled for the week of April 22 for any students who miss a test.

Teaching and Learning

Secondary language embedded training: Grade 6 - 12 social studies and science teachers

In order to support our growing population of multilingual learners with embedded language support in Tier 1, all Mapleton grade 6-12 science AND social studies teachers will receive training in <u>E.L. Achieve's Constructing Meaning.</u>

According to the site, "Constructing Meaning is explicit language instruction to support grade-level content learning in English. Analysis of the language demands becomes part of lesson planning so that both language and content goals are considered. It occurs throughout the day, across all subject areas. Subject-specific language is differentiated by students' English proficiency levels so each student is equipped to think, discuss, read, and write to the lesson goals."

As this training is required, we are offering several different options to best meet your needs. The June 2024 cohort is one of three options for completing this training. There will also be a fall/winter 2024 cohort and a June 2025 cohort.
