Description:	The National Art Honor Society was established in 1978 in the United States by the National Art Education Association (NAEA) for high school student's grades 10-12, for the purpose of inspiring and recognizing those students who have shown an outstanding ability in art. The intention of the National Art Honor Society is to recognize higher order learning in the visual arts while bringing art education to the attention of the school and the community. Membership in this chapter shall be based upon art scholarship, service to the community, and character. Members will be expected to attend regular meetings and abide by school rules. <u>Student members</u> must maintain a 90 or above average in their art classes as well as be in good academic standing. Students need to complete a minimum of 16 hours of service to maintain their membership. Ten of these hours must be directly related to the visual arts. Credit hours come from school and community service. Member students are eligible to apply for the " <i>Charles M. Robertson Memorial Scholarship</i> ", a special four-year scholarship to the <i>Pratt Institute's School of Art and Design</i> in New York.
Service to School:	Students may participate in several charity events including Every Child's Dream, designing murals, decorating showcases and bulletin boards, assisting other art teachers, tutoring, fundraising, Halloween window painting and the Art Honor Society also promotes the arts at "Back to School Nights".

ATHLETES HELPING OTHERS



	We will be devoting one club meeting to a discussion on bullying. The advisor will monitor a broad discussion. It will be a dialogue among the entire membership.




THE CURRENT


DEBATE TEAM

Description:	The Sayville High School Debate Team competes with other schools through the Long Island Forensics Association (LIFA) and the National (NatCir) Circuits. Students are required to prepare and debate both sides of an issue through multiple rounds at the tournaments. The team collectively researches issues and students practice with one another before competing. Although new, the Sayville High School team has a strong record of fantastic debaters who on the whole win more rounds than they lose. Being a member provides many academic and personal benefits including research, writing and public speaking skills. In addition, members have the potential to win scholarship money and prizes. Debate is an incredible activity to have on a college application, as it demonstrates dedication, critical thinking skills, superior writing and speaking skills. In addition, debate requires respect of others as a foundational expectation. Debaters compete on both sides of every resolution and come to appreciate the valid points across a spectrum of opinions. And the collaborative work of preparing cases as a team creates a supportive and encouraging environment.

Meetings: Held on the 2nd and 4th Thursday of the month, during and after 10th period in HS Library


The Great Stories Book Group- Google Classroom code is: yewco2h

MATHLETES



The senior editors decide what appears in the book. Students involved in layout design the cover and are responsible for how the book will look when printed. They also decide which photographs go in the book, write captions for the pictures, and write stories.

Students may be entitled to a discount on a yearbook based on the amount of work performed on the book during the school year.
