Pennsylvania Youth Survey

We had a great participation rate of 80%

2021 Pennridge students completed PAYS
Sixth grade: 473 (86%)
Eighth grade: 487 (87%)
Tenth grade: 457 (82%)
Twelfth grade: 375 (64%)

Five Areas To Consider

- 1. Alcohol, Tobacco, and Other Drug (ATOD) Use and Access
- 2. Community and School Climate and Safety
- 3. Social and Emotional Health
- 4. Student Perceptions
- 5. Risk and Protective Factors

Alcohol, Tobacco, and Other Drugs (ATOD) Use and Access

Positive Trends:

- Lifetime use of Alcohol, Marijuana, and inhalants is down in all grades
- Vaping use is down dramatically
 - 17.5% (2017), 13% (2019), 8% (2021) state average = 13%
- Risky behaviors associated with ATOD are down and continue to be low
 - Binge Drinking
 - Driving while drunk and/or high

Alcohol, Tobacco, and Other Drugs (ATOD) Use and Access

Concerning Trends:

- Fewer are using vapes, but 35% of those using report using THC. This is down from 39% in 2019, but is still above the state average of 26%
- Alcohol use is down, but 55% of those reporting use indicate that they received the alcohol from their parent, a friend's parent, or another adult relative
- Prescription drug use is down, but 63% of those reporting use indicate they stole them from their own home

Community and School Climate and Safety

Positive Trends:

- Violence at school is lower in all grade levels
- Drug use at school is lower in all grade levels
- Reports of Bullying are down
 - 26% (2019) to 22% (2021) 23% (state average)
 - 54% at school, 46% away from school
 - 78% indicate they have not been bullied in past year
- Reports of Positive School Environment are up

Community and School Climate and Safety

Concerning Trends:

- Sexting reported by students in grade 12 showed a dramatic increase
- Student reported 'importance of school' is low (41%)
- Although those with jobs has increased, Involvement in other pro-social activities is down

Social and Emotional Health

Concerning Trends:

- Although still below the state averages, the majority of mental health data has increased.
 - 'At times I feel I am no good' 27.9% (2019), 31.6% (2021), 38.6% (state)
 - 'Felt depressed or sad most days' 27% (2019), 31.4% (2021), 40.1% (state)
 - 'So sad, I stopped doing usual activities' 20.5% (2019), 23.6% (2021), 31% (state)
 - Planned Suicide 9.7% (2019), 9.9% (2021), 14.7% (state)
 - 9.9% of secondary population would be 395 students
 - Attempted Suicide 7.0% (2019), 7.0% (2021), 10.9% (state)
 - 7% of secondary population would be 279 students

Student Perceptions

•Continued Strengths

• Perceived risk of risky behavior

- Perceived disapproval from parents for risky behavior
- Perceived disapproval from peers for risky behavior
- Decreased perception of peers' risky behavior

 Inconsistent with perceived approval from community for risky behavior

Risk and Protective Factors

 <u>Risk Factors</u> – items that are likely to contribute to anti-social behaviors (delinquency, drug use, etc)

 Conflict with family/peers; anti-social peers; low attachment to family/community/school; perceptions of ATOD

<u>Protective Factors</u> – items that are likely to contribute to positive social behaviors (attachment to others, positive social interactions, etc)

Positive involvement with family/community/school;
 Moral/religious beliefs; pro-social peers;

• Family Connections and Negative Views of ATOD remain strong

Risk Factors (17 of them)

• Highest (same as 2019)

- Low commitment to school (54%)
- Parental attitudes that support anti-social behavior (48%)
- Perceived risks of drug use (45%)

OLOWEST (Rebelliousness was third in 2019)

- Gang Involvement (2%)
- Interaction with anti-social peers (13%)
- Friends use of drugs (16%)

Protective Factors (11 of them)

• Highest (same as 2019)

- Family Attachment (68%)
- Family opportunities for pro-social involvement (67%)
- Family rewards for pro-social involvement (63%)

• Lowest (same as 2019)

- Religiosity (32%)
- Rewards for pro-social involvement (40%)
- School opportunities for pro-social involvement (43%)
