




General Information

New Students

If you are new to the District, please register your children at the Central Office, 13 Beckwith Avenue, as soon as possible. Contact District Registrar Jennifer Adrian by phone at 585-889-6268 or by email at jennifer_adrian@wheatlandchili.org for more information.

Children may begin school at Wheatland-Chili before they reside in the District if their parents or guardians are in the process of establishing residence in the District and that process can be verified through records.

School personnel may give your children tests to determine the best classroom placement and courses for them. The school will make arrangements for the transfer of your children's records from their former school after you sign a release form.

Proof of Guardianship:

A student may be eligible to attend the Wheatland-Chili Central School District when their legal guardian resides in the District. Proof of such status is required by the Superintendent. Forms can be requested at the Central Office.

PreK and Kindergarten Registration

Children who will be 4 years old on or before Dec. 1, 2024 are eligible to enter PreK in Sept. 2024. Children who will be 5 years old on or before December 1, 2024 are eligible to enter kindergarten in September 2024.

Registration information for both grades will be mailed out in the beginning of January with registration appointments to be held the last week of January. You will also be given an appointment for screening in March. Information nights for incoming PreK and kindergarten families will be held in May. Please check the online calendar for specific dates and times.

Change of Student Status

Change of a student's personal status will be reported to the District Registrar in advance, including:

- Moving (within or out of the district)
- Telephone number change
- Name change (family or individual)
- Temporary residence change due to family emergency

Other situations (extended vacations, trips abroad, etc.) will be reported in advance to the student's school. Personal information is handled confidentially. Simply notify the principal or school counselor.



Emergency Closings

When inclement weather or any other emergency situation forces the closing of schools, the District will post an alert on the District website and automated phone calls, emails and/or text messages will be made to families. The information will also be submitted to local television and radio stations as well as posted on the District's official social media accounts. Please do not telephone the schools. The decision to close schools in weather-related situations will be made no later than 6:15 a.m.

On the rare occasion that it may be necessary to close schools during the day, an announcement will be made as soon as possible through the same communication channels. Should an emergency early dismissal occur, the District will attempt to transport students to their homes in the same manner that they are usually taken home at the close of the school day. If both T. J. Connor and the MS/HS must close early, the District will try to dismiss the MS/HS first so that older siblings will be home to care for younger siblings. It is especially important that parents pre-arrange child care in the event that an emergency school closing is necessary. If the pre-arranged child care is at a different site than the child's home, your school's principal should be notified in advance so that proper transportation can be arranged.

When schools are closed due to weather, all other activities, including sports, clubs and adult and continuing education classes, will be cancelled for the entire day.

To ensure you receive emergency notifications, please contact the school secretary to confirm that your contact information is up-to-date.



Student Services

Code of Conduct and Support

The District is committed to providing a school environment where students may receive quality educational services without disruption or interference. Responsible behavior by students, district personnel, parents and other visitors is essential to achieving this goal. It is recognized that a strong instructional program is often the best method for maintaining appropriate behavior. Restorative practices build respect and community, resolve conflicts and repair harm caused by wrongdoing

Discipline and interventions are most effective when they deal directly with the problem at the time and place it occurs and in a way that students view as fair and impartial.

District personnel who interact with students are expected to use disciplinary action only when necessary and to place emphasis on the students' ability to grow in self-discipline. All interventions and consequences will be clear, fair and consistent to be effective in changing student behavior. In determining the appropriate action, District personnel will consider the following:

- Student's age and/or development
- Nature of offense and circumstances which led to the offense
- Student's prior disciplinary record
- · Effectiveness of other forms of discipline
- Information from parents, teachers and/or others, as appropriate
- Other extenuating circumstances

As a general rule, discipline will be progressive and build student assets. This means that a student's first violation will usually merit a lighter penalty than subsequent violations. If the conduct of a student is related to a disability or suspected disability, the student shall be referred to the Committee on Special Education and discipline, if warranted, shall be administered consistent with the separate requirements of the Code of Conduct and Support for disciplining students with a disability.

Counseling

Many young people will need periodic help to deal with the world in which they live. All young people will need help with decisions and planning. Your child's school counselor is a professional who is trained to deal with both issues. Among other roles, the school counselor assists students in making personal choices and developing longrange plans, provides personal counseling, coordinates and interprets students' records and testing and disseminates information about school offerings, higher education, and careers.

Food Service

All Wheatland-Chili students can receive free breakfast and lunch each day of the school year.

The District qualifies for the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP), a program funded by a partnership between the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and New York State that allows schools in low-income areas to provide free meals to all students.

In order for the District to continue to qualify for free meals, families must complete a new Free and Reduced Meals Application each school year. The application is also tied to other

The application is also tied to other important benefits for students, such as fee waivers for Advanced Placement exams, dual-credit tuition assistance, state funding and more. Applications are available in this calendar, on the District's website, at each school office or by contacting the Food Service Department at 889-6257.

The District uses an online prepayment service for families to deposit funds for additional snack and drink purchases in their student's account. Accounts can be found at myschoolbucks.com. Prepayments can also be made to the cafeteria cashier.

Health Services

School nurses perform a variety of services to help ensure the students' health on a daily basis and to help them develop habits beneficial to long-term health. Each year, nurses screen students for scoliosis and vision or hearing problems and conduct a general health screening. Our nurses are available to counsel students and parents on health-related problems. They are also vital to health education, working with teachers to help students learn good health habits.

Immunizations: All students are required by law to be immunized against diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, polio, measles, mumps, rubella, hepatitis B, varicella (chickenpox), meningitis, haemophilus influenzae type B and pneumonia. School districts may not admit students without proof of immunization.

Illness or Injury at School: If your child becomes sick or injured during the school day, you or the person whom you designate will be called. The school nurse will administer first aid if it is needed. If you cannot be reached or if the situation appears to be an emergency, family or school doctors will be called, and the student will be taken to the hospital. Your child will not be sent home unless the school can reach you, or another person you designate who can arrange to be home when the child arrives.

If a student is diagnosed as having a contagious disease or a condition that can be easily spread, the school nurses will notify the parents/guardians of students with whom they may have been in contact and assist in recommending necessary treatment. Tutoring services during an extended illness (generally two weeks or longer) may be arranged through your school's main office.

Health Examinations: Students in PreK or kindergarten and grades 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11 are asked to bring a report of a health examination by their family physician and a dental certificate from their dentist. A report of health examination is also required for those students participating in team and club sports. Parents who are having difficulties complying with this requirement should reach out to their school's health office as soon as possible for assistance and guidance. For more information, contact:

Student Services

McKinney-Vento Act

The McKinney-Vento Act covers youth who don't have a fixed, adequate and regular nighttime residence. If you lost your housing due to economic hardship and now live doubled-up with family or friends; in a shelter, motel, vehicle, camping ground or temporary trailer; on the street; or in another type of temporary housing, your child may be able to receive help through the McKinney-Vento Act. Special Education Services

The District offers special services for children with learning, physical and emotional difficulties which interfere with their ability to learn. No discrimination against any person with a disability will be permitted in any of the programs and practices in the Wheatland-Chili Central School District. The District recognizes its responsibilities under Public Law which require it to identify and evaluate children ages 3-21 and provide access to free appropriate educational services if a child is determined to be eligible.

The Committee on Special Education and Committee on Preschool Special Education are multi-disciplinary committees which review all student referrals for special education support. Final recommendations are made to the Board of Education. An appeal procedure exists to give due process rights to parents and children. Transportation

Bus transportation is provided to all children who live in the District and attend T. J. Connor or the MS/HS. Adequate safety demands orderly behavior on school buses. Parents are urged to be sure their children understand that disorderly behavior is extremely dangerous in a moving vehicle. The bus driver has complete charge of the bus. Drivers will refer serious discipline problems to school administration for appropriate action. All District transportation policies are reviewed annually by the Board of Education and are intended to provide safe and cost effective services.

Special Transportation:

Busing is provided for students who attend non-public schools located within 15 miles of the child's home. State law requires that the parents file a written request annually with the District's Transportation Office prior to April 1. Parents must submit a request for transportation when applying for non-public school enrollment prior to the April 1 deadline, pending acceptance into the non-public school.

Requests for transportation to and/or from childcare providers must be requested by Aug. 1.

Work Permits

Work permits are issued from the MS/HS Main Office, 940 North Road, Scottsville, NY 14546 (889-6235). State Labor Laws governing the employment of minors (under age 18) require the following to issue a permit: parent/guardian's written permission for student to work, proof of age and a certificate of physical fitness.









Important Notices

Civil Rights Policy

The Wheatland-Chili Central School District does not discriminate on the basis of sex, age, race, color, national origin or handicapping condition in its educational programs, activities or employment practices. It is the policy of the Board of Education to comply with the regulations listed in Title IX of the 1972 Educational Requirements and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.

Any member of the Wheatland-Chili Central School District staff or any Wheatland-Chili Central School District pupil or parent believing themselves aggrieved because of discrimination based on sex, age, race, color, national origin, or handicapping condition should be in contact with the Office of Superintendent of Schools.

Nondiscrimination and Anti-Harassment Policy

The Board of Education affirms its commitment to nondiscrimination and recognizes its responsibility to provide an environment on school property, including school buses, and at school functions, that is free of harassment and intimidation as required by federal and state law. "School property" means in or within any building, structure, athletic playing field, playground, parking lot or land contained within the real property boundary line of a public elementary and secondary school or in or on a school bus, as defined in Vehicle and Traffic Law Section 142. "School function" means any schoolsponsored curricular or extracurricular event, activity or trip. Discrimination and harassment are a violation of law and stand in direct opposition to District policy. Therefore, the Board prohibits and condemns all forms of discrimination and harassment by employees, school volunteers students, and non-employees such as contractors and vendors as well as any third parties who are participating in, observing or otherwise engaging in activities subject to the supervision and control of the District.

Dignity for All Students Act

New York State's Dignity for All Students Act (DASA) seeks to provide the state's public elementary and secondary school students with a safe and supportive environment free from discrimination, intimidation, taunting, harassment and bullying on school property, a school bus and/ or at a school function. In addition. DASA prohibits harassment, bullying and/or discrimination that occurs off school property where such acts create or would foreseeably create a risk of substantial disruption within the school environment, where it is foreseeable that such acts might reach school property. This also includes cyberbullying, which is defined as harassment or bullying which occurs through any form of electronic communication.

DASA also requires instruction to expand the concepts of tolerance, respect for others and dignity to include: an awareness and sensitivity to harassment, bullying, discrimination and civility in the relations of people, including, but not limited to, different races, weights, national origins, ethnic groups, religions, religious practices. mental or physical abilities, sexual orientations, gender identity and sexes. In addition, curriculum includes instruction in the safe, responsible use of the I\internet and electronic communications. In accordance with the Dignity for All Students Act, the District will take necessary steps to address these matters. If you have questions/concerns, please contact vour school's principal.

Student Privacy Policy

The Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment (PPRA) to the federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents certain rights regarding District surveys, collection and use of information for marketing purposes and certain physical exams. Parents may exercise their right to excuse their child from participating in any survey created by a third party (before it is distributed to students) and questionnaires intended to collect personal information from students for marketing purposes.







Important Notices

Rights Regarding Access to Student Records

This is to advise you of your rights with respect to the school records relating to your child, or yourself (for students 18 or older) with regard to the Federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 ("FERPA").

Parents of a student under 18 or a student 18 or older (an "eligible student") have a right to inspect and review any and all official records, files and data directly related to their children or themselves. including all material that is incorporated into each student's cumulative record folder and intended for school use or to be available to parties outside the school or school system, and specifically including, but not limited to, identifying data, academic work completed, level of achievement (grades, standardized achievement test scores), attendance data, scores on standardized intelligence, aptitude and psychological tests, interest inventory results, health data, family background information, teacher or counselor ratings and observations and verified reports of serious recurrent behavior patterns.

A parent of a student under 18 years of age or an eligible student shall make a request for access to a child's or their own school records in writing to school principal (preK-5) or school counselor (6-12). Upon receipt of such request, arrangements shall be made to provide access to such records within a reasonable period of time, but in no case no more than 15 days after the request has been received.

Such parents and students are also entitled to an opportunity for a hearing to challenge the content of such records to insure that they are not inaccurate, misleading or otherwise in violation of the privacy or other rights of students and to provide an opportunity for the correction or deletion of any such inaccurate, misleading or otherwise inappropriate data contained therein. Any questions concerning the procedures to be followed in requesting such a hearing should be directed to the Superintendent of Schools.

Student records and any material contained therein which is personally identifiable are confidential and may not be released or made available to persons other than parents or eligible students without the written consent of such parents or eligible student. There are a number of exceptions to this rule, such as other school employees and officials and certain state and federal officials, who have legitimate educational need for access to such records in the course of their employment.

Release of Information to Military Recruiters

Under the No Child Left Behind Act ("NCLB"), the District (Military Recruiters' Access to Secondary School Students and Information on Students Policy #7243) is required to disclose the names, addresses and telephone numbers of high school students to military recruiters, subject to the right of parents and students over age 18 ("eligible students") to "opt out" and preclude such disclosure. Parents and eligible students who wish to "opt out" and preclude disclosure must complete an "opt out" form and return the form to the high school principal by Oct.1 of each school year. The form is included on the District website.

Limited Disclosure of Student Directory Information

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), a federal law, generally requires that the District obtain your written consent prior to disclosing personally identifiable information from your child's/your education records to persons other than those with a legitimate educational interest. The District may, however, disclose "directory information" for limited purposes without your written consent, unless you have timely advised the District of your decision to opt out of such disclosure(s) in whole or in part.

Directory information is information contained in an education record of a student that would not generally be considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if disclosed. The District defines "directory information" to include only the following:

- Name
- Address
- Telephone listing
- · Dates of attendance
- Photograph/image

- Grade level
- Participation in officially recognized activities and sports
- · Honors and awards received

In accordance with FERPA and Board Policy No. 7242, "Limited Disclosure of Student Directory Information," the District's disclosure of directory information will be limited to specific parties and specific purposes only. Specifically, the District will include directory information in certain school publications, such as the yearbook, honor roll and other recognition lists, graduation programs, sports activity sheets, and playbills showing your child's/your role in drama productions in a timely manner and without the necessity for requesting consent in situations in which it is expected that there would be no significant concern about invasion of privacy or any danger or harm from the disclosure. Unless the parent/eligible student opts out, the District will make the disclosure without obtaining consent. The District may also disclose directory information to outside organizations/ parties without a parent's/eligible student's prior written consent but only for school-related activities or purposes. Examples of such outside organizations include, but are not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings or publish yearbooks.

The District shall not disclose directory information in any situation when a risk to student safety, risk of identity theft, or other harm to student(s) is reasonably perceived.

If you do not want the District to disclose any or all of the types of information designated above as directory information from your child's/your education records without your prior written consent, you must notify the District in writing of such decision to opt out in whole or in part. Your written notice must be received by your school principal at 13 Beckwith Avenue (T. J. Connor) or 940 North Road (Middle/High School), on or before October 1. A "Notice of Objection to Release of Limited Student Directory Information" is contained on the District website at wheatlandchili.org for your convenience.


Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act Compliance


Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) is a federal law enacted in 1987 which requires all school districts to reinspect facilities for asbestos containing building materials. Our facilities have been inspected and response actions are planned to insure a continued safe environment for our students and employees. Activities include training of maintenance staff to prevent disturbance of asbestos and periodic reinspection and surveillance activities by trained personnel. Details of such activities are described in the District's AHERA Management Plan which is available for review upon request.

Pesticide Application

In accordance with New York State Education Dept. Law, public schools must provide written notification 48 hours in advance of application if required. The District implements integrated pest management; pesticides are only applied upon express authorization of the District.

The District recognizes that parents/guardians are their child's first teachers and that families and teachers working together provide the greatest opportunity to assure the success of each child.


