As we enter a new month, I am pausing to reflect on the many great things in our lives at Page High School. I am proud of our students. They work hard both at school and in our community. They seek success on a daily basis. I am proud of our teachers and counselors. They are constantly seeking better ways to educate and support our youth. I am proud of our student support staff. They work hard to ensure our school is operating smoothly for our students. I am proud of our families who raise strong and healthy young people. Thank you for your support and trust!

My reflections also cause me to think about the many goals our school set regarding increased student achievement at Page High School. We are monitoring both our students' growth and achievement. We are seeing that our time and effort is narrowing the achievement gap for our students. This is very exciting! We use an assessment called MAP growth provided by the company NWEA to track our gains three times a year. You can contact your student's English, math, and science teachers for more information. They can send home reports with your child as well. We are working on a plan to distribute this growth and achievement information throughout this school year. Stay tuned!

Because we know that daily, weekly, and monthly measures must be monitored as well, we are tracking the amount of students that are earning C's or better in all of their classes each time we run an eligibility report. Students who are earning C's or better get a longer lunch about every 3 weeks. As an AVID school, we are called to look at this information and evaluate our programs to achieve and sustain 70% of our students earning C's or better in their classes.

Lastly, we will no longer be sending 3-week progress reports to all homes by mail. We will only send home progress reports that contain D's and/or F's every 3 weeks. Most of our parents and students are now accessing PowerSchool's Portal for parents and students on a regular basis, and we also have our teachers instructing students how to check their grades weekly to keep track of their progress.

As always, I am interested in your feedback and hope you will reach out to me when you have the need.



Hello and welcome to the newest installment of interesting things I have for you. This month, I will be highlighting a key service we provide at Page High School for struggling students, and our upcoming rounds of after school programming. All of these are free with transportation provided. In addition, each can enrich student opportunities now and in the future.

Many of you may not be aware, Page High School provides after-school tutoring Mondays through Thursdays in our Library. There is no sign up or registration. No requirement or commitment. Only the desire to improve is necessary. Two of



our staff, Eileen Riordan and Dionna Dempsey, are available from 3:00 to 4:30 to assist students who need time, expertise, and a caring hand to get caught up or finish assignments. Ms. Riordan is a Special Education teacher and Ms. Dempsey runs our Online Learning Lab. Both of which provide them with experience in all subject matters and the skills needed to help struggling students. If your student is, or in the future does, receive anything lower than a C in any class, I suggest you have them take advantage of this service. Grades can be monitored by both you and your student through PowerSchool. Please do not wait for progress reports to do something.

Last Thursday we concluded the first of a few ACT Prep sessions. The



DUAL ENROLLMENT

Jump-starting college can save you time and money, help you become familiar with college-level work, and give you a chance to explore career interests. CCC offers three options for high school students to earn college credit: Concurrent Enrollment, Dual Enrollment or CAVIAT programs.

Coconino Community College (CCC), serving Coconino County in Northern Arizona, offers high school students an opportunity to earn early college credit through CCC's High School to CCC (HS2CCC) program. Dual Enrollment (DE) is a state-approved a program that allows high school students to earn college credit, giving students a seamless transition to college and preventing the duplication of coursework. Students can save money on tuition, complete a CCC degree or certificate at an accelerated pace and most credits are

transferable to Arizona universities.
