The first thing you need to be aware of are Parent/Teacher Conferences. We have two options for you to come meet with your student's teachers. The first is on Monday, October 7th from 6:00 to 8:00 and the other is on Thursday the 10th from 1:00 to 4:00. This is a half day for school.

Jump-starting college can save you time and money, help you become familiar with college-level work, and give you a chance to explore career interests. CCC offers three options for high school students to earn college credit: Concurrent Enrollment, Dual Enrollment or CAVIAT programs.

Coconino Community College (CCC), serving Coconino County in Northern Arizona, offers high school students an opportunity to earn early college credit through CCC's High School to CCC (HS2CCC) program. Dual Enrollment (DE) is a stateapproved a program that allows high school students to earn college credit, giving students a seamless transition to college and preventing the duplication of coursework. Students can

save money on tuition, complete a CCC degree or certificate at an accelerated pace and most credits are transferable to Arizona universities.

Connecting with your child



PAGE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT IMPLEMENTS THE FOLLOWING HEALTH GUIDELINES

- A student should be feeling well and be "fever free" without fever reducing medication for at least 24 hours before returning to school
- A student with strep throat must be on an antibiotic for at least 24 hours and feeling well before returning to school
- A student with possible conjunctivitis (pinkeye) must be seen by a doctor and may only return to school with a doctor's note
- A student with chicken pox may only return to school when all lesions have crusted over and there is no drainage from the lesions
- Keep your student home or you student will be sent home if he/she:
 - Has had a fever* in the past 24 hours
 - Has a fever* of 100 degrees or higher
 - Is nauseous and/or vomiting and/or has diarrhea
 - o Has vomited during the night
 - Has been exposed to a contagious disease and is exhibiting signs/symptoms of the disease
- Students who have been at home because of illness, should not be brought to school for parties and/or special events.

*A fever refers to a temperature of 100 degrees or higher without the use of Tylenol, Advil or other fever reducing medications.

Also, please remember to notify your student's school if he/she is to be absent.
