## Teacher/School Responsibilities

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Legacy's teachers provide a school experience that is conducive to learning and allows them to serve as strong role models. They are committed to being aware of student needs, communicating with you about your child's progress frequently, teaching basic and above grade-level concepts and skills to help students not just meet, but exceed, state achievement standards, motivating and encouraging students to practice academics at home, holding parent/teacher conferences twice annually, delivering the Harbor School Method's academics with fidelity, and providing materials for home to enhance literacy and other academic subjects.
