National Honor Society selects its members from academically eligible 11th and 12th grade students.

National Latin Honor Society - Societas Latina National Honora

Students who wish to become a member of the Latin Honor Society must have completed Latin I and Latin II with at least a cumulative average of 90, attained an overall average of at least a 90 as of the end of the first semester of the year in which he/she is to be inducted and attained an A average in the Latin III or IV course in which he/she is presently enrolled. If Latin III is a second semester class, then the student must mathematically be able to achieve an A at the end of the second semester first marking period. The student must be an active member in good standing of the Junior Classical League for the present school year and the student's discipline record should be free of suspension.

The Science National Honor Society recognizes excellence in scientific and intellectual thought and serves to communicate with the scientific community and to aid the civic community with its comprehension of science. It encourages students to participate in community service and, in turn, encourages a dedication to the pursuit of scientific knowledge that benefits all mankind. A member must have and maintain a 3.0 grade point average across all classes and a 3.5 GPA across all sciences and must be enrolled in at least one honors level science class during tenth or eleventh grade consecutive year. Member must maintain appropriate behavior and be recommended by one science teacher.

National Spanish Honor Society - Societas Hispanica National Honora

To become a member of the Spanish National Honor Society a student must be of at least sophomore status or be enrolled in Spanish 3, have a 3.0 overall G.P.A., have a 3.5 G.P.A in all three levels of Spanish after the first marking period for Spanish 3, demonstrate good citizenship as evidenced by extracurricular activities for leadership and/or service and demonstrate good character with no out of school suspensions for grades 9-12. A recommendation by at least two teachers must be handed in along with a completed application.

Mentors

Peer Leadership

Peer Leadership is an honors level course that sophomore students may sign up to take through their school counselor during course selection time but must be selected by a committee to become a Peer Leader for the first semester of their junior year. Juniors will be put into co-leader pairs and will be assigned a small group of 10-12 freshmen that they'll meet with during class time on an approximate 5-day rotation for 35-40 minutes. During class time on the other 4 days of that rotation, the Peer Leaders are preparing activities they'll be doing with their freshmen to meet the overall objectives of this course, which include: increase students' sense of connectedness and attachment to school, improve skills in communicating effectively with peers and adults, increase skills in help-seeking, goal setting, and decision making, support/improve students' positive school-related behavior, increase students' motivation to complete high school and post-secondary education, and improve students' preparedness for college and/or the world of work.
