Our elementary teachers are diving into the new Amplify ELA curriculum, designed to foster critical thinking, enhance reading comprehension, and engage students with high-quality texts.



September is Attendance Awareness Month. It's important for our students to be in school as much as possible throughout the school year. One of our goals is to reduce chronic absenteeism throughout the district. The VDOE defines chronic absenteeism as a student missing 10% or more school days throughout the year. This equates to 10 days of school.
