Gators establish foundation, build camaraderie in scrimmage

Last week's scrimmage against Archbishop Shaw allowed the St. Amant Gator football team an opportunity to establish the necessary foundation for success in the upcoming season. The team showed promise in their performance and displayed traits of something for fans to look forward to.

"There is a lot to build on. I think we have the foundation of a pretty good football team if we continue to improve from here on," said Head Football Coach David Oliver. While scrimmages do not count toward a team's record, they are helpful opportunities that allow football teams to assess their strengths and weaknesses. Oliver adds, "Nobody ever defends you like your own team because they see it so much, so when you get out to play a fresh opponent who is not quite as used to playing against you then you can really assess what is good and what is bad with your team." Scrimmages allow players to experience the nuance of real play time without the pressure of winning or losing a real game. New players were able to get a feel for what will become their new norm and returning players were able to get back into the groove of playing the sport.

Oliver says that every year St. Amant's football team loses "between twenty-five to and thirty-five seniors" many of which became valuable members of the team, but he thinks that "these guys are ready to step up." This year's team will need proper training, coaching and dedication to fill the shoes that last year's graduated seniors left behind. Oliver said, "every year it is kind of a challenge and is kind of difficult, and that is the fun of coaching for me." Last

week's scrimmage showed fans that the Gators are on the right track. This loss of seniors presents this year's players with an opportunity to make a name for themselves and St. Amant with the opportunity to evolve for better or for worse.

"Our defense played great. Tim Johnson made a bunch of plays in the air. Tyree Williams ran hard. There were a bunch of positives." Standout offensive performers were wide receiver Timothy Johnson and running back Tyree Williams. Johnson caught two touchdown passes, showcasing a key offensive threat. Defensive back Jarrad Brown performed well and broke up a pass near the sideline to prevent a Shaw score.

"Last year we had really good leaders and that provided a really good season for us, so I would like to carry that trait on," said senior running back Tyree Williams. The roles that these players will have to fill present the Gators not only with a chance to improve their game play but a chance to improve their camaradery.

"There are two types of education," said Oliver. "There is the type of education that you get in the classroom which teaches you how to make a living. It gives you the skills to go get a job and earn money for your family. Then there's this other type of education which is extracurricular activities, and football. I think that's the kind of education that teaches you how to live. It teaches you teamwork, it teaches you camaradery, it teaches you togetherness and I think that is critical."

The Gators will have another chance to test their might before the start of the official football season this Friday, August 30, against Assumption at The Pit for the annual Jamboree. Be sure to be dressed in your best Western attire.


Brianna Brown, a senior at St. Amant, shared her experience in Spain by saying, "During my time in Spain I've seen many cool things, but the one that really caught my eye

Chabarria says that his favorite food was the Basque country's version of tapas, called pinchos. The group was able to pick from a large spread and they got to choose between 30 different items. Porrazzo added by saying that the soup that was served was horrible, but the chicken was amazing. "I also had this dish named Paella that I really enjoyed," Porrazzo continued.

Kyle Porrazzo also points out specific highlights from the trip. He discusses how Spain has intriguing cultural differences compared to America. "Stuff was cheaper for the most part and the food quality was better. The architecture of the several places we visited were magnificent," says Porrazzo. He continues by saying that he loved the trip overall and would recommend others to take opportunities similar to this.

Chabarria also touched on the struggles about planning the trip. Trying to convince other students to get on board made things slightly difficult. Chabarria said, "I find that as the years go by, less and less people are interested in travel, especially around here." 7brew, a coffee company partnered with St Amant High, visits our school every Tuesday and gives students the opportunity to work alongside them. "It's a good resume builder, a lot of students may not have any prior job experience, JAG allows you to learn customer service and how to make coffees which is very similar to how they make it at the 7brew locations," Guidry said. "The free coffee is always nice."

JAG is not only about work, however. JAG also focuses on social aspects allowing students to learn leadership and communication skills. When asked about the social aspect of JAG, Ms. Guidry said "Everyone when they get to high school are so reserved. I was too, so I try to pull you out of your shell." She continued, "We do a lot of group activities and conversations, to help students open up in a safe environment and speak their minds." One student even said, "It's helped me be more open to new friendships and bonds."

Community service is also a crucial part of the JAG program. Ms. Guidry hosts Leap Connect events during the holidays,

the Helping Hands Closet which provides students with school supplies, hygiene products and clothes.

JAG helps students progress socially and academically, and opens them up to ideas about their future. On average, seniors in JAG are 11% more likely to graduate than the national average, with some states reaching
