Success Starts Here *

Welcome to the 2024-2025 school year! We had an amazing start to school with excellent attendance at Material Pick-up Days, Freshmen Orientation, Parent University, Fall Athletics Night, and Back to School Night. Thank you to all the families and students who got involved in those events to start the year in such a strong, positive way.

The building has a great feel to it this year, and with more than 417 incoming freshmen and over 1,807 total students enrolled, we certainly continue to be a big place. Undoubtedly, the uniqueness of each individual contributes to the power of the whole school community. There is so much to look forward to this year; every student has a place at Grant, and our improvements are increasing how students engage with their school community.

As a school community, we learn, grow, and work to improve each year. This year as a staff, we are focused on developing belonging throughout the school, and working with students through new and existing structures to foster belonging is part of that work. Student voices from forums like the Student Council's Bulldog Buzzfeed, the Superintendent's Council, and the Principal's Advisory Council will be making a concerted effort to connect students and contribute to school-wide activities.

Moreover, from an instructional perspective, it has been wonderful to see so many students taking advantage of the expanded course offerings. Our collectively developed Portrait of a Bulldog details our goals for our graduates, and our Career Pathways Guide helps students navigate their high school experience. A new tool for us this year, through our Student Services Teams, students will be introduced to the SchooLinks platform to support their college and career planning. All of these efforts are proving to be meaningful to students, as our enrollment in Lake County Technology Campus courses, Dual Credit courses, and Advanced Placement courses continue to grow again this year.

Beyond instruction, there are many physical, tangible changes happening on campus to improve our learning environment and enhance our students' experiences. As part of the District's long-standing Future Ready Pledge, another 13 instructional spaces were updated this summer with interactive projectors, device-casting technology, carpet, and flexible furniture. Additionally, with four years of physical education as a state-wide graduation requirement, and 827 students enrolled in Strength and Conditioning as their PE class, many students, as well as our Health and Wellness Department, are eagerly looking forward to the completion of the field house addition. This new area will have stations for weight and resistance training, as well as space for plyometrics and circuit training.

With so much happening at Grant, staying connected with your student is always important. We are continuing to use Skyward as our Student Information System and Schoology as our learning management platform. Parents have access to both systems, giving you access to your student's academic progress. Please see our Technology Department, for any access questions. Both systems' information provides parents with timely information and easy starting points to talk with your children about their school day.

The excitement of the new school year is palpable, and it feels great to get the year underway. Each student plays a vital role in the Grant Community, and we eagerly anticipate the unique ways in which they will capitalize on the opportunities and rise to the challenges that come their way. On behalf of the entire staff, we look forward to celebrating all the incredible achievements our students will accomplish this year!

New Superintendent Beginning 2025-2026

In May, Dr. Christy Sefcik announced her retirement to GCHS families, effective at the end of the 2024-2025 school year. We are sure this public announcement was news to our families! However, Dr. Sefcik communicated her intention to retire to the Board of Education more than four years ago, and we have had a great deal of time to contemplate the district's leadership succession plan. Those succession plans began in earnest this past December, after Dr. Sefcik formally shared her upcoming retirement with GCHS faculty and staff.

Selecting a superintendent to lead the district is our most important responsibility and one we took very seriously. After careful consideration, we are thrilled to announce that the Board of

Education has selected Dr. Jeremy Schmidt as the next Superintendent of Grant Community High School District 124. He will officially assume the role of superintendent on July 1, 2025.

Dr. Schmidt's leadership abilities, passion for education, and commitment to student success have been on display for the Board for more than a decade. With Dr. Schmidt actively participating in every Board of Education meeting during his 11 years as principal, he has distinguished himself as a leader instrumental in fostering a culture of academic excellence, innovation, and inclusivity. He brings with him a wealth of experience, valuable relationships, and a deep understanding of our school community. We are confident that Dr. Schmidt will continue to uphold the values and traditions of our district while charting a course for even greater achievements in the years to come. His proven leadership, dedication, and vision make him the ideal candidate to lead us into the future.

Upon being selected, Dr. Schmidt shared, "I am exceptionally honored to be selected as the next superintendent of District 124. Being fortunate to have been part of the Grant community since 2005, I am eager to continue working with students, parents, faculty, staff, and the larger community in this new capacity. I recognize the full significance of this responsibility, and I am committed to further developing Grant Community High School's rich history by working together to expand the opportunities we provide all students. I look forward to working alongside Dr. Sefcik over the next year to learn from her and better understand the community from the superintendent's role. Moreover, I appreciate the School Board's foresight in planning for this transition so we can continue to provide seamless leadership while moving from one superintendent to the next. I am excited to take these next steps together and thank you for your support."

As one of the many benefits of promoting internally to a qualified candidate, we are looking forward to a very smooth transition. Dr. Sefcik has more than a year to pass along the knowledge and experience she has gained as our superintendent, and Dr. Schmidt has an equal length of time to prepare to fill his current school leadership role.

This decision was also an act of financial stewardship by the Board of Education. With an ideal internal candidate fully prepared to take on this new leadership role, a costly superintendent search, estimated on average to be between \$40,000-\$100,000, was avoided.

A continuum of special education services exists through Grant Community High School. This includes the opportunity for a comprehensive case study evaluation when appropriate. Parents/guardians have the right to receive a copy of 23 III. Admin. Code Part 226 and "A Parents' Guide- The Educational Rights of Students with Disabilities."

Students with disabilities who do not qualify for an individualized education program under the federal

Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, may qualify for services under Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973 if the student (1) has a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities, (2) has a record of a physical or mental impairment, or (3) is regarded as having a physical or mental impairment.

Requests or inquiries should be directed to a student's counselor of record.

The Student Online Personal Protection Act, or SOPPA, is the data privacy law that regulates student data collection and use by schools, the Illinois State Board of Education, and District #124 vendors.

On August 23, 2019, Illinois Governor J.B. Pritzker signed into law a new version of SOPPA that gives parents/guardians greater control over student data. Among the changes is a new requirement to enact breach notifications that are available to the

public. SOPPA will also require Illinois school districts to provide additional guarantees that student data is protected when collected and that data is used for beneficial purposes only. The law is effective on July 1, 2021.

District #124 values your child's privacy and strives to ensure that parents/guardians are aware of what web-based tools and applications that are being used for educational purposes. A list of all District #124 approved web-based tools, written agreements with operators, and a list of data elements shared can be found on our D124 Data Privacy Agreements webpage.

Parents/guardians have the right to inspect, review, and correct information maintained by the school, operator, and the Illinois State Board of Education. All requests should be directed to the Director of Technology by using the following email address: soppa.request@grantbulldogs.org.

Grant Community High School is pleased to announce the selection of Mrs. Sharon Burr & Mrs. Kimberly Schnoor to the Hall of Fame.

Sharon Burr graduated from GCHS in the Class of 1971, representing a long legacy of GCHS graduates. Sharon's father, Thomas "Ray" Walk, and several of her aunts graduated from GCHS, dating back to 1935. This is where Sharon met her high school sweetheart and husband, Carl "Rick" Burr (Class of 1970). Rick and Sharon's children and grandchildren have all attended GCHS as well. Sharon encompasses all things Grant Community High School and she is known throughout the community as a lifelong resident of Fox Lake who is passionate in her support of GCHS! During her time at Grant, Mrs. Burr was involved in multiple activities including serving on the Student Council, Homecoming Court, as a student aide, and participating in cheerleading all four years, including serving as Captain of the Varsity Cheer Team. Her unwavering devotion to GCHS is what drew her back as an employee, where she served as a dedicated employee for more than 30 years. She wore many hats during her tenure and worked in several departments, before retiring from the Business Office in June 2016. For many, many years, Sharon played an integral part in planning the annual Grant Community High School Foundation Gala, supporting students in financial need. She continues to serve on the Board of Directors for the GCHS Foundation. Sharon also continues to give back to the community, donating time and resources to the Fox Lake Round Lake Area Rotary Club and to Grant Township. Her days of cheerleading may have ended when she graduated in 1971, but to this day, she is the unofficial cheerleader in the community for Grant Community High School, always positively promoting GCHS in all that they do for children and families alike.

Kimberly Carlson Schnoor graduated from GCHS in the Class of 1973. The Schnoor and Carlson families include three generations of graduates from GCHS, starting with her mother-in-law Letra McNeil Schnoor, who was the valedictorian for the Class of 1943. All have achieved success in various endeavors since their time at Grant. Just a few short years after graduation, in 1980, Kim began giving back to GCHS by serving on the Board of Education. She served as a Board member for 10 years, the Vice-President for 9 years, and as the Board President for 6 years, culminating in a total of 25 years of dedicated community service. She played an integral part in the school facility being what it is today, as the Co-Chair of the 2000 Referendum Committee and Chair of the 2008 Referendum Committee, both of which were successful under her leadership and permitted us to have school facilities that are second to none. In her profession, Mrs. Schnoor is a well-respected and successful real estate broker in the local area. She is the recipient of the Re/Max Hall of Fame Award, Re/Max Lifetime Achievement Award, National Winner of Re/Max International's Highest Honor: The Platinum Club Award, and the Miracle Agent/Donor: Children's Miracle Network Hospital. Mrs. Schnoor continues to give back to the community, by being a long-standing member of the Fox Lake Round Lake Area Rotary Club, serving as the Vice-President and President, before becoming an honorary member in 2009. She has served in a variety of leadership roles at the Joyful Spirit United Methodist Church, including Lay Leader and Member of the Administrative Council. She currently serves as a member of the Board of Directors of the Antioch Area Healthcare Accessibility Alliance, serving families in need. From 2005 to 2015, Mrs. Schnoor graciously provided the Letra (Lee) McNeil Schnoor scholarship for GCHS students. She has also been an annual participant in the GCHS Career Day. Mrs. Schnoor's service has, no doubt, had a lasting impact on many students, staff members, and families within our community.

Director of Safety & Security Joins Bulldog Family

We are pleased to announce the appointment of our new Director of Safety & Security, Brian Mullen, who joins us with a wealth of experience and a deep commitment to creating a safe and secure environment for our students, staff, and families.

Residing in Grayslake, IL, Brian brings a robust background in law enforcement and public safety to Grant Community High School. He graduated from Benedictine College in Atchison, Kansas, in 1994 with a Bachelor's degree in Sociology, and began his career in safety and security shortly thereafter.

Brian served with distinction in the Waukegan Police Department for 27 years, starting as a patrol officer and eventually rising to the rank of Deputy Chief. Throughout his career, he held various roles, including

Community Policing Officer, Detective, Detective Supervisor, Juvenile Officer, DARE Officer, Crisis Negotiator, and Patrol Commander. His extensive experience in law enforcement, particularly in working with juveniles and local school districts, makes him an invaluable asset to our community. More recently, he managed public safety for three hospitals in Northern Illinois with Advocate Healthcare, where he oversaw security operations and ensured the safety of both staff and patients.

His passion for safety and security was sparked at a high school career day, where he was inspired by two Dallas police officers to pursue a career in law enforcement. This passion has only grown over the years, driven by his desire to positively impact the lives of young people. Reflecting on his experiences, Brian shared, "I remember the adults who helped me when I was struggling as a teenager, and I wanted the opportunity to provide the same guidance they provided me. When students are engaged, a safe environment follows."

In addition to his professional qualifications, Brian has a personal connection to educational settings, having fond memories of his own high school years at Bishop Lynch High School in Dallas, Texas, where he graduated in 1990 and was part of the 1988 state championship football team. His educational philosophy, "Find value in every life experience, good or bad. Some of the most amazing accomplishments come from struggle," reflects his belief in the importance of resilience and learning through challenges.

Outside of work, Brian is an avid fan of college football and track, and enjoys supporting the Chicago Bears. He is also a proud father of fraternal twins who are freshmen in college, one at Michigan State University and the other at the University of Dayton, where his eldest daughter also graduated.

As he steps into his new role at Grant, Brian is eager to connect with the community and listen to feedback from faculty, students, parents, and visitors. His primary goal for his first year is to learn what makes Grant unique and to provide a safe learning environment for everyone. He is committed to leveraging his experience and dedication to ensure that our school remains a place where every member feels secure, valued, and able to thrive.

School Safety

Welcoming all to a safe, secure, and supportive environment is one of Grant Community High School District's ongoing goals. As part of that effort at the start of the new school year, this article is intended to communicate several safety-related matters.

- We maintain a secure campus and all visitors must report to the security station at our main entrance (door #1). At the security station, all visitors are asked to present a driver's license or valid State ID for a background screening. Visitors without appropriate ID are not allowed into the building. Visitors who successfully clear the background screening, may be granted access to the building. Visitors who do not clear the screening will be addressed by an administrator, Student Resource Officer, or other school official. This layer of security compliments other ongoing safety measures, including safety training, video surveillance, security guards, and the electronic access-controlled doors. Campus opens for student access at 7:00 AM. From 7:40 AM 3:10 PM all exterior doors are locked.
- Another important safety-related topic is "reunification." There are a number of circumstances that could cause the district to evacuate students, release students early, or release students later than the normal schedule. These circumstances may include: severe weather or flooding, power or water outage, hazardous materials, or a crisis near or at the school. In situations like these, it may be necessary for families to come pick up students in a formalized and controlled release process in coordination with the local fire department, police department and school district. This is called reunification.
- Reunification may be a time-consuming process. In the event a reunification is necessary, please be patient so that we may assure the safety of all students and staff during this controlled release process. It is our goal to reunify students with their parents as soon as it is safe to do so. Please understand that during an emergency, there may be a need to shelter students in a safe place within the school or move students to an alternative location. Multiple alternative locations have already been identified and procedures have been developed in case such a need arises. For the safety of our students, those locations will not be communicated in advance.
- If a reunification is necessary at school or in an alternative location, parents will be notified through Skylert and provided reunification instructions. For that reason, it is important that your contact information is accurate and up-to-date. Changes may be requested by you directly through Skyward or you may contact the school at (847) 587-2561.



• A Skylert emergency alert test was performed on August 14. If you did not receive a call or email, please contact the Main Office at (847) 576-2561 and share updated contact information.

If you have any questions or concerns, please contact the school.



As we enter into the 2024 Football season, please keep the following information in mind:

- All CURRENT Grant students will be admitted to games for FREE. Students must show their 2024-2025 school ID for free admission.
- Outside food and drink, backpacks, noise makers, signs, flags, and athletic equipment (balls) are not allowed.
- All students younger than a Freshman must be accompanied by an adult.
- There is no re-entry.

Students must receive two doses of the Meningococcal vaccine. The second dose must occur on or after the 16th birthday. Only one dose is required if the first dose was received at age 16 or older.

7 Back-to-School Tips for Parent & Teens

Heading back to school can be an anticipated time for teens. From shopping for that first-day outfit to organizing those new school supplies, to catching up with friends, there is a lot to be excited about. But for some teens, starting a new school year can cause stress and anxiety. The unknowns—new classes, new teachers, or even transitioning to a new school—can be intimidating and frightening. As a parent, you can help calm their anxiety. We've prepared a toolkit of back-to-school tips that can help the whole family adjust to the new school year with less stress and more excitement.

Here are seven evidence-based back-to-school tips for 2024 that will support both teens and parents.

1. Create a routine to reduce stress during the school year.

Establishing structure and routine is an essential part of back-to-school preparation. After summer vacation, it can be difficult to adjust to a schedule, particularly for teens who have been up late at night and staying in bed all day. To ease your teen in to the schedule change, start establishing structure before the first day of school. Begin shifting to earlier bed times and wakeup times to get the circadian rhythm back on track. The week before school, consider planning some early morning family activities. If your meal schedule has been topsy-turvy, get back to a more regular routine, with earlier breakfasts. Your teen may be slow to adjust, but they will thank you when that "first day" alarm goes off.

2. Help your teen develop healthy coping strategies.

Without healthy coping mechanisms, teens can let stress and anxiety get the best of them. And when anxiety takes over, teens can make poor choices, such as skipping school, acting out, or substance use. An EdWeek Research Center <u>survey</u> of more than 1000 high school students found that anxiety fell just below physical illness and bad weather as the top reason high school students missed school. Hence, it's important to let your teen know that stress and worry are a part of life, but avoidance and poor behavior are not solutions. Supplying your teen with <u>healthy</u> <u>coping strategies</u> will not only give them tools to overcome the anxiety of a new school year, but strategies they can apply to overcome future obstacles.

Healthy coping strategies to manage teen stress and anxiety:

- Find the positive in any situation
- Take a 10-minute walk outside
- Call a friend
- Journal
- Put on your favorite music playlist
- Exercise

3. Focus on the positive.

Looking at the positives of a situation can help teens feel better about any situation. While it's important to avoid toxic positivity, paying attention to the good things in life helps build resilience, according to research. In one study, people who wrote lists of things they were grateful for had higher levels of well-being. Ask your teen to share three things that went well each day during the first week of school. They may also want to talk about the not-so-good things, and that's okay. Validate what didn't go well, and encourage them to also recognize the positives.

4. Practice breathing exercises to reduce anxiety.

Using the breath is a back-to-school tip for teens that they can activate at any moment, and experience immediate positive effects. Research shows that breath awareness is one of the most effective and accessible tools for self-regulation and calming the nervous system. Breathing slowly, while we focus on each inhale and exhale, activates the

parasympathetic nervous system (the "rest and digest" or "calm and connect" system). Therefore, the sympathetic nervous system (the "fight, flight or freeze" system) takes a step back. Hence, the breath can be a powerful vehicle for carrying us through challenging emotions and situations. For teens, that might be a math test, sports practice, a music recital, a first date, or a confrontation with peers.

A Breathing Practice to Reduce School Stress

Doing this practice once a day, or whenever they feel anxious, can be a helpful back-to-school tip for kids of any age. For teens who have social anxiety that is triggered at school, it may be helpful to use conscious breathing several times throughout the day.

- 1. Sit comfortably in a chair, with your feet on the floor and hands in your lap.
- 2. Inhale slowly through the nose for a count of four, allowing the air to fill your belly.
- 3. Hold the breath in for a count of four.
- 4. Exhale slowly through the mouth for a count of four.
- 5. As you breathe, visualize a healing blue or white light washing over your body. Finally, hold the breath for a count of four.
- 6. Repeat the sequence for four minutes.
- 7. Ideally, repeat the exercise for four minutes, four times a day.
- 8. Consequently, practicing Square Breathing several times daily will help teens become calmer and more relaxed.

5. Change the way you think about stress.

Families are busy, and the school year will likely bring a new set of stressors. The question is: Can we look at stress in a new, more positive way? Stress can serve as inspiration and fuel to help us get things done. A Harvard study found that people who viewed stress as a motivation for better performance did better on tests and managed their stress better than those who tried to ignore their stress. However, it's essential to take "stress breaks"—times when you consciously relax and release tension throughout the day. One of the best back-to-school tips for parents is do these practices alongside their teens. The whole family can take a stress break together, and each individual family member can come up with their own preferred ways to de-stress.

6. Open communication with your teen is key.

During the busy school year, real communication can fall by the wayside. It's hard enough to keep each other updated on the logistics, not to mention having meaningful conversations. An ongoing, meaningful connection between kids and parents is one of the most powerful factors in supporting teen mental and physical health. When talking with your teen, it's helpful to pay attention to their nonverbal communication, as well as what they say. Sometimes they can't express in words all of the emotions that lie beneath. Pay close attention not only to the content of a conversation, but also to your teen's body language and tone. Help them feel heard, understood, and that their feelings are validated.

Process for Reporting of Sexual Assault

On-Campus Reports

If a student reports an instance of a sexual assault that occurred on campus, parents are immediately notified, as well as the police/authorities and our Students Services Team (SST). While our SST members legally cannot discuss specific details about the accusation, they work to support the student involved and address the trauma associated with the accusation. Police take on the role of notifying the advocacy center for the victim to set up an interview to protect the integrity of the investigation. In Illinois, when there is an allegation of child sexual abuse or severe physical abuse, children are referred to a local Child Advocacy Center (CAC). There, an interview is conducted in a child-friendly environment by a trained professional who knows the right questions to ask in a way that does not re-traumatize the child. If the alleged sexual assault occurred on campus or at a school-sponsored event, the District would consult and coordinate with local law enforcement. The district's own internal investigation can not interfere with an ongoing criminal investigation. If the authorities can prove misconduct took place on school grounds or at a school-sponsored event, consequences are issued at a school level and in accordance with District 124 policies and procedures. GCHS always has and will continue to adhere to all court orders and any legal rulings affecting the students involved.

Off-Campus Reports

When students report instances of sexual assault occurring off campus, the police/authorities are notified immediately, and an interview is set up with the advocacy center. In Illinois, when there is an allegation of child sexual abuse or severe physical abuse, children are referred to a local Child Advocacy Center (CAC). There, an interview is conducted in a child-friendly environment by a trained professional who knows the right questions to ask in a way that does not re-traumatize the child. When reports of sexual violence are made, our SST members are available to support students, connect students with community resources, and provide supports and options for students to consider while the criminal investigation is ongoing, including a modified school day, modified schedule, etc. All students do have equal access to public education, and all individuals are presumed innocent until proven guilty. The District will strictly adhere to court orders and any legal rulings affecting the students involved.

Additional Resources for Students

To help bridge the gap of trust and support for our students, we have a standing partnership with the Zacharias Sexual Abuse Center (ZCenter). ZCenter seeks to provide quality, comprehensive, client-centered services to survivors of sexual assault and abuse. Students needing additional support outside of SST, can reach out to their Red Team members for more information or visit zcenter.org to connect with a Zacharias member. In addition, we are always willing to change schedules, provide tutoring, set up safe routes, allow students to leave class early, etc., and to provide other support to the student while cases are pending.

Penwasciz

At Advocate Condell Medical Center

Application opens on Tuesday, September 3, 2024, for the 2024-2025 School Year!

The Penwasciz program has been an active student volunteer program at Condell Medical Center for over 60 years. The name is derived from three things a nurse always carries: a pen, watch and scissors.

It gives Juniors and Seniors in high school (who are at least 16 years old) in the Lake County area the opportunity to shadow and meet health care professionals of all backgrounds. Exposure to the different careers seen can help students better understand what a realistic day is for a health care professional.

If accepted, 32 students are placed into clinical groups that participate in weekly two-hour rotations shadowing health care personnel in nursing and support services areas within the hospital. Through direct patient interactions and observations, Penwasciz can enhance the student's hospital experience and help reinforce their desire to pursue a career in the medical field.



Eligible Applicants: Juniors and Seniors in High School who are at least 16 years old

Timeframe: Weekly from October 2024 to April 2025 Clinical rotations: Mondays 5-7 p.m. or 7-9 p.m.

Clinical areas: Students are placed on medical/surgical units and shadow health care providers in specialty areas such as obstetrics, respiratory, radiology, emergency department, cardiology and pharmacy, where they are allowed to observe procedures (with

patient permission).

Orientation: Each student attends one five-hour orientation session plus an additional four-hour session for CPR training for students who are not currently certified in CPR for health care providers.

Monthly educationals: Guest speakers discuss health care and wellness topics or roles within health care.

Graduation: We host a ceremony at the end of the program. Flu vaccination will be required. We will provide Flu vaccines at our site.


