Why attendance matters?

- Boosts Learning
- Builds friendships and social skills
- Prepares for future success

Three Key Areas Where Students Improve Academically When They Attend School:

- **Reading & Writing Skills** by exposing students to structured literacy programs, diverse reading materials, and writing tasks, enhancing vocabulary, comprehension, and communication.
- **Math Proficiency** ACPS provides systematic math instruction, building foundational skills and progressing to complex problem-solving techniques.
- **Critical Thinking & Problem Solving** through activities, discussions, and projects, challenging students to analyze information, think creatively, and solve real-world problems.

What is Chronic Absenteeism?

- **Definition:** Missing 10% or more of the academic year for any reason, including excused absences, unexcused absences, and suspension.
- **Impact:** Based on a 180-day school year, this is approximately 18 days per year or 2-3 days per month.
- **Consequences:** Chronic absenteeism harms all students because the percentage of chronically absent classmates predicts low reading and math achievement for all students.

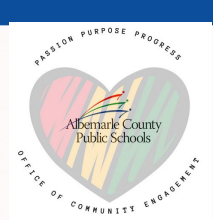


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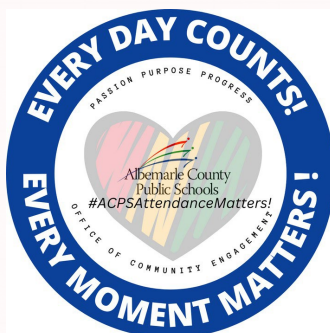


Get Ready for the 2024-2025 School Year! School will be starting soon. These tips can help your children look forward to attending school every day.



DID YOU KNOW?

- Starting in elementary school, too many absences can result in students falling behind in school.
- Being late to school can lead to poor attendance.
- Absences and tardiness can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help students catch up.
- Frequent absences can be a sign that students are bored, struggling with schoolwork, dealing with a bully, or facing some other difficulty.
- By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- By 9th grade attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th-grade test scores.
- Code of Virginia requires all school age children to be adequately immunized. ACPS requires immunization records upon school registration.



WHAT YOU CAN DO.....

- Establish a regular bedtime and morning routine.
- Prepare clothes and backpack the night before.
- Keep students healthy and make sure they have the required shots.
- Attend Open House & Back to School Events to get to know the administration, teachers, staff, and community.
- Stay informed about what is happening in your student's class/school by attending Family Academic Events (i.e. Elementary-Math, Reading, Multicultural, Content/Social Emotional Learning, and Fall & Spring Conferences).
- Know the school's attendance policy guidelines, incentives, & impacts of excessive absences.
- Have a backup plan (i.e. relative, neighbor, another parent) for transporting students to and from school.
- Schedule non-urgent medical appointments and extended trips when school is not in session.
- If your student is anxious about school, talk with teachers, school counselors, other parents, and community agencies to get advice about how to make your student feel more comfortable.
- Consult with the school nurse if you are concerned that your student may have a contagious illness.
- If your student must stay home due to illness, call the school or send a note with your student explaining the absence on their return to school.

Immunization Information for SY2024-2025:

School-required vaccines include: Dtap, Tdap, HPV, HepB, HepA, Polio, MMR, Varicella, and Meningococcal. Code of Virginia requires schools to collect student immunization records or exemption forms.
