PARENT COMMUNICATION

Our primary means of communication is via Talking Points and/or Robo Calls.

Talking Points can be received via email or by downloading the app which allow you to receive text message straight to your cellular device.

Updated Contact Information

It is important that the school can reach a parent/guardian in cases of emergency as well as safely releasing a child to an adult (other than their parent/guardian). Parents/guardians must keep the school informed of any changes to their contact information. This includes changes to all names listed in the student information as an approved adult for pick-up. It is the parent's responsibility to inform any persons listed as an emergency contact of the pick-up procedures (including proof of ID), for a student to be released to them.

Please keep a record of your child's school username and password to access class instructional materials on Schoology.

Phone Messages

Except in cases of dire emergency, messages from parent/guardian to student will be relayed during the change of classes or lunch time, not during instruction.

Cancellations/Delays

During inclement weather, please check the local news media for information regarding any District school delays or cancellations.

If there is a two-hour delay, all schools and buses will operate exactly two hours later than usual. Classes for full day kindergarten will be conducted on a delayed schedule. All field trips are cancelled on delays.

If classes are cancelled for the day, all after-school and evening activities are automatically cancelled for that day. They are not canceled when schools are on a delayed schedule.

Breakfast is not served on delayed snow days.

Communicating with Teachers

Teachers have a daily responsibility to the children in their classrooms.

Parents/guardians desiring to speak to a teacher are asked to leave a message with the main office at 412.529.4015, send message via Talking Points, or email the teacher directly. Please do not ask to be connected directly to any classroom during instructional time.

ATTENDANCE PROCEDURES

PPS Policy 204

Students are expected to be in attendance daily except due to illness or family emergency. Please keep sick children at home.

In the event a student is absent:

<u>Non-Medical Absences</u> – a written note must be received from parent/guardian within **3 days** of the student's return. Without a note, the absence will remain unexcused.

- After 3 unexcused absences a Student Attendance Conference will be scheduled with the Social Worker/Counselor.
- After 5 unexcused absences a citation for truancy will be issued.

<u>Medical Absences</u> – a medical excuse must be received from a doctor providing reason for absence, within **3 days** of the student's return. Without a medical excuse the absence will then be categorized as a non-medical absence. In this case, steps for non-medical excuses must be followed.

Tardies

Tardiness affects a student's attendance, as well as interrupting instructional time. All students who arrive at school late must receive a tardy pass from the main office. Students who arrive to school late due to their school bus/van arriving late or coming with a medical excuse from a doctor/dental appointment, will be marked as an excused tardy.

Early Dismissal Requests

Request should be sent in with your student or submitted to the main office. Parents are discouraged from making any last-minute early dismissal requests (after 3:15pm) as we cannot ensure teachers can read the final pm dismissal email.

Withdrawing a student

In the event of students moving and being enrolled in another school, a records request must be received by Minadeo from the new school. This request serves as confirmation that the student has been enrolled elsewhere, permitting the student to be removed from Minadeo's roster. Until such a request is received, the student will continue to accumulate unexcused absences. Also, if you are moving to a new district, student computers/iPad's must be turned in to the school before any records can be released to the enrolling school.

SCHOOL/ DISTRICT CALENDARS

Students will receive a copy of their homeroom schedule at the beginning of the school year. Pittsburgh Minadeo follows a six (6) day schedule. The school calendar always indicates the rotation day number on the calendar. A monthly school calendar is sent home to families. The calendar lists special activities, parent meetings, and other important information. The school calendar is also posted on the school webpage.



ACADEMICS

Curriculum

Pittsburgh Minadeo utilizes the district curriculum Open Court all ELA classes, Math curriculum (aligned with PA core standards) through Illustrative Mathematics, and Wayfinder for our Social Emotional Learning (SEL) instruction. Elementary students receive a *minimum* of 20 SEL lessons throughout the school year.

English Language Learner (ELL)

It is the policy of Pittsburgh Public Schools to provide an appropriate planned instructional program for identified students whose dominant language is not English. The purpose of the program is to increase the English language proficiency of eligible students so that they can attain academic standards and achieve academic success. The ELL program provides total English immersion for students, who receive one to three ELL classes daily, depending on their English proficiency level. ELL students are provided with the support needed to effectively adjust to American culture through an individualized, student-centered learning environment. ELL students can participate fully in general education classes as quickly as possible and in extracurricular activities.

Course Offerings

Pittsburgh Minadeo Pre- K-5, students who are eligible for special education services are supported through the Program for Students with Exceptionalities.

- An Autistic Support classroom is available for students in grades K-2 & 3-5.
- Life Skills K-2 & 3-5
- Emotional Support, grades 3-5
- Learning Support, Grades K-5
- Speech and Language services are available for eligible students in grades K-5.
- Students in grades K-5 are departmentalized.
- Art, Music, Gym, and Library are available for all students.
- Students can sign up for instrumental in grades 4 and 5.

Technology

Each student has access to individually assigned computers/iPads which are the property of PPS and are to be used for the completing of school assignments only. All devices are inspected if a teacher or administrator suspects misuse of the device. Parents are responsible for the replacement fee of \$200.00 for any device damaged or lost while in the care of their child. There is a \$25.00 fee for all Dell chargers and \$35.00 for iPad chargers that are lost. Students are responsible for bringing their charged devices to school daily with the charger.

Library & Textbooks

Parents/guardians will be responsible for covering the cost of any library or textbook that is lost or damaged while in their possession. In the event a lost book is found, a refund will be issued. (Cash or money orders only).

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

PPS POLICY 226

At Pittsburgh Minadeo Pre-K-5, we believe in the importance of academic integrity as a fundamental part of our learning community. Our administration and staff have

developed three universal expectations for all students in Grades K-5, emphasizing the core values that guide our daily interactions and learning experiences.

- 1. **Be Safe:** Ensure that your actions contribute to a safe and supportive environment where everyone can learn and grow.
- 2. **Be Respectful:** Show respect to your classmates, teachers, and yourself. This includes valuing others' work and ideas and behaving kindly towards everyone.
- 3. **Be Responsible:** Take ownership of your actions and your learning. This means doing your best, completing your work honestly, and admitting when you need help or have made a mistake.
- 4. **BE THE NICE KID!**: Always strive to be kind and helpful. Being the nice kid means treating everyone with compassion and fairness.

In our classrooms, teachers may also implement additional procedures to support these expectations, ensuring that every student understands and practices academic integrity. By adhering to these principles, we create a community where everyone can succeed and feel valued. Let's all commit to being safe, respectful, responsible, and above all, nice!

DRESS CODE

PPS POLICY 221

Students are expected to follow our school dress code policy. These expectations shall be in effect during regular school hours and at any school sponsored event whether on or off school premises. Parents will be contacted to bring a change of clothing for any student who does not meet the dress code.

Please refer to the dress code policy as follows:

- Undergarments should not be exposed at any time.
- Shirts bearing midriff are not permitted. Tops must reach the top of your pants, shorts, or skirts.
- Any clothing that promotes sexual activity, violence, use of alcohol/drugs, demeans or degrades another because of race, sex, or religious persuasion and/or national origin, handicap or disability is prohibited.
- o Hats, headbands, scarves are not permitted unless worn for religious purposes, specified school spirit days, or due to circumstances approved by principal.

ELECTRONIC DEVICES

PPS POLICY 216

Cell phones are permitted but should not be visible during the school day. Smart watches are permitted and are expected to be used appropriately. Students may not be permitted to wear smart watches if they are texting, making calls, or causing a classroom/school disruption.

Cellphones found during the day will be confiscated and turned into the main office for parent pick-up.

Repeated violations will result in further disciplinary action and students may not be permitted to carry their electronic device during the school day.

EXTRA CURRICULAR OFFERINGS

PPS Policy 119

There are several technology programs, a computer lab, computers, and iPads that provide additional media for student learning. All students in grades K-5 are scheduled for physical education, art, and music. Students are also scheduled with the librarian weekly for book circulation. The choral and instrumental music students prepare annual winter and spring concerts. In grade 3, each student is exposed to 9 new instruments. This is a great opportunity to decide if they would like to join the instrumental program in 4th or 5th grade.

Many programs at Minadeo support academic achievement, as well as development of the whole child.

Our students can also participate an annual talent show, play intramural basketball, and train for the Pittsburgh Kids Marathon. Minadeo has partnerships with community

organizations such as Center of Life, The Pittsburgh Chess Club, Squirrel Hill Urban Coalition, Oasis Tutors, and many local universities to provide additional opportunities for meeting the needs of a diverse student population. We partner with MEDP to provide families with before- school care and after- school care until 6:00 P.M.

Field Trips

Field trips provide cultural, social, and educational enrichment for students; however, they can involve risks that are different from a regular school day. For this reason, we sometimes request parental attendance and/or students may be required to meet safety, behavioral, and academic criteria.

GRADING

PPS Policy 209

At Pittsburgh Minadeo Elementary, we believe that a clear and fair grading system is essential for helping our students achieve their personal educational goals. Our grading policy is designed to provide valuable insights into your child's progress, allowing teachers, students, and parents to work together effectively.

We know that a strong partnership between home and school is vital for your child's growth and success. That's why we are committed to keeping you informed about your child's well-being and academic performance. Our grading system follows state and federal guidelines to ensure accurate and consistent record-keeping.

By staying connected and working together, we can make sure that every child at Pittsburgh Minadeo receives the support and encouragement they need to thrive.

HOMEWORK PROCEDURES

PPS Policy 115

At Pittsburgh Minadeo, home learning is an essential foundation for a solid education. Regular homework is important since it gives students the opportunity to practice skills and apply the information learned in class. It also helps students to become competent and independent in their learning which will support good study habits throughout the lifetime and develop their independent cognitive skills. Homework will be carefully planned by teachers and have direct meaning to the students.

Homework will be assigned Monday through Thursday each week. Please refer to the specific grade- level time targets below and teacher communication regarding homework expectations.

Kindergarten - Grade 2: up to 20 minutes of homework per night **Grade 3 - Grade 5:** up to 35 minutes of homework per night

HEALTH SERVICES

PPS Policy 206

We are pleased to inform you that Minadeo Elementary School is equipped with a full-time nurse, Nurse Botley, who is dedicated to the health and well-being of our students. Our health protocols and procedures are established by the district to ensure a safe and healthy environment for everyone. Please note that there may be instances where a nurse may not be available for the full school day. On those occasions, we utilize our First Aid Kits as appropriate and contact parents/guardians regarding this.

We strongly encourage parents to keep their child's immunization and health records up to date. All health-related communication should be directed to Nurse Botley to ensure that we have the most accurate and current information for your child.

Please note that students and staff are not permitted to carry or self-administer medication. If your child requires medication during school hours, it must be coordinated through our nurse.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY/ACCEPTABLE USE POLICY

Pittsburgh Public Schools Office of Information Technology Acceptable Use Form

At Minadeo Elementary School, we are committed to integrating technology into our curriculum to enhance learning and prepare students for the digital world. We follow the district's acceptable use policy to ensure that all technology is used responsibly and safely.

Students are encouraged to use technology as a tool for learning, creativity, and collaboration. They are expected to adhere to guidelines that promote respectful, ethical, and safe use of digital resources. This includes not sharing personal information, respecting the privacy of others, and using devices and internet access only for educational purposes. When assigned to a virtual learning day, students will be expected to log on DAILY to engage in learning from 9:10 AM – 3:55 PM. Attendance is taken by subject and/or period during Virtual Learning Days.

Each student has access to individually assigned computers/iPads which are the property of PPS and are to be used for the completing of school assignments only. All devices are inspected if a teacher or administrator suspects misuse of the device. Parents are responsible for the replacement fee of \$200.00 for any device damaged or lost while in the care of their child. There is a \$25.00 fee for all Dell chargers and \$35.00 for iPad chargers that are lost. Students are responsible for bringing their charged devices to school daily with the charger.

Parents, please review the district's acceptable use policy with your child and reinforce the importance of responsible technology use. If you have any questions or need further information, feel free to contact our school office. Together, we can ensure a positive and productive digital learning environment for all our students.

STUDENT EXPECTATIONS/PROCEDURES

PPS Code of Conduct

At Minadeo Elementary School, we are committed to fostering a culture of high support and high expectations for our students both on and off school grounds, including districtprovided transportation. Bus safety is a top priority for us, and we emphasize the importance of responsible behavior while traveling to and from school.

Our approach to student behavior and discipline is guided by the district code of conduct, which informs how behavior is labeled and addressed. We manage discipline directly at the school level, employing a progressive discipline approach when appropriate. This ensures that students are held accountable for their actions, with consequences issued as necessary. Depending on the nature and frequency of referrals, bus suspensions may be issued to maintain the safety and well-being of all students.

Our goal is to create a supportive and structured environment where every student can succeed. Thank you for partnering with us to uphold these standards and maintain a safe and respectful community at Minadeo.

Valuables/Toys

Students are to leave all valuables, large sums of money and toys at home. In the event these items are found on students upon arrival at school, they will be taken and returned only to a parent/guardian. Items that are not retrieved from the lost and found will be discarded at the year's end. Students are responsible for the private property that they bring to school. Although we will assist in locating any reported lost or stolen item, Pittsburgh Minadeo will not be responsible for replacing any lost or stolen items.

Positive Behavior Incentive System

Pittsburgh Minadeo utilizes a Positive Behavioral Intervention System (PBIS) to recognize positive student behavior. The goal of our PBIS Program is to create a learning environment where students can learn and grow. The PBIS behavior matrix is uploaded on the school website. Classroom-based and school-wide monthly incentives are planned to celebrate our students achieving positive behavior goals. We manage our rewards program through PBIS Rewards.

Every month students learn about a character trait to support our PBIS. Students are recognized monthly for demonstrating positive student behavior through the Minadeo Student of the Month Program. Students will also be recognized for other areas of holistic achievement during these programs. Parents will receive notification and are welcome to attend these ceremonies

Restorative Practices

All students engage in formal and informal processes of Restorative Practices.

Outside Expectations

To ensure the safety of all, students are expected to practice respectable behaviors walking to/from school, and during recess. During weather conditions that include rain

or snow, students are asked to refrain from horseplay such as hitting students with umbrellas, picking up snow for ANY reason, etc.

VISITOR POLICY

PPS Policy 1104

To ensure a safe and productive learning environment for all students, we ask that all visitors adhere to our school policy. Visitors to the building must follow building and district safety guidelines. All visitors must report to the front of the building and ring the bell to the left of the stairs. Once your appointment or purpose for visit is confirmed by our clerical staff, our school security guard will check you into the building. All visitors

must proceed through the metal detectors, keep their visitor's badge visible, and wait in the main foyer to be escorted to their meeting location.

In the event of a full lockdown, all exterior doors and windows will be locked, keeping all staff, students, and any visitors inside the building until cleared by School Police. No entry or exit will be permitted, except approved by emergency/administrative crisis teams. Any visitors inside of the building during a Full Lockdown must follow the direction of our School Safety Team, failure to do so puts everyone's safety at risk and may result in loss of any/all visiting privileges to our building.

We encourage parents to volunteer within the school and classroom. Opportunities will be communicated and links for sign-ups will be provided. To ensure the safety and well-being of our students, all volunteers must have up-to-date clearances on file with the main office before participating in any school activities. ADDITIONAL SCHOOL INFORMATION

Our school day begins at 9:10 am and ends at 3:55 pm.

Arrival Procedures

Walkers and bus students enter the school through the main entrance. Doors open for breakfast at 8:55 AM and students proceed to the cafeteria to eat and then transition to the auditorium. Homeroom teachers will meet their students in the auditorium.

To encourage a sense of early independence and a building of self-esteem, we ask parents to permit their children to enter the building on their own. To maintain a safe

school environment, parents are not permitted to walk students beyond the entrance unless a meeting has been scheduled.

If a student demonstrates the need for additional support walking to class, a staff member will be assigned to escort them to their classroom.

Students must report by 9:15 AM. If they arrive after the report time, they will be marked tardy for the day.

Dismissal Procedures

Walkers and bus students will be dismissed by teachers at the main doorway. Car riders will be picked up near the auditorium doors in the playground area.

All parents who are picking up students should wait at the designated area to decrease congestion, allow visibility, and ensure a safe orderly dismissal of our students. We ask that once you receive your child that you transition out to allow others to connect with their children who have not been dismissed.

Any changes to your <u>child's dismissal plan</u> should be communicated via early dismissal link, main office staff, your child's teacher, and any other caretaker who normally receives your child after school.

Transportation

Walker and Bus assignments are determined by our district's Transportation department. A letter with individual student transportation information is mailed directly from that department. All requests for changes in transportation must be submitted directly to our Transportation Department for approval. Changes cannot be made at the school level. Additional information can be found at www.pghschools.org/transportation.

Students will only be picked up and dropped off at bus stops approved by the B.O.E. and must only ride the bus to which they are assigned. In order to continue to receive transportation privileges, students are expected to display communicated appropriate behavior at all times, including remaining in seats assigned to them.

must be approved via the district's office of transportation
