



At Home

School Goals

In the 2024–2025 school year, Krisle Elementary School will increase the percentage of students scoring "Met" or "Exceeded" in ELA and Math for all students and in each of the accountability subgroups, resulting in the achievement of school Success Rate AMOs. Particularly, the percentage of third grade students who score "Met" or "Proficient" on ELA TCAP will increase from 27.8% to 32.29%. By supporting students physically, socially, emotionally, behaviorally, and culturally, Krisle Elementary School will increase the amount of time that students are receiving high-quality, classroom instruction by decreasing chronic absenteeism by 5% and reducing student incidents, including assignments of in-school and out-of-school suspension, in PowerSchool by 5%. Krisle Elementary School will retain 95% of teachers for the upcoming 2025-2026 school year.

District Goals

-In the 2024-2025 school year, Robertson County Schools will increase the percentage of students scoring "Met" or "Exceeded" in ELA and Math for all students and in each of the accountability subgroups, resulting in the achievement of district Success Rate AMOs. Particularly, the percentage of third grade students who score "Met" or "Proficient" on ELA TCAP will increase from 30.3% to 34.8%. -Robertson County Schools will meet or exceed the growth standard in reading and math for all students and for those in each of the accountability subgroups. -The goal for 2024 - 2025 is to reduce that percentage to 21 percent of K-2 students scoring below the 25th percentile in reading (composite) and 14 percent of K-2 students below the 25th percentile in math. By supporting students physically, socially, emotionally, behaviorally, and culturally, Robertson County Schools will increase the amount of time that students are receiving high-quality, classroom instruction by decreasing chronic absenteeism by 5% and reducing student incidents, including assignments of in-school suspension, in PowerSchool by 5%.
