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The Gators dominate Mustangs in annual Jamboree

This past Friday the Gators led the game through their amazing defense and collaboration skills which contributed towards their 28-0 victory against Assumption High. Quarterback Cooper Babin said “We had a lot of fun tonight, played all as one to get the win. We played smart and just had a lot of fun overall.”

Head Coach David Oliver says that

he believes the team is forming a level of unity as the season progresses. Oliver said, “This was the first time we had a live kick off and I was pleased with that aspect of the game.” The game kicked off with the Gator’s defense forcing a fumble, which allowed the Gators to gain possession of the ball. Shortly after three plays, senior running back, Tyree Williams, was able to run in a one yard touchdown putting the

Gators in the lead.

Halfway through the first quarter, Cooper Babin threw the ball to wide receiver Timothy Johnson, in result Johnson successfully gained a 33 yard touchdown within 12 seconds of gametime. Mustangs kicked off the next play, but the Gators caused the Mustangs to fumble the ball, changing the possession of the ball again. Tyree Williams further showed control by achieving a 19 yard touchdown, this being his second touchdown of the night. At the end of the game, Williams expresses how everyone contributed to him scoring the touchdowns. Tyree Williams said, “I felt really good. I had my team there to help support me.”

Over the next couple of plays, Gators managed to keep the Mustangs from scoring. The Gators were also able to keep progressing across the field towards the endzone until the quarter ended leaving the score 21-0.

Second quarter started with Connor Darr running 31 yards towards the end zone. Darr followed by running an additional 17 yards, making him a notable player for running the most yards. Darr talked about how accomplishments like these, “will motivate me to keep working day in and day out of practice. I really want to make my senior year something to remember.” Cooper Babin was then able to score a six yard touchdown by running the left side, putting

the Gators at their final score of 28-0. The game continued as players kept running the ball to drain the clock, successfully ending the game.

St. Amant’s sports medicine team now has a new head athletic trainer, Bryan Hutson. He currently teaches sports medicine 1 and a section of sports medicine 3. Sports med keeps our athletes safe and teaches students how to make a difference in the world by taking action and helping people.

“I’ve always had a desire to help people,” said Hutson. Sports med’s strong relationship with the athletic department gives St. Amant’s medical professionals and students the opportunity to help individuals with injuries, illness and more in real time.

“When I was a junior in highschool, I was injured and hurt my back. My school at the time didn't have a sports medicine program or an athletic trainer for me to go talk to, so I was on my own,” said Hutson. As someone who played sports in highschool, Hutson knows what it is like to suffer from a serious injury. Hutson added, “Once I got into college, and I looked back on that, I felt it would be really good if I would have had somebody to go to at school, that I could talk to about this, that could have sped up the process or helped me out along the way.” This program provides injured students with support that will be there for them till the moment they can get back on the field. “It is a challenge each and every day, but it is very rewarding whenever you can see the athletes that you work with have an opportunity to succeed when they didn't think they were gonna be able to a few days before,” said Hutson.

“Not everybody that takes the class is going to go into sports medicine, but it gives them a good base knowledge into a wide array of sports medicine fields, and maybe opens up doors for them,” said Hutson. Some of the many professions that fall under sports medicine are athletic trainers, physicians, nurses, and physical therapists. In some instances psychology is involved in sports med.

Hutson concludes, “If you're looking to get into a field that is going to test you on a variety of ways from time management, to stress control ,to putting your brain to work, and in the rare instance, not to scare anyone off but, very rarely a life or death situation. Sports medicine is a great route, a great avenue to get into.”

Suicide Prevention Month at STA

September is National Suicide Prevention Month, and as more teenagers seem to show signs of depression and anxiety, it's important to know how to deal with these symptoms and who to talk to.

Symptoms of depression or anxiety can be pronounced such as being easily agitated, weepy, or mooney, but some can present more subtly. Some things to look out for include a loss of interest in activities, changes in physical hygiene such as unkempt hair or teeth, or missing school. Masking, or hiding depressive symptoms is common, and even more common among men. Nearly one in 10 men experience depression or anxiety, but less than half will receive treatment, and more than four times as many men as women die by suicide every year. "Even though society has hopefully progressed beyond the stereotype of 'boys don't cry' they (men) do tend to kinda suck it up, and some might withdrawal or may not know how to handle their feelings," Said Geraldine Couvillion, a counselor at St Amant High School,

not,

goes through a bit of a depressive episode... it doesn't mean you're weak it doesn't mean you suck at life because you couldn't push through whatever it is that took you down."

Over the last decade, social media has become a part of almost every high school student's life. But what about its negative impacts? "People tend to just put the good stuff there... Nobody has a filter and will write anything," Said Couvillion, "Manage expectations about what's out there, you don't have to obtain what looks to be the perfect high school experience or perfect family vacation or relationship"

Academic stress can also become a problem if allowed to. To combat this, Ms. Couvillion suggests "Push yourself, but know your limits." Couvillion advises to look for a cause regarding your academics, such as parental pressure or unrealistic expectations for yourself.

Every Tuesday morning, the Gay-Straight Alliance (GSA) meets in room 120 in the Freshman Academy to discuss subjects of sexuality and gender identity. The club attempts to create an outlet for students to freely express themselves in a world where judgment and ridicule are rampant.

The club is run by Teacher Brianne Baggett and co run by seniors Gabriel "Fresno" Swindle and Addison Nunez-Francis . "I was first introduced to it by Mrs. Baggett in class. She was giving out little flyers to see if we wanted to join, so I went to my first meeting and just felt very welcomed and decided this is a place I like to stay," said Nunez-Francis when asked about their first experience in GSA. Similarly, Swindle said that he, "was a queer person who wanted to find community," which was the primary reason he joined GSA.

The club has many goals for the new school year. While most of them plan on getting more involved with the community, the club also wishes that more members would join. "It really is a matter of who is looking forward to attending. I hope we can put more of ourselves out there like through student led flyers and little shows and stuff." Nunez-Francis stated, "Like (in the) newspaper or on GNN, just getting the word out more to get people who haven't heard of it or are too afraid to join to actually come and visit." Along with this, the club wishes to visit and/or donate to other organizations that deal with LGBTQIA+ interests in the parish.

Another outlet that the club offers is the GSA Book Club, helmed mainly by Swindle. "It has no affiliation with the (library) book club." Swindle stated, "We come together and we read queer literature inexplicitly. It's just a place for us to see ourselves in literature where oftentimes in our curricula we are not allowed to see these things or we just don't have the time to focus on them."

While the more seasoned members prepare for a new year. newer members expressed their enthusiasm for the meetings. "I'm excited to talk about the LGBTQ+ people who impacted history and culture." stated Sophomore Marie "Nox" Green. Likewise. sophomore Aubrey Bourgeois commented. "I'm so impatient for the upcoming meetings and learning about LGBTQ+ history and meeting new people!"

One thing that club members emphasized was their desire to make the club a safe place for queer people who are afraid of judgment from their peers. "We will create an environment where only we know what you wish us to know, and it will only be discussed where you wish it to be discussed. We want everyone to be as comfortable as possible in GSA and we want you to be surrounded by like-minded queer people," Swindle
