All students are provided with a comprehensive program that meets their academic, career, and personal/social needs. Below are just a few of the ways we work with our students and you:

- Providing individual & small group counseling
- Connecting students with resources to support their personal/social needs
- Teaching classroom school counseling units focusing on exploring careers & postsecondary opportunities
- · Helping students develop four year plans
- · Assisting students with course selection
- Guiding students through the college application process from initial research to submission of applications
- Providing information & interpretation of testing (SAT, ACT, ASVAB, Keystone)

The school's Wellness Council works to reduce the stigma associated with mental health & substance use disorders through school-wide programming. College in High School Offerings

Students now have the opportunity to earn college credit while receiving a grade on a college/university transcript upon successful completion of applicable courses. Students enrolling in the CHS courses will be required to pay a fee to the college/university for each course. Additionally, students may elect to take these courses without earning college credit. Fox Chapel Area High School currently has concurrent enrollment agreements with the University of Pittsburgh, Duquesne University and Seton Hill University. College in High School credits are available in the following courses: Argument, Accounting II, AP Government and Political Science; Business Calculus; AP Statistics; AP Calculus AB; Precalculus; Precalculus Accelerated; Calculus; Linear Algebra; French III, IV, and V; and German III and IV.

The course instructors will provide the students with registration information.

12TH GRADE POST-SECONDARY PLANNING



The School Counselors will meet with all seniors September 6-7 to instruct and meet with students for post-secondary planning. Whether a student is planning for a 4 or 2 year college/university, technical school, the military, or employment, we focus on planning and preparing for life after high school for each student.

A portion of our unit with the seniors is focused on using Naviance Student to process college applications. Students learn how to link their Common Application account to Naviance; how to request counselor and teacher recommendations; and how to submit the transcript release form.

Students are encouraged to schedule follow-up meetings with their counselor as needed for assistance with the application process.

CAREER SPEAKER SERIES

The career speaker series is back for another year! Any student interested in hearing the speakers and learning more about their careers is welcome to attend.

For the high school graduation project, all students must explore careers and be prepared for life after high school by completing 8 activities. Every 9th grade student must attend one career speaker and complete a reflection towards the career project requirements.

Coming Friday 9/20 during a Career QRT:

Gene Natali, Certified Financial Planner & FC grad!: Mr Natali is an award winning author that's presented in over 500 high school and college classroom settings. He is a CFA that attended Allegheny College and Carnegie Mellon University. He's also a board member for the CFA Society Pittsburgh and is a part-time lecturer at the University of Pittsburgh.

Tiffany Schachner, Certified Prosthetist Orthotist: Orthotists work with patients that need medical devices, like braces and splints, to provide support to a body part. Prosthetists work with patients who need artificial limbs or other body parts; they customize the fit of their patients' medical devices to support individual needs.

FCAHS OPEN HOUSE FINANCIAL AID PRESESSION

The Fox Chapel Area High School Counseling Office once again partnered with PHEAA to host a Financial Aid PreSession on *Thursday, September 5th at 6:00pm in the LGI*. The presentation



focused on higher education costs, aid availability, the FAFSA application, the value of scholarships, and major changes with the FAFSA. Information from the presentation as well as resources will be emailed to all seniors and their families after the presentation. The information is also available on Schoology.

SENIOR SAT TESTING DAY: WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 9th

The SAT will be offered on Wednesday, October 9th to SENIOR students who register before Tuesday, September 3, 2024. Registration forms are available on Schoology and in the School Counseling office. The SAT cost is \$60. Submit your registration and payment to the School Counseling Office.

Reminder: Seniors who registered to take the in school senior SAT should report to their testing room with two number 2 pencils, an approved calculator, and a drink/snack for breaks. More information will be sent directly to seniors taking the test prior to the test day.

PSAT/NMSQT - OCTOBER 9, 2024




All 9th-11th graders will take the PSAT during the half day. No registration is required.

The PSAT/NMSQT is digital! The test is easier to take, shorter, has more time per question, and comes with a built-in calculator! All students will use school issued laptops for the test.

The PSAT won't count towards college admissions, but it is the qualifying test for the National Merit Scholarship for juniors. The PSAT is a great primer for the SAT and even the ACT. The test is 2 hours in length (not counting breaks) and is divided into math and evidence-based reading & writing modules. All 11th graders are automatically entered into the 2024 National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the PSAT and meeting other entry requirements (outlined in Student Guides). All students will receive a PSAT/NMSQT Guide via email and it will be posted on Schoology. The guide provides practice tests and detailed instruction about test day. More information regarding testing rooms and what materials will be required will be shared with students closer to the testing date. AP EXAM INFORMATION:

If you are currently enrolled in an Advanced Placement (AP) course during the first semester and/or a year long AP course and wish to take the AP exam in May of

2025, **you must register and pay by November 1, 2024**. Please download the AP Order Form in Schoology (See Ms. DeComo's post), see your AP teacher or get a form at the School Counseling office. You will submit your order form and payment to the School Counseling Office.



SCHOLARSHIPS:

Our office posts scholarship information through **Schoology** and students can search for local and national scholarships through **Naviance**! Once students are logged in to Naviance, they will simply click on the 'College' tab. Then scroll down and click on the 'Scholarship List' and then select "Local and Regional

Scholarships" for local and private scholarships. Select 'National Scholarship List' for a national scholarship search through Sallie Mae.

COLLEGE & UNIVERSITY VISITS:

The FCAHS Counseling Dept. hosts a plethora of college and university representatives visits for interested 10th -12th graders. These visits are a great opportunity to learn more about schools of interest— everything from unique programs to application requirements and how one's application will be reviewed.
