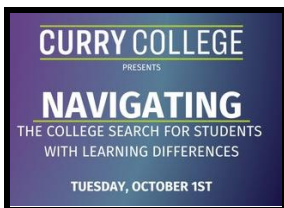
Fire & EMS Explorer Post 343 Program - For 14-18 Year Olds



The MMR Hose Company, Fire & EMS Explorer Post 343 program, hosted by the Rochester, Marion, and Mattapoissett Fire Department's, is for youth between ages of 14-18 that are enrolled in high school that may have an interest in becoming a first responder. The program runs from September through June as a normal fire academy class would be held and is very low cost to parents or guardians. The program has graduated approximately 50 youth in the last 7 years, 10 of those have either become certified firefighters or gained a certification as an emergency medical technician. This program is not only beneficial for youth

interested in being a first responder, but any youth that wants to be part of a team environment, one that is willing to step out of their comfort zone in a controlled and safe environment, and one that is looking to experience something that not many of their peers have. Fee Waiver Quick Facts

If you qualify for a fee waiver, you'll get free SAT tests, reduced AP test costs, and several other benefits to help you apply for college. **One way to know if you qualify is if you are enrolled or eligible to participate in the federal Free or Reduced Price Lunch Program.** Here are some of the benefits that students with fee waivers may access through CollegeBoard and the Common App:

- Reduced cost for AP exams
- Free SAT Tests and Feedback: 2 Free SAT tests, 2 chances to access answer services
- Free College Benefits
 - Unlimited score reports to send to colleges
 - Waived application fees at [participating colleges](#)
 - Free CSS Profile™ applications to apply for financial aid from participating schools
- Other Benefits
 - No late registration fees for free tests (if you're in the U.S. or U.S. territories)
 - No cancellation fees (upon cancellation, your unused fee waiver benefits will be returned to you)
 - Fee reductions for [score verification reports](#)

To Apply for the Free Reduced Lunch Program

All schools participate in the National School Lunch Program, offering free or reduced-price meals to students who meet the state and federal income guidelines. Although all students will receive free school meals, if you believe your family meets the federal income guidelines, we encourage you to complete the meal application online at <https://linqconnect.com/public/meal-application/new>. Only one application is necessary per family. If you received free or reduced-price lunches last year, you must complete a new application each school year.

Attention Sophomores and Juniors - Register for the PSAT by 9/12



PSATs are offered to 10th and 11th grade students and will be held on **Saturday, October 12th**. Any student who is interested in registering to test should see Ms. Bichsel in guidance by **September 12th**. PSATs will cost \$25 per student and payment can be made as cash or check, payable to Old Rochester Regional High School. Please see your guidance counselor with any questions!

Students who will be taking the PSAT should report to the high school by **7:30 am on October 12th** with a **charged chromebook** and a **pen & pencil** (for scrap paper). As a reminder, all PSATs are digital this year.

Students taking the PSAT will have a BlueBook App Practice test during Bulldog Block on October 8th (Sophomores) & October 9th (Juniors). Students will be added to these Bulldog Block sessions by guidance.

Students must use a school issued device to test and should have their device with them during the Bluebook App Practice. Any student who needs a school issued device should let Mrs. Millette know ASAP.

Information for AP Students

Attention all AP students, create your CollegeBoard account and join your AP Google Classrooms if you haven't already! If you need help with your log on, please contact Mrs. Millette.

Guidance is now collecting the \$40 per exam non-refundable down payment for your Advanced Placement Exam(s). The deadline to make your deposit is **Friday, November 1st**. Payments of cash or check (made payable to ORRHS) will be accepted in the guidance office. If you miss this deadline, an additional \$40 per exam late fee will be added to your exam cost. The full cost per exam is \$99 with the exception of Seminar and Research, which is \$147 per exam. If you qualify for Free or Reduced lunch and would like to apply for a waiver, you must contact Guidance prior to Friday, November 1st, for approval. Students that are approved to receive a waiver will be responsible for a payment of \$50 per exam, with \$15 due by November 1st to avoid the \$40 per exam late fee. SAT Information

Are you planning on taking the SAT? Here are some important deadlines to remember:

- **Sept 20th** is the deadline to register for the **Oct 5th** test
- **Oct 18th** is the deadline to register for the **Nov 2nd** test
- **Nov 22nd** is the deadline to register for the **Dec 7th** test
