Dear Families and Staff:

One week is completed – and I am learning. I was in nearly every classroom the last three days. In case your students are not sharing what they learned this week, let me pass on what I heard and saw. **I learned...**

- About teachers already knowing their students' names.
- About describing oneself in words and pictures—as a way to build connections with new and old classmates.
- About setting academic, personal, athletic, artistic and social goals.
- About speaking in an emerging World Language to describe one's summer
- About learning the syllables in classmates' names by stomping out each syllable (one class tried "Dr. McKersie" you try it).
- About discerning the author's craft by comparing a classic children's book with more complex literature.
- About an express review of Algebra I to be ready for the dive into Algebra II.
- About the geometry fundamental to coding.
- About "truth, the perception of truth, and the actions on those perceptions" being essential to understanding history.
- About thoughtful comparative political analysis and discussions.
- About science experiments showing what happens when particles collide, with good doses of oxygen.

- About music teachers hearing students' favorite composers, pieces and performers—fostering connections.

- About HES and FMS students knowing that mobile devices are not permitted, and HHS students being reminded that they are to be "pouched" during class, with the plan to have HHS student leaders work with Mr. Clayman and Ms. Hardesty on healthy approaches to phones beyond class.
- About coaches working diligently with scholar athletes to be ready for the fall season (besides observing several practices, I took in a Cross-Country Meet and a Girls Varsity Soccer Game).
- About finding one's way through a new building, its myriad hallways, with lots
 of help from students and staff.
- About classroom and school rules, procedures and plans.
- About safety and security being well attended to—by teachers, security personnel and administrators.
- And, most important and present at each step I took this week, about teachers, staff and administrators greeting and guiding students, with smiles, laughter and, yes, necessary firmness.

Not an all-inclusive list, for sure, but I challenge you to use it to see what your students might add.

Hillside Unveils New Mural

Courtney Dickens, a teacher's aide at Hillside, put her artistic talents to the test when she was tasked with creating the new mural that welcomes students, families, and staff to Hillside Elementary.

The Hillside Building Leadership Team (BLT), made up of teachers, students, parents and administrators, dreamed about a mural that would represent Hillside. "We wanted the mural to show why Hillside is so special- the beauty of our location in Hastings, the inclusivity of our school community, the diversity of learning experiences for our students, and the joy and wonder of childhood. The goal was to create a mural that truly welcomed everyone," said Amy Cazes, principal of Hillside.

The BLT surveyed students, staff, and families to find out what should be included in the mural, working together to collect this information. The ideas were then shared with local muralists who sketched their proposals for the team. Ultimately, Hillside's very own Ms. Dickens was selected as the artist who would best bring the Hillside community's vision to life.

Ms. Dickens used her own version of a grid system to create the colorful image. "I put up different shapes and marks on the space, took a photo of it, then overlaid it on the sketch," she said.

Each shape slowly turned into an image that holds a special meaning to the Hillside community. A yellow jacket sits slightly off center greeting everyone as they enter the building. The words respect, courage, and curiosity are highlighted through a magnifying glass emphasizing the core values of the school.

The mural took approximately two weeks to complete. "10 days of painting,13 days including prep time and mapping," said Ms. Dickens.

Students on the BLT celebrated the mural over the loudspeaker on Thursday morning. Their proud words echoed through the school, "Stop by the entry mural and notice all of the wonderful learning that happens at Hillside. You might even find our Blue Ribbon! Thank you to Ms. Dickens for her hard work and for sharing her talents

with us!"
