Support for Multilingual Learners

Students who interact in a language other than English at home will be screened by the Bilingual Resource Teachers [BRTs] to determine if they need support in learning academic English. You will receive a notification of services if your student qualifies. BRTs consult with classroom teachers, and, based on need, may directly support multilingual students identified as English learners in their academic language development, and content learning through different strategies. BRTs also provide support to teachers who have multilingual students in their classrooms.

Students receiving multilingual services take the ACCESS for ELLs test every winter. This annual test measures each multilingual student's level of academic English and is taken until the student meets the criteria to no longer qualify for multilingual learner services. Please reach out to your school's BRT with any questions about services and the ACCESS test.

Support for Students with Individualized Education Plans (IEPs)

In August, you can expect to hear from your child's special education teacher. They will communicate with you throughout the school year per the frequency outlined in your child's IEP. The special education teacher and classroom teacher will be your main points of contact in regards to your child's education and can be reached via electronic communication, phone call, or in-person meeting. We focus on meeting the individual needs of all students and are dedicated to creating an inclusive and supportive learning environment through partnership between families and educators. Our goal is to foster independence and prepare students to thrive in a diverse global society.

If a family has educational concerns about their child who does not currently have an IEP, we have systems in place to support your child's transition to kindergarten and monitor your child's progress as the school year begins. That process will involve a partnership between you, your child's classroom teacher, and other school staff.

Social Emotional Learning (SEL) & Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS)

Students will engage in social-emotional learning through weekly <u>Second Step</u> lessons. This program helps VASD build a positive, inclusive culture through developing social-emotional competencies, including perspective taking, empathy, processing emotions, understanding and resolving conflicts, and building positive relationships. Students will also participate in Second Step's Bullying Prevention Unit to learn how to recognize, report, and refuse bullying. Additionally, the school social worker will teach students to recognize, report, and refuse unsafe situations through Second Step's Child Protection Unit.

Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) <u>is an evidence-based</u>, tiered framework for supporting students' behavioral, academic, social, emotional, and mental health. When implemented with fidelity, <u>PBIS improves</u> social emotional competence, academic success, and school climate. It is a way to create positive, predictable, equitable and safe learning environments where everyone thrives.

Each elementary school has established positive expectations, or norms, that reflect the shared values of the school community. This sample teaching matrix shows how schools explicitly identify, define, and teach predictable routines, positive expectations, and critical social, emotional, and behavioral skills.

Homework

Homework is not something that is regularly given in kindergarten. Students may be provided access to enrichment and practice activities that support learning they've done in school, but these are not graded. Students also have access at home to some of the same online programs they use during their school day. Weekly reading practice is the one area that is uplifted for students and their families to work on outside of school.









What communication can I expect?

Our district sends out important information and reminders regarding weather delays/closures, calendar information, and districtwide events/needs through email and/or text messaging. Your school will also send out information and reminders about school events, news, and needs through email and/or text messaging. You will hear from your child's teacher on an ongoing basis through a classroom or grade level newsletter. While you may have been used to daily newsletters in your PreK classroom, this is not common practice at elementary school level.

You may hear from other school staff during your time in kindergarten. The school nurse or nursing assistant will contact you regarding any injury, illness, or medical related needs. Office assistant staff will contact you if your child is absent and we have not heard from you. Your child's teacher/s, Principal, Associate Principal, or other school staff will contact you regarding a variety of things, including but not limited to events, updates, positive phone calls, or any behavioral issues or needs that arise.

Please update your child's school if you have any changes in contact information (email, phone number, address) so that you continue to receive information regarding your child. Our district's main website, as well as your school's website has helpful links listed right under the pictures at the top of the page (ex. Lunch menus, paying fees, accessing your PowerSchool Parent Portal).
