Why Choose Miriam?

We embrace a strengths-based, whole-child approach to an individualized education.

From experiential learning to therapy services and life skills, Miriam prepares students for a productive future, however that might look like for each individual. We believe all students can find success; they just need the right support.

Personalized Education

At Miriam School, learning is intentional, collaborative and personalized, designed to meet the unique social, emotional, physical and academic needs of each student. We use various methods and instructional tools to accomodate the individual learning styles of our students. Teachers meet each student where they are in their learning journey, getting to know them and their needs.

Integrated Therapies

We understand the importance of pairing therapies with academics to equip each student with the appropriate aids and skills. Speech/language and occupational therapies are built right into each school day and are integrated throughout our curriculum to support the whole child. In addition to occupational and speech/language therapy, we have a full-time counselor at each school.

Welcoming Environment

There's something special about walking through the doors of either Miriam campus – a feeling of warmth, understanding, and comfort. Miriam fully embraces each student, celebrating the unique gifts and strengths they bring to our community and to this world. Students instinctively understand that everyone comes with their own challenges, and they quickly become comfortable among their peers. Lower/Middle School Grades K-8

In 1956, Miriam School was established to serve children with developmental disabilities. Following the establishment of Special School District and other public school special education programs, Miriam's focus changed in 1962 to serve children with complex learning needs.

Our lower/middle school use a multi-grade classroom model. This approach allows students to be grouped with children who are chronologically, academically and socially compatible, rather than using grades as the only criteria.

Learning groups are more focused with this approach, and social relationships are more easily facilitated. This also allows each child to be included within a group of students whose needs are compatible and complementary, thereby maximizing skill development and increasing self-confidence.

The lower/middle school use a variety of curriculum tools, combining instructional methods that will benefit each student. A few of these curriculums include:

- Step Up to Writing

Integrated Services

Occupational Therapy

Every student in grades K-8 receives a sensory diet twice each day. These rotations in the Occupational Therapy (OT) room provide the sensory input students need in order to focus on their schoolwork. They swing, jump, crash and climb to start each morning and afternoon.

Our occupational therapists provide services to help improve fine and gross motor skills, as well as sensory integration. OT services are built into the educational program through small and large group environments.

Speech and Language Therapy

Communication skills are central to a student's educational experience and academic success. Miriam's speech/language therapy program plays an integral role in students' daily learning experiences. Licensed and certified speech/language pathologists (SLPs) work with individuals and small groups, as well as through classroom-based programs and consultation services.

SLPs work closely with classroom teachers to facilitate the use of effective communication skills throughout the school day.

Counseling Services

The lower/middle school has a full-time counselor who works with students in one-on-one, small group and classroom settings. The counselor works on identifying and communicating feelings, social skills, coping tactics for a variety of situations, and other important skills.

Additionally, a separate counselor works with individual students who have mental health conditions or concerns.

Lower/Middle School Community

High School Grades 9-12

Recognizing the need for a high school that offers similar services to those offered in grades K-8, Miriam High School opened in fall 2016 and is now located in Olivette. It continues Miriam's tradition of focusing on the whole student through small group instruction, caring teachers and specialized curriculum.

Like at the lower/middle school, each student has an Individualized Learning Plan that includes all wraparound services such as academics, social skills, occupational and speech therapies, and counseling.

With a low student-to-teacher ratio and a collaborative learning approach, students find an environment full of possibilities. Graduates leave with not only a transcript, but also a portfolio of skills for college, vocational training or the workforce.

Curriculum Paths

Miriam High School provides three curriculum paths: Challenge, Core and Concepts. For each subject area, students are placed in a pathway that meets their needs. They can move between paths and may be working in more than one pathway at once.

Challenge: Designed for students who are learning at or above grade level

The Challenge curriculum prepares students for college. It includes coursework with meaningful homework assigned three to four days per week. These skills will lead to successful experiences in college or postsecondary programs. The focus is on constructive responses, critical thinking, skills/analysis and independent task completion.

Core: Designed for students learning at or near grade level

The Core curriculum prepares students for college. Meaningful homework is assigned two to three days per week. These skills will lead to successful experiences in college or postsecondary programs. The focus is on constructive responses, critical thinking, skills/analysis, and independent task completion.

Concepts: Designed for students learning below grade level

The Concepts classroom provides a functional skills-based curriculum with targeted interventions as needed per course. Homework is assigned when in-class work is not completed. These skills will lead to successful independent experiences (ex: personal finance and self care). This tier focuses on the development of independent responses, task completion and living.

Miriam Essentials

Miriam students meet in grade-level groups each day to learn the Miriam Essentials curriculum covering Academics, Life Skills, Health and Wellness, Relationships and Community, and College/Career Readiness. Each grade-level team includes three dedicated staff members who carry out the curriculum.

Learning Beyond the Classroom

After nearly two years of limited socializing during a pandemic, and in the age when any answer is just a Google search away, many teens haven't had the real-world experience needed for after graduation.

At Miriam High School, we give our students hands-on, out-of-classroom experiences through our Experiential Learning Program, setting them up for success when they graduate.


Students in math and personal finance classes visit a local grocery store to shop - on a budget - for the school's Friendsgiving feast. They study recipes, make shopping lists, learn to navigate the store and use a credit card at the checkout counter. Those taking Child Development pay a visit each year to Miriam's youngest students, reading to the kindergarten and first-grade students in Room 1.

The "Explore Your Future" class gave students a first-hand look at career options in the field of construction through a Build My Future event from AGC of Missouri at St. Louis Community College. Students were able to talk with professionals in the field and try their hands at various tasks.

All students participate in community service projects throughout the school year, working with animals at the APA, putting together food and care packages, volunteering at the Miriam Switching Post and more.

A group of students even went to take their driver's permit test at a nearby license office after studying for a few weeks in their Miriam Essentials class.







Student Life

Miriam High School is dedicated to providing students with not only robust academic instruction, but also enriching social opportunities. These include clubs, athletics, spirit days and special events and are shaped by students' interests and preferences.

After-school clubs offer students an excellent opportunity to participate in extracurricular activities according to their interests. Clubs not only promote social interaction but also give students the chance to gain leadership skills. Miriam partners with several organizations to offer these activities.

Transition Services

As a part of each student's personalized learning experience at Miriam High School, preparation for life after high school begins as early as freshman year. Administrators and staff work with each student individually, along with their parents, to determine their interests, needs and dreams.

Some students plan for four-year or community college and others want to explore job training, internships and life-skills preparation. Miriam High School's unique programming is designed to support both types of learners and set students up for success in their postsecondary endeavors.

Miriam staff connect students and their families with work programs, skillbased opportunities, colleges and universities, and agencies like Vocational Rehab. We support students in pursuit of the A+ program through area community colleges, and link students with internship opportunities.

Every high school graduate has a plan for the next step in their journey.



During spring semester, Miriam hosts a Next Steps Fair, welcoming representatives from a wide variety of colleges, employment agencies and organizations to talk with students and families.


