RECOGNITION/PUBLIC RELATIONS

Students

Jeffrey Gugliotta, grade 12, earned a **National Merit Scholarship Program Letter of Commendation** for outstanding performance on the PSAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test in 2010. Over 1.5 million students took the 2010 PSAT and 34,000 qualified to be a Commended Student.

Congratulations to **Camilo Marulanda, grade 12**, for becoming a **2011-12 National Hispanic Recognition Program Scholar**. Of the 235,000 students who took the PSAT, only 5,000 students were recognized for this honor. Each student's GPA had to be at least a 3.5 or higher out of a 4.0 to qualify.

The **NPHS Marching Canucks**, under the direction of **Heather Fencik, music teacher**, continued their winning streak at Piscataway High School on Saturday, September 24. They secured another first place honor (Group 2A) bringing home trophies for Best Visual, Best Music, Best Color Guard, and Best Overall Effect. The Marching Canucks placed third in the USSBA Band competition held at South Brunswick HS this past Saturday, October 1. Honors went to our Color Guard (Best Guard) and percussionists (Best Percussion). The event was held indoors due to the rain; therefore, the band stood for their performance rather than demonstrate their drill design.

Lindsey Gall, West End School media specialist, and Jessica Trujillo, North Plainfield Public Library representative, recognized **Tatiana Gonzalez** for her fantastic reading. Over the summer, she joined the North Plainfield Public Library Reading program and read for total 3,355 minutes over the summer - the most for any West End student participating in the reading program! Tatiana was presented with a trophy recognizing her hard work and wonderful reading habits.

Summer Reading Celebration: The West End Wildcats Summer Reading Celebration was a huge success! Over sixty children reached the goal and were invited to the Create-A-Book Sno Cone Party. These children read fifteen or more books this past summer! This was an increase of three books compared to the past several years. Some read as many as forty and one student read sixty-six books! At the celebration the summer readers all received a certificate, a bookmark, WESTIES, bracelets, a free homework pass, three gently used books and their own writing journal to author their own book. A representative from PNC Bank came and gave the children bags with goodies inside. Schools

West End School

Courier News Summer Reading: Fifty students and eight staff/PTA members from West End School participated in the *Courier News* Summer Reading Program and were recently recognized in a special section of the paper. Back to School Night—A Family Event! Traditionally Back to School Night is for parents only. At West End School it is a family event. To reflect the importance of family in improving one's education, the children invited their parents to Back to School Night. They participated together in hearing about the expectations and wonderful happenings that will be taking place in their (both parents' and children's) classrooms. It is West End's belief that it takes a partnership between school and home to provide the best support system for children and that is the message West End is sending out to families by making Back to School Night a family event. The evening began with an Open House experience in the community room. The specialists set up a display about their area of expertise such as art, music, counseling services, academic support, health services, physical education and health instruction. Parents were able to meet and speak to the specialists and hear about their role in their child's educational experience. The local Boy Scout and Girl Scout troops also were there distributing information on membership as well as the PTA, Walk to School Project representative and North Plainfield Education Association registering voters. Specific times were arranged for classroom visits during the evening in which the classroom teachers gave their own presentations.

Wendy McCellan, special education teacher, introduced a new program, **The Legacy Project.** West End School students and staff will be participating in this program as a part of the character education building objective for this school year. The first phase is LifeDreams. As stated on the Legacy website this “is one of the Legacy Project's banner programs. It explores individual potential and creating your life. What are your goals – what would you like to be, do, learn? How can you achieve your goals? What can you learn about your own hopes and dreams and those of others?” This will begin the week of October 3. **Lindsey Gall,** West End's **media**

specialist, will kick-off the project by reading the book *Dream by Susan V. Bosak* to every class which will be followed with an activity. This program will continue throughout the year and activities and events will be shared in future reports.

PTA BoxTop Recognition: In September, 3,577 BoxTops were turned in, which means \$357 was already earned this year! Winners with the most per class were: Tied for 3rd place: **Jason Lilly's second grade and Dina Diaz's fourth grade** classes with 263 BoxTops each; 2nd place: **Elizabeth Cirillo's second grade class** with 280. BoxTops; 1st place: **Michelle Tafuri's fourth grade class** with 330 BoxTops.

As well as getting a certificate and Westies, the PTA will reward these classes with ice pops. This year, the PTA is again going to purchase playground supplies with the money raised from the BoxTops collection.

East End School

East End School's **Back to School Night** was held on Tuesday evening, September 27. Teachers in grades PreK –grade two provided an overview of the curriculum and expectations for the year. Later, **Kathleen Herrmann, principal**, invited everyone to the Community Room where specialized teachers sat at various stations around the perimeter of the room and offered valuable information as well as an overview of the curriculum. Later, Ms. Herrmann addressed the entire school community using a PowerPoint presentation in both English and Spanish. The PTO Executive Board was introduced and **Anne Fellin, president**, addressed the audience and encouraged their participation. At 7:45, parents of third and fourth graders were invited to their child's classrooms where they received an overview. "What a wonderful evening at East End School. Every chair was filled and people stood in the back to hear my address and visit the specialized stations. I stressed the importance of their involvement and how reading every day makes a difference. We are all anticipating a year filled with academic rigor, respect, and a partnership that fosters a strong school community," remarked Ms. Herrmann. On Wednesday morning, Ms. Herrmann hosted a breakfast in the Faculty Room to thank the staff for a wonderful evening.

East End will be participating in a program to earn money for the school. Parents can conveniently and easily shop online through **SchoolStore.com** which has over 200 different stores and merchants including Target, Sears and Office Depot. The money will be used to purchase items for the school, as well as for assemblies. **Lisa Gabriel, second grade teacher**, is facilitating this endeavor.

In her efforts to raise awareness about childhood obesity, healthy eating, and exercise, **First Lady Michelle Obama** is working with *National Geographic* to set a new **Guinness World Record for the most jumping jacks done in a 24 hour period**. The event kicks off at 3 p.m. on October 11, when Ms. Obama will lead a group of Washington area kids in jumping jacks at the White House. However, the main idea is to get kids everywhere up and jumping for just one minute sometime between 3 p.m. October 11 and 3 p.m. October 12. More than 20,000 people need to participate to set the record. This is where **Corrine Cecala, physical education**

teacher, comes in. She heard about this project and shared it with athletic director Karl Gordon and her principal, Kathy Herrmann, so it can be done across the district at all grade levels. Students at East End School will engage in this activity during their physical education classes. Ms. Cecala will announce the results after the event is finished. "I was thrilled when Ms. Cecala approached me with this idea. Not only are we supporting exercise, but the students will be part of a nationwide effort and will be counted in the World Book of Guinness Records if the record is set. Doing jumping jacks is no easy task, but the students at East End School are up for the challenge," said Ms. Herrmann.

Stony Brook School

Back-To-School Night: On September 22, 2011, Stony Brook School opened its doors and welcomed all Stony Brook families to the annual Back to School Night program. Attendance was tremendous! From 6:30 to 7:00pm, families in grades K, 1 & 2 visited classrooms, met classroom teachers, and learned about grade level expectations. A general assembly was held from 7:10 - 7:30pm for all families. During this time, **Principal Cathy Kobylarz** introduced all staff members and then presented a technology-based program explaining school rules, curriculum and goals for the upcoming school year. From 7:30-8:00 all special area teachers were available on the first floor with informational displays and handouts. Stony Brook's PTA, organized by **Kim Wilson-McKay**, offered families healthy snacks of water and granola bars. From 8:00 - 8:30pm grades 3 & 4 held their classroom visitations. "Back to School Night has always been an important part of the school year. Teachers, parents and students join together to become a learning community focused on building a strong home, school relationship. Special thanks to all who were able to attend," stated Principal Kobylarz.

Somerset School

Fifth Grade Presents Bioglyphs : All fifth grade students in homerooms created their *own* unique bioglyph image to display for Back to School Night held on September 19, 2011. Students used **symbols** to **represent** key **characteristics** or qualities of themselves. They referred to specific instructions to develop their glyphs. As students created their glyphs they remembered that understanding math means understanding that different symbols are used to represent operations and values. "It was so much fun creating our image through symbols!" remarked one fifth grader.

District

Safe Routes to Schools Program: The elementary schools and Somerset Intermediate School in North Plainfield will again join forces with Somerset County, the Mayor's office and the North Plainfield Police Department to continue to work together for a second year in the "Safe Routes to School Program." The goal of this program will be to establish safe walking and biking routes to school while encouraging families to walk together to get to school. East End, Somerset, Stony Brook and West End Schools have combined efforts to establish this family approach to safety and healthier habits for the morning routines. Wednesday, October 5, 2011

will be North Plainfield's first "Walk to School" Day as the district prepares to launch this program on a monthly basis. **Mayor Michael Giordano** and Don Sternberg, the district's business administrator, will visit Somerset School on that day to participate in this launching event. Sparkee, the mascot from the Somerset Patriot's will also visit our schools from month to month. The first Wednesday of every month will be a "Walking Wednesday" and students and families are encouraged to walk together in the morning. Safe routes will also be established. "Research has stated that walking to school is a healthier way to start a day for students and adults. This program is being established in a joint effort to have our families come together as a community and arrive to school in a healthier and safer way," shared Principal Cathy Kobylarz.

DISTRICT OPERATIONS & AUXILIARY SERVICES

EMPLOYEE SAFETY TRAINING

Safety Topic. The safety topic for September was PPE (Personal Protective Equipment). Related safety training was provided via our new on-line employee training system. The safety topic for October is Electrical Safety and Lock Out/Tag Out.

Safe Schools On-Line Training. Our new web-based training program from Safe Schools is up and running. As of this date, most of our operations staff members have successfully completed their first on-line course. This new program allows employees to log into the training site and complete courses that have been assigned to them by their supervisor or other administrator. We are initially targeting our operations team and hope to bring the entire district on board later this year. The entire program is provided to the district through our Joint Insurance Fund at no cost to the district.

HEALTH & SAFETY SECURITY DRILLS

Security drills for September were conducted as scheduled. The security drill for October is an off-site evacuation.

FEMA SUBMISSION #1

We are still waiting for the remaining funds to be released for the flooding that occurred in March of 2010. Two partial payments for our submitted expenses have been received to date. No further information is available at this time.

FEMA SUBMISSION #3

The Governors' declaration for Hurricane Irene clears the way for us to apply for reimbursement of reasonable expenses related to the storm. An initial information and submission meeting was held on September 15, 2011 in Somerville. We are currently waiting for county representatives to schedule an intake conference.

TRANSPORTATION

Our van drivers have successfully completed a transportation-related course through our Safe Schools Training Program.

CURRENT MAINTENANCE PROJECTS

Listed below is a partial list of projects and/or in-house maintenance tasks that were recently completed:

- Replacement of two roof drains/scuppers above the high school library area.
- Set up of the Pathways Program in the Harrison School multi-purpose room.
- Replacement of flooring in both faculty rooms at the middle school.
- Construction of the greenhouse at the Harrison Building. The remaining utility work is being completed at this time.

CURRENT MAINTENANCE PROJECTS (In Progress)

Listed below are projects and/or in-house maintenance projects that are currently in progress and should be completed shortly.

- Electrical upgrades for the Harrison Building.
- District-Wide replacement of HVAC filters and start-up of all boilers.
- Restoration of hot and cold water mixing at a number of areas at the High School.

- Installation of a fully functional Greenhouse Teaching Package.
- Installation of new technology and related equipment in the multi-purpose room.

CAPITAL PROJECTS, STATUS REPORT HARRISON BUILDING

The installation of a chiller, piping and associated controls to air condition the entire building. Specifications for this project are currently being finalized. This project will be partially funded by a Rod Grant. This project is currently scheduled to be advertised on October 10 of this year.

STONY BROOK SCHOOL

The installation of two package air conditioning units for the multi-purpose room. Specifications for this project are currently being finalized. This project will be partially funded by a Rod Grant. This project is currently scheduled to be advertised on October 10 of this year.

DISTRICT WIDE

Solar Energy Grant. UPDATE: Sunlight General Capital, the selected contractor, was in district on September 14 to complete additional survey work. We anticipate this project to start up in early spring of 2012.

ENERGY REDUCTION

Demand Response. The district is currently working with Constellation Energy Services regarding our ability to qualify for a Demand Response Program. If we qualify for the program, the district would be compensated for agreeing to reduce our utility load during a high-demand event. The district would also receive additional compensation for our participation during an actual event.
