Dear Peak to Peak Alumni,

Exciting things are happening at Peak to Peak! One of the biggest initiatives this school year has been our "Listening Campaign," during which we gathered input from all of our stakeholders, including you as alumni, about Peak to Peak's greatest opportunities and most pressing needs for the future. The feedback we received was incredibly helpful and thought-provoking, and generally fell into three different categories, all of which align nicely with our <u>Strategic Plan</u>: (1) Creating New Programs; (2) Renovating existing spaces: and (3) Building New Construction.

We are now actively planning for, and carrying out, the recommended actions from the Listening Campaign, which include envisioning new partnerships with businesses for internships, workshops and speaking engagements, and creating new curriculum that allows for real-world applications and life skills such as advanced technology, community-based government projects, engineering, finances, including budgeting and taxes, and more.

We are also engaged with an architect to conduct a campus-wide analysis of our current spaces and to provide ideas, recommendations and estimated costs for various renovation and new construction projects that were identified as desirable in the Listening Campaign feedback. This is our first step, and our short-term and long-term planning will become more concrete as we use the information we receive to inform future actions and decisions. Please look for updates about this exciting work in future editions of the Piqued Magazine.

2019 Innovation Summit

Peak to Peak Charter School recently completed a new strategic plan that includes dynamic and aspirational goals to help prepare our students for 21st-century educational pursuits and careers. With this strategic plan, we are asking ourselves what essential skills, competencies, courses and training our students need to successfully access their best fit colleges and prepare them for careers in their desired fields, some of which may not yet be in existence.

As one way of addressing the critical questions posed above, we hosted our first Innovation Summit at Peak to Peak on February 13th. In addition to members of our own community, we invited experts from our local area, including business leaders and entrepreneurs, government

officials, and representatives from other K-12 schools as well as colleges and universities, to join in this conversation. The goal of the Innovation Summit was to identify possible collaborative partnerships for our school that could lead to forward-thinking opportunities for our students.

This event was a first-of-its-kind for Peak to Peak and based on the feedback we have received, it was incredibly successful. One of the greatest take-aways was to embrace failure as a learning opportunity, rather than avoiding it or trying to prevent it. Along with this is the importance of creating an environment in which it is safe to take risks. The group encouraged

To accomplish this, stakeholders identified that Peak to Peak should take an integrated approach to learning challenges through creative, relevant, and engaging opportunities and partnerships. 

Alumni Spotlight: Marco Martinez Class of 2011

Where are you now and what are you up to?

I am working as a Creative Freelancer and Audio/Software Engineer around Denver and Fort Collins, Colorado. I own a small LLC and work on a wide range of projects from Traffic

Engineering to Artistic Design. I work with a bunch of small companies and have participated in a few Kickstarter campaigns. It's a bit hectic but I have a ton of fun.

Do you think your time at Peak to Peak helped you pursue this? If yes, how?

Peak to Peak's academic rigor helped prepare me for an undergrad in Mechanical Engineering, and it was in this program that I found my true passion for Music and Audio Engineering.

Did you ever imagine doing this while you were at Peak to Peak?

No, not at all. I thought I wanted to design flashy sports cars when I finished high school. It took me several years to find what I truly wanted to do. To be honest, I am still figuring that out in some ways.

What education have you pursued since high school?

Last year, I completed an MS degree at CSU. For my thesis, I developed software for non-invasive tactile hearing aids. It was a very rewarding experience.

Who was your favorite teacher and why?

Mr. Hankla was my favorite teacher. He opened my mind to the awesome subjects of physics and engineering and helped me realize my potential in this area. Without him, I would never have pursued a degree in Engineering.

Are you still friends with anybody you met at Peak to Peak?

Yeah, a handful of us have a Discord group and regularly play video games online together. We all live in different cities, so this has been a great way to keep in touch.

What's the most influential class you've taken in college?

Definitely Mechatronics. This is an undergraduate design course where 3rd year Mechanical Engineering students are tasked with designing and building a complex electro-mechanical system. My design ended up winning Design News Magazine's "Gadget Freak of The Year" award in 2015, with a \$6,000 prize and a free trip to California. This caught the attention of a few researchers at CSU, and they asked me to join their team to help develop a new kind of hearing aid. This is what led me into my graduate degree. I may never have realized my passion for Audio Engineering had I not taken this course.

What would you like to tell your fellow alumni?

Don't be afraid to take a non-traditional career path, pursue your passion and be your own boss. Technology and social media have made it super easy to work independently.

Faculty Spotlight: John Steinbauer



How long have you worked at Peak to Peak, and what classes have you taught?

I've been at Peak to Peak since the fall of 2008 - almost 11 years. In my first 3 years, I taught American History to our seventh graders. In my fourth year, we changed the Social Studies course pathways, and I decided to keep teaching seventh grade and take on the new content at the grade level, so I've been teaching World History 1 (Human origins to the Middle Ages) since then. I also designed and advised an eighth-grade elective called "Independent Seminar" for its first year in 2014-15.

How is the school (and/or students) different from when you first worked here?

In my time here, Peak to Peak moved from its first decade into a more "mature" phase in its life as an institution, and in many ways it feels less intense than it did a decade ago. At the same time, we are moving into a new period of redefining ourselves. The last year or so has been a time of experimentation and change. I've always liked how much freedom I have to shape my classroom environment and learning experiences and that is as true as ever.

What's the secret to a successful class?

To me, the most important things are to take a moment to connect with my students, to take advantage of any opportunity to laugh together, and to focus on teaching them skills they will be able to use later in life. Not many people remember the content knowledge they learned in seventh grade.

Tell us about your recent successes/adventures?

For years, I thought of ancient world history as really far removed from our daily lives in the 21st century, and that perspective made it hard to connect my content to my students' lives. But more recently, I've started to see that the changes we are living through, as revolutionary as they are, are the same themes we study in my history class. So, I've been working really hard this year to help students see those connections and to create a classroom structure that allows them to learn about current events and their own curiosities, and to connect that to the past.

Outside of school, my latest adventures have mostly been about raising a family. My kids are currently 6 and 3. The last couple of years have been amazing as they've gotten old enough for my wife and me to introduce them to our old passions of skiing, camping, and climbing. We've had some great times in the last year exploring slot canyons in Utah, watching a cattle drive move through our campsite in Wyoming, and skiing the trees together.

Finally, this year my son, Charlie, started Kindergarten here at Peak to Peak. Being a parent of a Puma has been a different kind of adventure for sure!

What message would you like to leave for our Alumni?

Life doesn't always go in the direction you planned, but that's okay because there are so many unexpected opportunities waiting out there. Cherish your relationships.

What section of the bookstore would we find you in and why?

New nonfiction releases. I love reading about world and U.S. history and current events and science.

College Planning & Counseling Center

Seniors regularly stop by to both share their good news on admission decisions and scholarships and to reevaluate their game plan when they receive a deferral or "redirection" letter*. Juniors attend a weekly College Research Seminar (CRS) course that allows the college counseling team to assist all students and families through the college search process on a personal, individualized level. In the fall, the rising seniors will continue the CRS course with counselors as they prepare for making their college decisions.

This fall will mark the 10th Annual Peak to Peak College Day on Tuesday, October 2. A new feature will be "career talks," where sophomore, junior, and, senior students can learn about a specific career path and how the speaker's college experiences got them there.
