HELLO PEAK TO PEAK **ALUMNI!**

I love that this issue of Piqued is focusing on community, because honestly, it is what I have enjoyed most so far in the four months I've been at Peak to Peak.

I have appreciated the community I see when high school students are having fun in the quad during lunch, middle school students are bonding together through ropes course challenges, elementary students are learning about leadership from the high school students in Ms. Flanhofer's leadership class, and K-12 students and families are celebrating at a Homecoming block party. In addition, I see our operations team building community every day behind the scenes with their work in finance, human resources, facilities, food service, fundraising, transportation, and more - all the systems that keep the wheels of this special community turning every day. I'm grateful for their work and

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honored to be part of the school's operations team.

A significant part of my work these past four months, in partnerships with Facilities Director, John Wilcox, has been two major facility initiatives:

- BVSD Bond Spending Plan: Peak to Peak received a \$10.7M allocation in the district bond that passed last November. This funding is for "critical needs" updating facility infrastructure and renovating aging facilities. We are planning to renovate the "auditeria" into a proper K-12 auditorium and performing arts center, as well as some other more minor renovations and facility upgrades.
- Updating our Facility Master **Plan**: At the same time, we have needs for expansion beyond what we can do with the BVSD bond. For this reason, we'll be updating the Facility Master Plan that was created during the 2019-20 school year. We'll then start work towards implementation of that plan in 2024-25. We would love to have an alumni perspective on our Facility Master Planning Task Force; if you are interested, please email me at

jennifer.douglas@bvsd.org.



Last, one of our strategic priorities is to support and nurture a rich alumni network. When we talk about our Peak to Peak community, YOU are an important part of that. School News:

Peak to Peak won the ReSource Central Renew Our School SPARK! Competition. Innovation class assistants (with the help of ninth graders) measured our energy usage (lights, electricity, heat, etc.), analyzed what these results meant, and devised plans to improve.

Peak to Peak was also one of 16 Colorado schools to receive Governor Polis' Science Bright Spot Awards for high achievement in Science. Peak to Peak will receive a \$50,000 award that can be used to purchase educational technology, offer professional development, and other opportunities that will benefit students' learning experiences. Governor Polis said, "By highlighting the top sixteen schools in the state for science achievement, we are shining a light on what works. We look forward to finding out what works at these schools and helping more students excel in science. Improving science education will help students and our state."

Peak to Peak is grounded in excellence while continuing to grow greatness! In this edition of our alumni magazine, we celebrate the enduring legacy of our school community—a beacon of academic prowess dedicated to our mission of college preparation for all. Peak to Peak has been, and continues to be, a sought-after option in Boulder County.

Boulder Valley School District (BVSD) recently held its first-ever "BVSD is the Place to Be Showcase" at the CU Arena. Parents and students from around the district had the opportunity to meet educators and explore programs at all 56 BVSD schools.

The district's leadership believes in providing students with opportunities that meet their unique interests and needs. Peak to Peak staff and community members were excited to be invited to take part in this one-of-a-kind event. Our booth was packed all evening with families who hoped to learn what makes Peak to Peak so special.

The BVSD 2024-25 Open Enrollment period has now begun and families with K-12 students may apply to the school of their choice. In past enrollment cycles, Peak to Peak has filled every available seat. Students who have not been accepted are placed on our waitlist. It is not unusual to have over 1,000 students on our waitlist. Based on this year's showcase and the ongoing interest in our school, we believe this trend will continue many years into the future.

CASEY JUDSON | CLASS OF 2010



Where are you living now and what are you up to? I live in Denver, where I'm enjoying the dreamy stage of life where I make adult money but have very few of the adult responsibilities. During the day, I spend my time working at a few companies: in project finance at a community solar company called Pivot Energy (shameless plug #1: You too can sign up for community solar!) and as the CFO at Both& Apparel (shameless plug #2: Check us out online!).

Do you think your time at Peak to Peak helped you pursue this? If yes, how? Absolutely. My experience at Peak to Peak was one of immense creativity and empowerment, which taught me the importance of thinking outside the box and taking ownership over who I am as a person. Teachers at Peak always had high expectations of everyone, but in comparing my high school experience to friends who went to other schools, we were always doing super interesting things like making Ginuwine/Shakespeare crossover songs. I think all my experiences at Peak helped me realize just how lateral and interesting the world can be with a sense of creativity and self-determination.

Did you ever imagine doing this while you were at Peak to Peak? I really didn't, partially because neither of my jobs existed at the time, but mainly because I was in high school and my brain could hardly conceptualize college, much less anything after college.I knew I wanted to do "something good for the world" but I couldn't have possibly imagined where I'd end up. I think my unsolicited advice to any high schooler is: the world is changing more rapidly today than ever before, so focus less on specific outcomes and more on learning how learn, adaptability, and to developing a moral compass. The rest of the pieces end up falling into place.

What education have you pursued since high school? I got my bachelor's degree right after high school and I went through the CFA program. Outside of that, I feel like I'm constantly learning and reading, if not in an official capacity. Information is just absurdly available these days.

Reflecting on your time at Peak to Peak, what communities were you part of? How did you experience shape your overall school experience, and do you feel they influenced your personal and academic growth?

While at Peak to Peak, I was part of the track team during junior and senior year and I served as a LINK leader, but I think one of my favorite things about Peak to Peak was that I never felt like there was any cliquiness:

I felt like everyone in my class was a friend and part of a broader community. Everyone was doing interesting and different things, but there was an underlying level of interest and respect that everyone had for each other. I think this environment encouraged me to just be my weird high school self, which helped me grow into the person I am today.



You were recently back at Peak to Peak as a featured speaker for the Entrepreneurship and Innovation Club. What was it like to come back to campus and speak to high school students? I've been coming back to Peak to Peak for the last few years to talk to Mrs. Letter's classes about innovation and entrepreneurship. It's always so cool to see how students these days are thinking about issues on a global scale. When I was in high school, I certainly learned a lot, but I wasn't engaging with global issues or entrepreneurship in any way, shape, or form. Seeing how thoughtful and inspired students are at Peak to Peak is an awesome experience.

How would you recommend other alumni get involved with the current students and faculty? For myself, it was a pretty serendipitous happening: I ran across Mrs. Letter in Lafayette and she asked me to come in to do a presentation. For other alumni, you might not randomly run across a teacher, so I would recommend reaching out to a favorite teacher and seeing if there are any opportunities (hint: there always are).

What do you think of the physical changes to our campus community? It feels like Peak to Peak has grown up into a real school. I have a nostalgic love for the roughness of the campus when I was there (for example, having a construction pit where the library now is was fun), but it's cool to see how many facilities students now have.

Who was your favorite teacher and why? There were so many amazing teachers, which makes it hard to answer this question. If I had to pick a very favorite teacher, it would be Mrs. Letter. As a high schooler (and this is not unique at all), I was incredibly weird and often inappropriate. Mrs. Letter (bless her soul) understood that this was all just an expression of creativity; so, instead of punishing/shutting our creativity down, Mrs. Letter did an incredible job in giving us the freedom to express ourselves while helping shape our moral framework.

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What was the most influential class you took in college? It was a capstone finance class, and it was my favorite because of an amazing mentor/professor who taught it.

Are you still friends with anyone you met at Peak to Peak? I am! Several of my closest friends went to Peak to Peak, although I met them before going to high school there.

What would you like to tell your fellow alumni? Hope everyone's doing well! And also: TMB.


