This issue focuses on **Connections** to celebrate every member of Peak to Peak as we enter our 25th year!

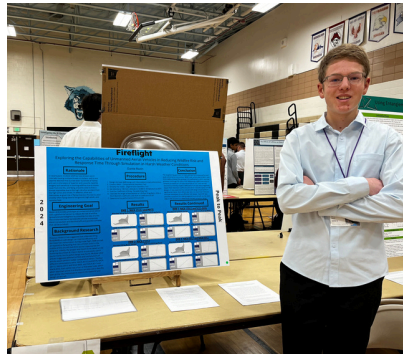
The first meeting of the Alumni Association occurred in February. Attending alumni identified four ways they most want to engage with the Peak to Peak Community:

The competition is owned and produced by Society for Science. Amrita will receive a \$2,000 award and Peak to Peak will receive \$2,000 as well. Throughout its history, the competition's alumni have been honored with 13 Nobel Prizes, 11 National Medals of Science, six Breakthrough Prizes, 21 MacArthur Foundation Fellowships, and two Fields Medals. This year, the Science Talent Search received more applicants than they've seen in over five decades.

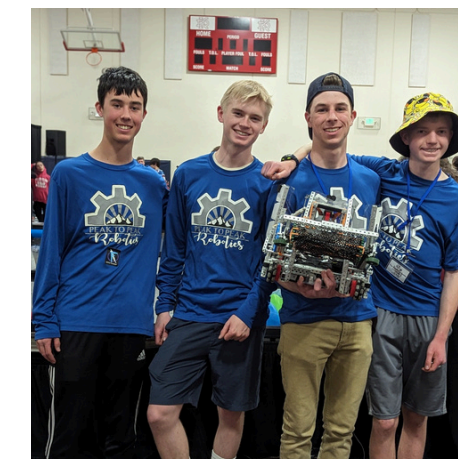
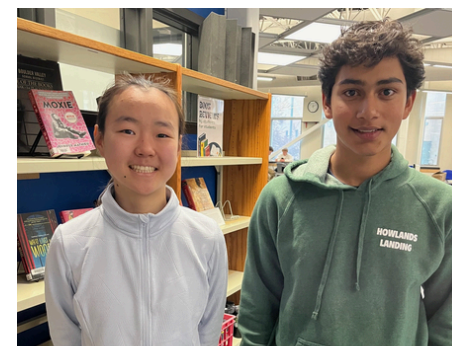

What experiences at Peak to Peak helped you pursue this?

Peak to Peak set me up with a strong academic background. I enjoyed my time in college after Peak as I felt comfortable in grappling with challenging questions in my college classes.

Did you ever imagine doing this while you were at Peak to Peak?

Didn't imagine it. I went into college thinking I'd major in Spanish (thanks Sr. Matthews!). I ended up double majoring in Spanish and Biology once I became interested in medicine.

What are some of the risks versus rewards of working in your current field? What are some of the sacrifices you have made? What is interesting or most challenging about working in that environment?

Becoming a physician is a long road. Many years in school followed by long hours in residency. This period was stimulating and although tough, it was a satisfying time of my life. I really enjoy dermatology because my patients can see their skin problems and are motivated to get better. There is innovative research happening in the derm field in treatment of skin cancer, vitiligo, alopecia areata, eczema and psoriasis.

The advances in treating these diseases in the past decade have been significant and it's inspiring to work alongside talented minds moving our field forward.



Reflecting on your time at Peak to Peak and beyond, what are some of the connections that you maintained? How have these connections shaped your overall high school experience, and do you feel they influenced your personal and academic growth? Are you still friends with anybody you met at Peak to Peak?

Oh ya! My two best friends are from Peak. We have all entered different careers but our time together during high school set up a foundation for long lasting friendships.

Who was your favorite teacher and why?

Sr. Matthews – I spent a week in the rainforest of Costa Rica with Sr. Matthews and our Spanish class. Such a formative experience trekking through torrential downpour and camping with that group.

“Two things!

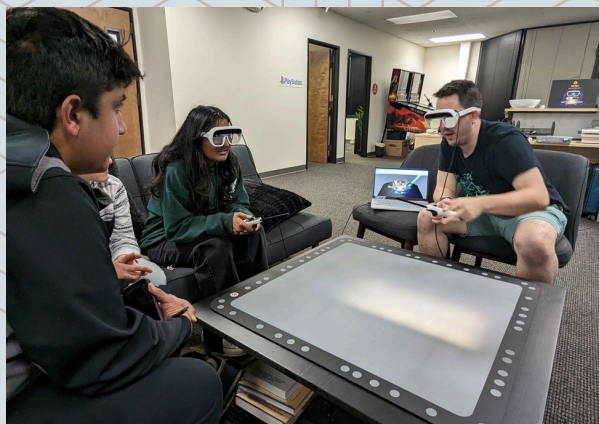

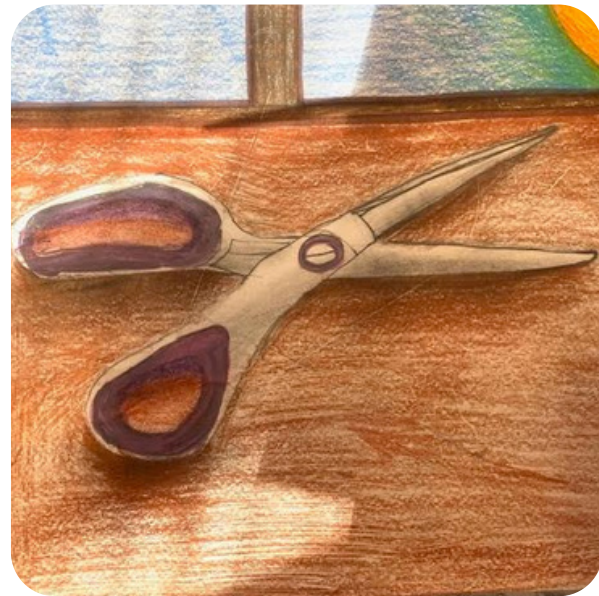

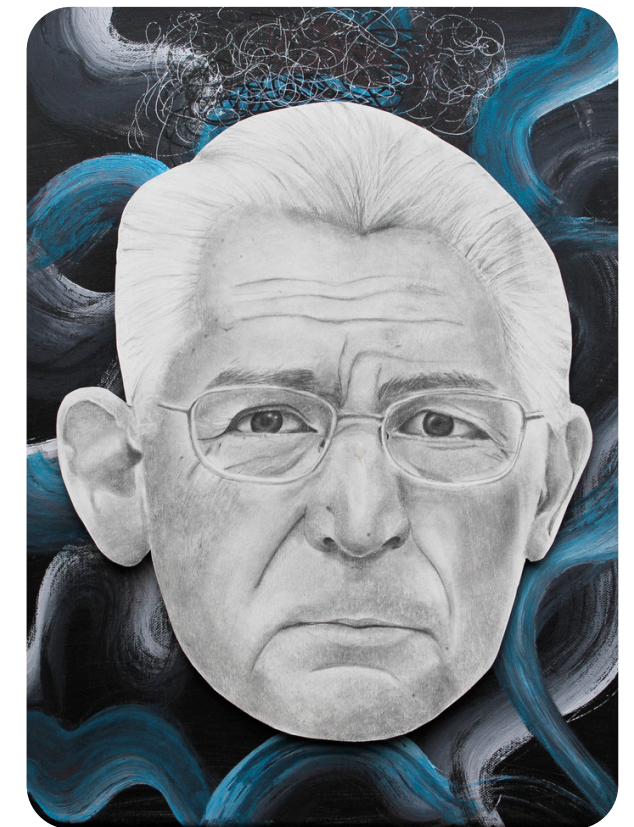
