MISSION STATEMENT
It is the mission of Marcos de Niza High School to nurture a positive environment in which all students are inspired to strengthen their character, challenged to reach their highest level of achievement and prepared to be enrolled, enlisted, or employed upon graduation.

ACADEMICS

ACADEMICS OFFICE

The registration office is where you can receive assistance with student schedules, transcripts, and graduation information. Although we try our best to make sure everyone graduates on time, it is ultimately each student's responsibility to ensure the successful completion of his/her final year of high school.

STUDENT SCHEDULES

The first day of school is always a heavily anticipated one. Students can ensure a smooth first day by attending book distribution to obtain their textbooks and official schedule. Student schedules will be available on Student vue the week before the first day of school. If for some reason you are unable to participate in book distribution, any unclaimed schedules will be available in the guidance office and/or the administrative office first morning of school beginning at 7:30 a.m. If you must wait until the first day of school to get your schedule, please allow yourself extra time to get to the guidance office or the administrative office and still report to your first class by 8:00 a.m. We will follow the regular school day schedule which begins at 7:50 a.m. and ends at 2:42 p.m.

STUDENT PLANNERS

The Marcos de Niza High School Student Handbook/Academic Planner will be available. It is strongly recommended that parents/guardians review it with their student. The information contained in the Student Handbook/Academic Planner is specific to MDN and may differ from other schools that students have attended. A copy of the Student Handbook/Academic Planner will be provided free of charge.

DISTRICT STUDENT HANDBOOK DISTRIBUTION

During the first week of the 18-19 school year, the MdN Administrative team will meet with each grade level to present the Student Handbook, and distribute receipt forms to be signed and returned. The handbook is available to access on the front page of the Tempe Union website: tempeunion.org. Parents or guardians should sign where indicated and return the signature form with the student to school. Please keep this book available as it contains many district-related policies and procedures that you may find informative.

SCHEDULE CHANGE PROCEDURES

Schedule change request forms are available in the Guidance Office beginning in July. If you request a change after the school year begins, it may not be possible to add new classes to your schedule. Again, you must present the schedule change request form to the Guidance Office. Until you receive a new schedule, you are expected to attend all classes that are listed on your current schedule.

STUDENT INFORMATION UPDATE

It is imperative that the school has your current address with accurate home, work, and cell phone numbers. To make necessary changes to student information, please contact the Attendance Office.

PLEASE NOTE: You should contact the Attendance Office if:

1. You have moved. All address changes need to be made by the parent/guardian and must be accompanied by proof of address.
2. You have changed your phone numbers.
3. You need to change the designated emergency contact in your child's records.

REQUESTS FOR CHANGE IN TEACHERS

Students do not have the option of requesting a particular teacher. Once schedules are established, a teacher change will be considered only if the student has taken a class with that teacher in the past and did not successfully complete the course. Those changes must be made before the school year begins. Once school starts in August, teacher changes will not be made. If you find that you are having difficulty with one of your teachers, you are advised to follow a two-step process to resolve a concern. Outside of class time, meet with the teacher to discuss your concerns. You are encouraged to include one or both of your parents or guardians in that discussion. As general rule, most issues are addressed when they are openly discussed in this type of conference. If you don't feel the concern has been remedied after talking with the teacher, you may request a conference with the department chair for that subject area, the teacher and your parent/guardian. The department chair will make a recommendation to the AP of Academics. The administrator will be the final authority in determining whether or not a teacher change will be allowed.

MINIMUM COURSE LOADS

Only seniors will be allowed a release period. There are minimum course loads that must be maintained for students participating in AIA events. Consult the Assistant Principal/Athletics for details. Students may enroll for a maximum of six credits during the regular school day without incurring a cost. All classes outside of six classes total each semester will be an added cost.

ONLINE, CORRESPONDENCE, AND CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT STUDENTS

All online, correspondence, and concurrent enrollment courses must have prior approval from a counselor and the assistant principal— registrar if students expect to receive high school credit. There is a form that must be completed and on record prior to registering for a course. It is the student's responsibility to have an official transcript submitted to the records clerk upon completion of the course prior to **May 13, 2019**. All courses must meet Tempe Union High School District's curriculum standards. These standards include content as well as credit hours. Again, make sure to check with your counselor to ensure that the course you are taking satisfies the District's graduation requirements. Without prior approval the course will not be accepted.

ATTENDANCE



REPORTING STUDENT ABSENCES THE ATTENDANCE OFFICE IS OPEN WEEKDAYS FROM 7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

To report an absence, please access the voice mail system (available 24 hours) using the numbers listed in the box below. Only parents or legal guardians may excuse absences. In order for an absence to be excused, the parent/legal guardian must call the Attendance Office within 24 hours of the absence.

EXCUSING STUDENTS FOR APPOINTMENTS (EXCEPT FOR LUNCH TIMES)

To excuse a student for an appointment, etc., send a note with him/her to bring to the Attendance Office at the beginning of the school day. An off-campus pass will be issued to the student so that he/she may leave class at the appropriate time. By using this procedure, your son/daughter can be waiting for you in the front office. Students must **ALWAYS** check into the Attendance Office when returning to school so that the time can be noted and the student can be admitted to class.

PLEASE NOTE: attendance voice mailboxes are only for reporting student absences. No personal messages will be received.

EXCUSING NINTH AND TENTH GRADE STUDENTS AT LUNCHTIME

To enable a ninth or tenth grade student to leave the campus at lunchtime, a parent or legal guardian must personally visit the Attendance Office to complete the checkout process. A note or phone call will not be accepted. This policy is in effect due to the closure of the campus at lunchtime for ninth and tenth grade students.

EXCUSING STUDENTS FOR LATE ARRIVAL TO SCHOOL

To excuse your son or daughter for arriving late to school, you must check in with your student at the front office. A pass will be issued at that time. If no parent/ guardian checks the student in your son/daughter will be sent directly to sweep.

ATTENDANCE RULES AND REGULATIONS

A student may lose the opportunity to earn credit when eleven total absences (excused and/or unexcused) are reached in any individual class during a semester. Unexcused absences will be recorded separately from excused absences and could result in disciplinary action

DEFINITIONS AND GUIDELINES

SWEEP: A student will be sent to sweep when he/she is late to class.

ABSENCE: A student who does not attend a class or arrives 20 or more minutes late is considered absent.

EXCUSED ABSENCE: An absence is legitimate (excused) under the following conditions:

- Personal illness
- Doctor or dentist appointment
- Serious family illness
- Death in family
- Important family business
- Checking out of school through the Nurse or Attendance Office
- Religious holiday



Students will be allowed the number of days absent to make up assignments. In the case of long-term projects such as research papers or reports, it is the teacher's prerogative to set specific due dates. It is the student's responsibility to submit long-term projects on those specific due dates regardless if an absence is excused or unexcused. If extenuating circumstances exist, i.e. an extreme emergency or extended illness only, students will be given an extension; however, parents must notify the teacher prior to or on the due date when an emergency arises.

UNEXCUSED ABSENCE: Any absence that is not excused within 24 hours of the absence by a parent/guardian. Students will be accountable for information missed. It is recommended that no credit be given by the teacher.

SCHOOL-RELATED ABSENCE: If a student misses a class due to a pre-approved, school-related activity, it will not count as an absence.

SUSPENSION: The days of suspension, even though suspension is considered a serious consequence, do not count as absences toward the attendance policy.

ATTENDANCE PROCEDURE:

- Computer attendance calls will be made daily.
- On the 11th total absence, the student will be referred to Ms. Lenica Ruiz, attendance coordinator.

The student's grades are subject to change at any time and is not official until reported on a district-issued report card. Student grades are posted for your convenience as a general indicator of the student's progress.



BUS SERVICES

Bus service is available to students who live outside a two mile radius of the campus and within the Marcos boundaries. It is important for students to remember that school rules not only apply while on campus but also while riding a school bus or waiting at a bus stop. See the bus schedule for times and locations of pick up and drop off. Times will vary to accommodate special schedules. Students should arrive at the bus stop at least 15 minutes before the scheduled time. All pick up times are approximate.

EARLY LEARNING: REGISTER NOW!

The Marcos de Niza preschool program is designed for three, four, and five year old children. Marcos' preschool provides a rich and stimulating environment through which our children can safely explore and discover the world around them. We help our children establish positive social relationships with other children their own age, a positive self-image, and a positive attitude toward school. We use a wide range of materials to stimulate motor and intellectual development. Through planned as well as unstructured activities, the children touch, taste, smell, hear, and see the world around them. The program is organized and focused on the children's abilities, skills, and interests. The Marcos de Niza preschool is also a high school laboratory center. Our high school "student-teachers" observe, plan, and teach the children under the direction of our professional staff. In addition to the practical experience in the preschool, our students are also learning child development theory in the classroom. Parental involvement is encouraged and welcomed. We plan several family activities throughout the year and hope all families of our preschool are able to attend. Weekly tuition is \$140.00 per week. The preschool follows the high school calendar and is open daily from 6:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Opening day for the preschool is August 6th and TUHSD staff and community members are welcome to enroll. POLICIES

SWEEP BUILDS RESPONSIBILITY

The SWEEP program addresses any student who is tardy. A student who is tardy is sent to the SWEEP area, room 504. The purpose of the SWEEP program is to reinforce the importance of punctuality, responsibility, and respect. If a student enters a class after the bell rings, it is a disruption to the learning process of all of the students in the class.

- Students are not allowed to be tardy to any class.
- All students who are late for any class period throughout the day are SWEPT.
- Tardiness of more than 10 minutes is classified as an absence.
- Every third SWEEP will count as an unexcused absence.
- Students with excessive time in SWEEP may have further disciplinary action taken by the administration.
- A student attending SWEEP sits quietly for the remainder of the hour he or she is SWEPT.
- The student is responsible to see the teacher of the class she or he missed in order to turn in work, learn what was covered in class, and receive homework assignments.
- Remember, it is the student's responsibility to see the teacher of the missed class by the end of that day to make up the missed work for credit.
- The support of this program by parents and students, as well as of all of the MdN staff, will help create a climate for learning at Marcos de Niza High School.

SCHOOL SAFETY POLICIES

VISITOR INFORMATION



Visitors must check in with the front office. You will be required to leave your photo ID upon receiving a visitor's badge to be on campus. Once you have completed your visit on campus, you will need to check out in the front office to obtain your ID and return your visitor's badge.

This process will be implemented so that we have an accurate record of who has been on campus and/or who is on the campus should there be an emergency situation in which people need to be accounted. Thank you in advance for your cooperation and assistance in implementing this new procedure.

CLOSED CAMPUS

The MdN Site Council determined that the MdN campus would be closed for incoming freshman and sophomores. A closed campus for freshman and sophomores means that those students may not leave the campus during lunch unless they are signed out by a parent. Juniors and seniors are permitted to leave campus at lunch provided they first complete an application and meet the criteria to leave campus. Juniors and seniors may leave the campus during their release hour provided they can show a current schedule or release card. If you have questions about our closed campus policy, feel free to contact the principal at (480) 838-3200.



LOCK-DOWN DRILLS

When there is a situation on or near the campus that has the potential to endanger students, the school's administration will place the campus under "lock-down." Classroom and building doors are locked and all students and staff remain inside until the lock-down is lifted. Beginning with the fall semester, Marcos de Niza will initiate random lock-down drills. Similar to a fire drill, lock-down drills will not be pre-announced, but the information that it is only a drill will be available should parents call in and inquire.



2018-2019 MDN STUDENT IDENTIFICATION CARD

All students are required to wear their student ID cards. All students will be issued a new (free of charge) student identification card upon enrollment in high school. ID cards will be available during book distribution, and students should come prepared to have their picture taken. Your student's first opportunity to have their ID picture taken will be during book distribution Wednesday, July 26th, Thursday, July 27th, Friday, July 28th, from 8:00 a.m. -11:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m.-3:00 p.m. and Monday, July 31st from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and 2:00-6:00 p.m.

Pictures for new ID cards are taken in the Audio Visual Room (room 121) in Building 100. If you do not have your ID picture taken during book distribution, your next opportunity will be Monday, August 6th through Friday, August 17th from 7:45 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and from 12:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. The Audio Visual Room (121) is located at the south entrance of the 100 Building on the right hand side. Starting the third week of school ID cards will only be processed before school during lunch and after school. Only newly enrolled students may come during class time. Be sure to bring your receipts and or schedules.

School ID cards are also required for lunch, tickets, voting, dances, and other school activities. This card is lost, a new one must be purchased for \$5.00 at the bookstore. Students must bring a copy of their schedule when they come to have their picture taken or a receipt if they have paid for a replacement ID. If a student withdraws from school, the ID card must be returned to the administrative office.

POLICIES

CODE OF CONDUCT

In order for ALL students to learn, it is the duty of the teachers and staff to develop and enforce a set of rules and consequences within the classroom and on campus that maintains a high standard of order. Each individual teacher is to develop a discipline plan. All rules (within reason) may be enforced in a classroom.

STUDENT DRESS CODE

It is the belief of the faculty, staff and administration that school pride, morale and image are influenced by the general appearance of our students. Additionally, Marcos de Niza expects student dress and grooming to reflect high standards of personal conduct so that each student's attire promotes a positive, safe and healthy atmosphere within our school. We want to provide freedom for students to express themselves within the set of parameters listed below.

- Attire or accessories that advertise, display and/or promote any drug, alcohol, tobacco, sexual activity, violence, disrespect, language that is lewd, vulgar, profane or obscene, or bigotry towards any group or person are not allowed.
- Any attire or grooming deemed to be gang-related is prohibited when such attire or grooming creates an atmosphere of threat, intimidation or undue pressure or disrupts the educational environment/process or interferes with curriculum goals/educational objectives. Examples include, but are not limited to, memory shirts, bandanas, curl caps, hairnets, confederate flag items, and do rags.
- Dress, jewelry, skin markings (temporary or permanent), and other accessories that present a risk to health, safety and general welfare of students, that express obscenities, that expose chest or cleavage, abdomen, genital areas, upper thighs or buttocks are prohibited. Examples include, but are not limited to, the following: low cut or see-through blouses, muscle shirts, undergarments worn as outer garment (including tank top undershirts), tube tops, halter tops, back-less tops, pants that drag excessively on the ground or any clothing that allows underwear or bare skin to show at the waist, clothing that allows undergarments to be exposed, spiked jewelry and chains, and any clothing or other articles of apparel considered by the staff to be immodest, obscene, or objectionable.
- Body piercing that is a safety hazard and/or hinders performance in the classroom is not allowed.
- Shoes will be worn at all times according to state law.
- Sunglasses are prohibited in the classroom.
- Hats and other accessories may be allowed/disallowed at faculty/ staff discretion.
- Pajamas, loungewear, and slippers are not to be worn on campus at any time.
- Administration may make exceptions for uniforms, formal attire and/or costumes that are part of school-related activity.
- Non-dresses in P.E. – Administration has the right to remove any student from P.E. to Study Hall when the student reaches an excessive number of non-dress days.

DISRUPTIVE DEVICES/PROHIBITED MATERIALS

In order to prevent the disruption of the educational process, the use of cell phones and other electronic devices will not be allowed during educational time. This includes cell phones*, iPods, CD players, lasers, and any other device deemed disruptive by the administration. In the event that a student is caught with such a device, a discipline referral will be sent to administration for "prohibited materials." Consequences will range from two hours of detention for a first offense up to suspension for repeat offenses. Cell phones may be used during passing periods and during lunchtime. The school will not be responsible for lost, stolen or damaged items. *In order to protect this campus as well as the students and staff that work here, administration reserves the right to confiscate and review the contents of student cell phones.

OTHER PROHIBITED MATERIALS



Graffiti, or tagging, is an issue on school campuses. To avoid temptation, students may not be in possession of permanent markers, sandpaper or any marking pen on school grounds. Markers will be confiscated and he/she will face disciplinary action.

ARIZONA SCHOOL IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS

Students must have proof of ALL required immunizations, or a valid exemption, in order to attend/enroll at Marcos de Niza. In order for immunizations to be considered "Up To Date", students must have proof of the following:

- 1) DPT/Td or Tdap: minimum 3 doses. Last dose must be within the last 10 years
- 2) Polio (IPV): minimum 3 doses. One dose received after age 4.
- 3) Measles, Mumps, Rubella (MMR): minimum 2 doses. One dose received after age 1.
- 4) Hepatitis B (HBV): minimum 3 doses
- 5) Meningococcal (MCV4): minimum 1 dose. 6) Varicella (VAR): minimum 1 dose, received before age 13.

Your pediatrician is the best place to get immunizations. For a list of free immunization clinics go to: www.mcchip.org. Please bring a copy of any updated immunizations to the school nurse. Please inform your school nurse of any other pertinent medical information.

2018-2019 ACTIVITY FEE SCHEDULE

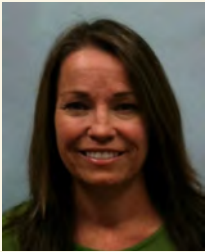

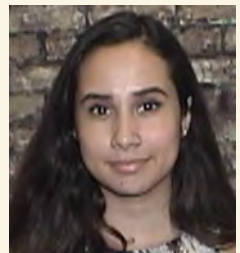

GUIDANCE RESPONSIBILITIES

The main responsibility/role that each counselor assumes is that of Academic Guidance. This is the top priority of a school counselor. Each counselor:

- Coordinates appropriate developmental Guidance information through classroom presentations
- Facilitates ECAP (Education and Career Action Plan) program, including lesson plans, classroom presentations and maintenance of a student's current plan of coursework, career aspirations, and extended learning opportunities
- Aids designated students with academic planning
- Maintains credit checks of designated students
- Registers designated Regular Education students for the upcoming school year
- Registers new/incoming Regular Education students throughout the year
- Takes care of schedule change requests throughout the year of designated students
- Provides academic support of designated students; i.e. tutoring requests, homework requests for suspended students, study skills help, etc.
- Works closely with the Attendance/At Risk Coordinator to support "at-risk" designated Regular Education students
- Coordinates registration for classes through Tempe Union On-Line (TUOL), MDLP (Mesa Distance Learning Program), and Summer Education Academy
- Approves on-line, correspondence, and college courses outside of the district for designated students through the use of the Alternative Credit Approval Form
- Assists in facilitating the AZMerit and Stanford 10 testing throughout the year
- Assists with proctoring of AP testing
- Schedules and facilitates requested parent/teacher conferences of designated Regular Education students
- Coordinates 504 conferences for designated students
- Follows up on all freshmen and new students identified with a potential academic problem through the Student Screening process
- Coordinates evaluation/screenings of designated students
- Attends Kid Talk meetings
- Writes letters of recommendation and aids in the college application process of designated students
- Aids designated students with scholarship opportunities
- Aids designated students with career guidance
- Aids designated students with personal/social issues and referrals
- Facilitates homebound and chronic illness eligibility
- Coordinates and facilitates interventions for school wide crisis situations
- Facilitates mandatory harassment sensitivity training
- Documents all meetings and needed information in student conference notes in Synergy.

PSAT TESTING

TUHSD will be administering the PSAT to students on Wednesday, October 16th 2019. We will not have an early release that day, but will be on a modified schedule to be announced at a later date.

MILITARY OPT-OUT

These forms exist for anyone who would not like to have their contact information released to any of the Armed Forces. These forms must be submitted annually as they do not automatically renew from year to year.

MILITARY NOTICES: SELECTIVE SERVICE

The Selective Service is a government agency whose job is to provide untrained man power for the Armed Forces if there's a national emergency. The law says that all 18-year-old men (including U.S. citizens living abroad and non-citizen immigrant males 18-25 residing in the U.S.) must register. The only young men exempt from registration are non-citizen males who are in the U.S. temporarily as tourists, diplomats and their family members, or foreign exchange students; incarcerated or institutionalized men; men on active duty in the Armed Forces; and students at U.S. military academies. You are required to register within 30 days of your 18th birthday. If you cannot register on time because you are hospitalized or in prison, you have 30 days in which to register after you are released. If 30 days have already passed since your 18th birthday, register immediately, either online or at your post office. Although Selective Service will accept a late registration, the longer you wait, the longer you are breaking the law and jeopardizing your future benefits. Contact us: Selective Service System.

Marcos de Niza High School Rio Salado Dual Enrollment 2018 - 2019

Dual enrollment courses allow high school students the ability to earn college credit and high school credit simultaneously during regular MdN school hours. For more information about dual enrollment, eligibility, residency, prerequisites, and a list of courses offered at Marcos de Niza, click on www.riosalado.edu/dual. On the right side of the webpage, click list of participating schools link for information regarding Marcos de Niza. The cost is \$86 per credit hour plus a \$15 registration fee for each semester. Dual enrollment teachers will provide registration information to their students when school resumes in August.

Placement Testing:

The Accuplacer test was provided at MdN in April and May for students who will need it for fall enrollment in a Rio Salado class. Students, who did not take the Accuplacer or did not have a high enough test score, please read below:

Students who did not take the Accuplacer tests at MdN this spring will need to go to a Rio Testing Center over the summer. Go to www.riosalado.edu/locations/Pages/testing.aspx for testing locations and hours. Students will need a picture ID to test. Please ask for a print out of the student's score.

To make it easier on students to qualify for enrollment for college math and pre-calculus courses. RIO will now accept an unweighted GPA score as placement rather than taking a math placement test. The qualify GPA for college math is a minimum of 2.6 GPA and for pre-calculus is a minimum 3.0 GPA.

CAFETERIA

FOOD AND NUTRITION OFFICE GENERAL INFORMATION

Tempe Union High School District offers a wide variety of food choices. Students can choose menu items from at least four or more specialized food court areas. Daily menu choices include pizza, burgers & fries, Casa Solana Mexican foods, as well as freshly made subs, sandwiches and bagels. All food items are sold ala carte with the exception of the Combo Lunch. Combo Lunches are priced from \$3.00 for students and \$4.00 for faculty and staff. It includes milk, fruit and salad. A complete combo lunch is nutritionally equivalent to a meal that is served in the National School Lunch Program. Combo Lunch menus are as follows: shaved turkey breast sandwich, chef salad, or bean burro or a beef taco and a daily special. The district's pricing policy encourages students to select nutritionally smart menu choices. Students may purchase fresh fruit, full strength juices, milk, yogurt and freshly made salads at very reasonable prices. Less nutritious foods are priced considerably higher.

Free or reduced lunch does not roll over from the prior year or school. You must apply every school year. Make sure to fill your application during book distribution.



ACCOUNT MANAGEMENT

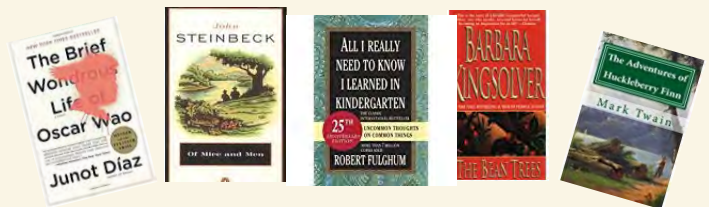

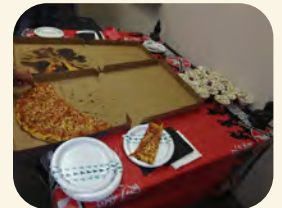
3M READING CHALLENGE

Read like a Ninja! STUDENT PARKING PERMITS

Parking applications will be available in the bookstore during Book Distribution Week, as well as throughout the school year. Student parking permits may be purchased in the bookstore for \$50 per year. Students and parents dropping off students are expected to comply with all posted signs and all directions given by school security guards. Failure to comply with either can result in loss of parking privilege and/or discipline by the administration.

DETAILS

1. Pay the fee at the bookstore and pick up the parking permit application. Once it has been signed by the student and parent/guardian, it should be given to the security guard in the student parking lot on the first day the student drives to school. The security guard will then issue the parking sticker and your application will be maintained in the athletic office.
2. Parking stickers are not transferable and must be affixed to the windshield of the vehicle for which the application was completed. Every vehicle parked in the student parking lot MUST be registered with the athletic office.
3. A \$5.00 fee will be charged for duplicate vehicle stickers regardless of the reason. This includes broken windshields, new vehicles or change of vehicles. Additional vehicles are charged the full price. Vehicles without stickers may be towed at the owner's expense. No refunds will be given to students who forfeit their parking privileges due to infraction of school rules or if the application has been falsified in any way.



ATHLETIC PASSES

These passes provide a significant savings over the cost of paying for each individual entry and save you the time of standing in line. The pass not only covers the cost of varsity football, but ALL athletic events where an entry fee is charged – three levels of football, volleyball, basketball, soccer, etc. Entry fees can add up quickly, so why not save some money and buy a pass!

DETAILS:

1. The cost for the Athletic Pass: Student – TBD, 2 Adult – \$75.00 and Family \$140 total per family of 4 in the same household.
2. Simply make your purchase in the bookstore and bring your receipt to the athletic office to receive your pass.
3. A pass will be printed on the student ID for all Marcos de Niza students. Adults and siblings who purchase a Family Pack, an individual pass, will be issued to each family member up to (4) four. Additional passes can be purchased for \$35.00 each.
4. When entering the event, you will be required to present the pass to the ticket taker. These passes are not transferable and are only good for ONE entry into each event. In addition, they **cannot** be used during AIA events, such as play-off games and invitationals.
5. If you lose or damage your pass, you may purchase a replacement for \$5.00, with proof of the original purchased athletic event receipt.

COLLEGE BOUND ATHLETES

We are pleased to inform you that Marcos de Niza High School is making CoreCourseGPA.com, a web-based software program, available to all Marcos de Niza High School student-athletes and their parents/guardians free of charge. If your child has aspirations of competing athletically as a freshman at an NCAA Division I or Division II school, they must meet NCAA initial eligibility minimum standards, including minimum core course GPA and SAT/ACT test score requirements.
