

Social-Emotional Competencies and Self-Identity







All-Staff Professional Development Day

A total of **43 breakout sessions** were offered, with an average rating of 9.4/10. Additionally, 86% of staff reported that the professional development had a positive impact. The sessions were **facilitated by 25 LBUSD staff members**.



EARLY LEARNING PROGRAM UPDATE



SCHOOL READINESS CAMPS

TK/Kindergarten Readiness Camp | 63 students

- Incoming TK and Kindergarten students are invited to a week-long camp at each elementary school to build school readiness skills and engage with peers while adapting to their new environment.

Handwriting/Fine Motor Camp | 25 students

- Students identified by their kindergarten teachers as needing extra help with fine motor skills participate in sessions led by a school-based occupational therapist before school hours.

Learning Link Program | 90+ families participated in 2023-24

- Offers weekly workshops for parents/guardians and children ages 2 to 5 years old, providing interactive sessions that support early childhood development and strengthen parent-child engagement.

- Staff will present options to maximize incentives, rebates, and secure financing to implement projects that meet the 2030 carbon neutral goal





FACILITIES MASTER PLAN UPDATE

Phase: Concept Development
