

An Interview With John V. Dolan, Superintendent of Schools By Reese Sinkevich and Madelyn Halter



Redmen Reporter staff members interviewed Mr. Dolan on April 19, 2021 to get his view on the school year. This interview is all about changes with the pandemic in the spotlight. The interview will give you opinions and advice from Mr. Dolan. The reason we wanted to interview him is because with this tough year almost behind us, we could all use a little advice and a positive point of view, something that is one of Mr. Dolan's strong suits.

1 - It has been a whirlwind of a school year. How did you cope with the constant changes? Each school year is a whirlwind. Schools are places where students come to have their curiosity challenged and have their thoughts, ideas and minds mature. When learning takes place, progress is made, and progress cannot be made without change.

The COVID pandemic did create a constant stream of change. The winds of the whirlwind did blow a little stronger than usual. To cope with these changes, I did my best to listen carefully, to listen with my mind and my heart with as much empathy as possible. I sought the advice and input from a wide variety of people and took deep breaths as I listened to them.

2 - Overall, you had to make many decisions. Were you happy with these decisions? Were there any decisions you made that you are unhappy with?

It is very hard to judge decisions in the moment. Each decision that was made came after input from appropriate groups or people, careful thought and consideration and with an eye towards moving forward. After decisions were made, we evaluated the progress and made changes and adjustments as necessary. History will decide if the decisions that were made were good or not. As I always do, we will look back on the year to assess and reflect upon the decisions that were made. There will be things that we are proud of and there will be things that we learn from this self-reflecting that will make us stronger moving forward.

3 - The EIMS has had a very small COVID-19 positivity rate throughout the school year. What were some key decisions you made that you think kept that rate low?

Before I answer this, please knock on wood. There was no decision made that kept the positivity rates low. What kept the positivity rates low were the good decisions made by the students, teachers, support staff, parents, and the community. We decided early on to do our best to remain supportive and encourage people to make good choices. It was the good choices of the entire East Islip community that has contributed to our ability to reopen schools and stay open. For that I am truly grateful and thank everyone for making sacrifices.

4 - What is your general overview of this school year: thumbs up, thumbs down, or somewhere in the middle? And why?

My overview of the school year is a definitive thumbs up. My heart goes out to everyone who has lost a loved one, to all the people who have suffered during this year. The reason I say "thumbs up" is because the best way to honor those we have lost or people who have been hurt is by remaining positive and building towards recovery and ultimately a better world for all.

Everyone has been affected by COVID. As we move closer and closer to a post-COVID world, people are beginning to realize just how strong they are as individuals but more importantly, just how much stronger we can be when we pull together to meet the challenges that life throws at us.

5 - For next school year, are we going to continue to use Google Classroom? Will we need to wear masks?

We will continue to use our 1:1 devices and Google Classroom. I trust the teachers and administrators will work together as we evolve the delivery of instruction. My hope is in the years to come, students will be exposed to different platforms. Digital learning is here to stay. Once again, I trust that the teachers and administrators will work together to find just the right recipe for learning. One thing we will never waver from is we want our students in our schools with the adults who guide them, inspire them and serve as role models. As far as wearing masks, we will follow the direction of the Department of Health.

6 - Is there anything you would like to say to the East Islip Middle School? Any comments?A big thanks to everyone for working together so we can be back in school. I am deeply appreciative of all the efforts and sacrifices that you have made. Your hard work, your enthusiasm and great smiles are what is fueling our recovery.

Well, that was the interview. We would like to thank Mr. Dolan for his time and Mrs. Avella for setting everything up. So much planning went into this and everything came out perfect. We couldn't have asked for a better interview. We are hoping next year is more of a "normal" year. Have a great day!

Why you should play Apex Legends By Adam Menendez

As of late, my favorite video game has been Apex Legends. Imagine a wide variety of characters as seen in **Overwatch**, with the graphics of **COD**, and located on several **Fortnite**-like battle royale maps. That's **Apex**.

When you ready up for a match, it'll pair you up with two other teammates and you pick your character. There are currently sixteen of them (they add more every season), each with different balanced abilities that you can get creative with. After you pick your character, you and your team jump off the dropship and land at a certain location. You loot up and eliminate other squads until there is only one left alive.

There are two things that set **Apex** apart from other battle royale games. Those two things are the movement, and the character abilities. The first one might need some explaining. In **Apex**, there's this satisfying slide that you can do when you crouch while running that will make you go faster for a second. Also, each character has a different hitbox and expressive animations that are unique to each of them. These two things let you do many creative things with the movement in this game like travelling the map at high speeds and literally dodging bullets.

The second thing that makes **Apex** unique is the character abilities. This one is less in general, so I'll use one character as an example. Pathfinder is a friendly robot who can shoot grapples to get somewhere fast. But traveling in a straight line is not his strong suit. When he changes the angle of his flight midair, he can fly past the object he is grappled to and gain a lot of ground. This is super helpful in a tight spot and gets more helpful the more creative you are with it.

These things, in my opinion, make **Apex** a unique and fun experience that you should try out if you find yourself with some free time (it's free to play). Thanks for your time.

The Creative Writing Process I Use By Sally Attard

To start off the intro, I want to say that there is such a beautiful aspect to writing and, the word choices can interest me so easily. It is a matter of the words you, as a writer choose in each context, and a matter of the order. When you are a writer, then you'd like to write, of course. There are many techniques in writing, and many books on that. Just in case you can't find a book, I'm going to give a short description of my writing process.

First off, what I do is create a setting. The setting isn't the most important thing to have in a story, though it'll lead you into what you're writing about next. The setting can be whatever you want, since there are no limits in creative writing. For example, I have created a universe with multiple worlds, each of the worlds having different themes and different climates. They have different vibes, or personalities, each of the vibes/personalities being my own at certain times.

Abbie Emmons is a YouTuber I watch for advice on writing. She claims that the most important thing in a story is a character. It is like the water you would need when stranded on an island. That is a good segue into the next thing I do when I start writing.

After I create a setting, I have to get a good idea of where and when the characters' backstories will take place. A large portion of time spent when creating a character, for me, is coming up with a name and going on baby names websites. The next thing you should do is put yourself in this character's shoes. You must create this character's personality, and by doing so, you need to explain why these characters act in the way they do. The backstory can involve things like the lack of parental figures, getting bullied or being taught to steal at a young age. The way that the parent acts to the kid reflects onto that kid. And sometimes, the parent can be distant in order to reflect on the child's mindset. This can affect the child both positively and negatively.

Now that you have the setting and characters, you will have to create a plot, meaning you will plan how the characters act towards each other. A large part of that would be including how people on drastically different ends of the bell curve would act towards each other, like a Scorpio and a Taurus for example. These people can be completely distant from each other with small moments where they mention one another, for example.

People, in my opinion, will cause most of the conflicts that the characters face. Conflicts can include conflicts with self, conflicts with others, conflicts with nature and conflicts with the supernatural. You can add them all together, combining them, depending on what you are going for when writing.

You can write skits to influence the plot in some way, for sure, having no idea where it will take you. This can give some examples of what possibly could happen. But what I have also tried is writing the plot down in advance, so I do both. For me, I write without dialogue, basically stating what the characters do or think. The only time I would include dialogue would be if I want to add in a line my character can say specifically. During the writing of the plot, there is always a way that you can include additional characters to add on to the conflict, or just support your main character or protagonist.

There are no limits to what you can write about, and I want to make sure that you, the reader, knows that. I am just giving a general idea of how I write, and it is fine if you write differently. By writing this article, I'm hoping that you can see a way that a writer, like me, writes. Maybe it can influence the way you use the element of creative writing, maybe not. Everyone's writing will be different, and the variation counts in all ways, contributing to creative writing.




Book Recommendation: "The Heroes of Olympus" By Adam Menendez

One of my favorite book series is "The Heroes of Olympus" by Rick Riordan. It takes place in the same timeline of events as his earlier series "Percy Jackson & The Olympians" after the main story is over.

The new main character of the first book (The Lost Hero) is Jason. He wakes up at the beginning of the book on a school bus full of kids he doesn't know, with no idea how he got there. He can't remember anything prior to waking up. Jason and his two friends, who also seem to have their memory altered, get caught up in fighting a bunch of Greek monsters, gods, and giants, and it's revealed that the Roman gods have also been causing trouble.

Throughout the series, mysteries are solved and new problems come up. New characters are introduced, and old characters reappear. And it ends with room for a sequel series (which is already out – "The Trials of Apollo").

If you like action and adventure, then definitely give "The Heroes of Olympus" a try.



The Slow Loris By Jessica Leek

The slow loris is a nocturnal primate that is found in many regions of Asia. They have round heads, narrow snouts, very large eyes and distinct color patterns which differ with each species. Their arms and legs are almost the same length, and they have a flexible torso to help them move around. Their hands have strong grips to allow them to hold on to branches for long periods of time. They have a feature as many primates do, where their nose and lips are covered in moist skin called rhinarium, which is a sense organ.

Lorises eat a variety of insects, small birds, eggs, fruits and saps. They mostly eat vegetation and gum, also known as sap.

There are many different species of the slow loris. One is the pygmy slow loris which is a miniature version that lives in regions of Vietnam and China. They live in a forest habitat, sometimes even rainforests. They have a short tail and small bodies. Another species is the Bornean slow loris which lives in the central region of Borneo and Indonesia. They have a lighter body color and large eyes. In total there are 9 species of lorises, and all have distinct color patterns.

Slow lorises have a toxic bite, which is extremely rare in primates. The toxin comes from licking a sweat gland on their arm, and then mixing it with their saliva, making a powerful toxin. Loris bites can cause pain, swelling, and even death. There was one human death recorded in 1972 as a result of going into anaphylactic shock after a bite.

Some people keep slow lorises as pets because they are cute. What they don't know is that in some countries, keeping slow lorises as pets is illegal. Although they are adorable, they have a strong odor and a painful bite. They are also endangered, making them even worse pets. To ensure children's safety, some owners buy them from animal dealers, and they cut the front teeth off with nail clippers or pull them out with pliers. This makes it hard for the animals to bite and eat food and sometimes leads to infection and death.



Interesting facts:

- 1. Lorises only weigh around 0.3 to 4 pounds.
- 2. Slow lorises have a six month pregnancy and live up to 25 years.
- 3. The name "loris" in Dutch means "clown" which probably refers to the colors on their face.
- 4. They are the rarest primates in the world. The second rarest is their cousin, the bush baby.
- 5. In Indonesia, slow lorises are called *malu malu*, or "shy one" because they freeze and cover their face when spotted.

The New York Islanders are getting a new arena, but where will it be, and what will it look like? Let's find out.

Past Places

Between the years of 1972 and 2021, the New York Islanders have been in two arenas: Nassau Coliseum, and Barclays Center. Nassau Coliseum (aka The Barn) was their first home from the years 1972 to 2014. In 2015, they decided the Coliseum was too small and moved to Brooklyn. They they shared an arena with the Brooklyn Nets at Barclays Center for another four years before splitting the games between the Coliseum and Barclays. After renovations at the Coliseum in 2020, they decided to leave Barclays for good. Although it was fun, at the end of the day, it was built for basketball not hockey.

Sounds complicated, right? Well, all that would change when the Isles publicly announced they would build a new arena in Elmont right next to the racetrack at Belmont Park. The plan is to have it ready the 2021 -22 season. Though COVID slightly slowed construction, the new arena is looking amazing so far. It will be called UBS Arena, named for the Swiss bank UBS.

End Results

When the construction ends, in addition to the arena, there will also be a mall, a restaurant, and a hotel. The management team got an artist to show what UBS Arena will look like when it's complete (see image to the right).

During the process of designing UBS, they went to look at other hockey arenas to get inspiration so that this new one would be the best one in the NHL. They will also be using new technology like Amazon Pay. Let's say you want to get cotton candy. With your card info already in your amazon account you just walk up, grab the cotton candy and go. It is automatically charged to your card. I don't know about you, but I am very excited to see the finished project season!



Paige's Kitchen: Red Velvet Cupcakes By Paige Mathers

Ingredients

- ½ cup of oil
- ½ cup of sugar
- 4 tbsp of milk
- 2 egg whites
- ½ tsp of food dye
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 1/4 tsp of white vinegar
- ²/₃ cup and 2 tbsp of flour
- 4 tsp cocoa powder
- ¼ tsp of baking soda
- ¼ tsp of salt

<u>Equipment</u>

- Oven
- Cupcake tin
- Cupcake liners
- Whisk or electric mixer
- Rubber spatula
- Large bowl
- Small bowl (optional)
- Measuring utensils
- Scooper or spoon



Remember to wash your hands whenever touching or making food.

- **Step 1:** Preheat the oven to 350°F and put cupcake liners in a cupcake pan.
- **Step 2:** In a large bowl add flour, cocoa powder, baking soda, and salt.
- Step 3: Mix. I suggest using a whisk for this step so you don't have flour everywhere.
- Step 4: In another bowl, combine oil, sugar and vanilla extract. Once combined, mix again.
- Step 5: Add milk, egg whites, food dye and white vinegar to the bowl in step 4.
- **Step 6**: Slowly combine dry and wet ingredients. Mix together. I used my electric mixer but you can use a whisk.
- **Step 7**: Once the batter is smooth with small clumps, put batter in cupcake liners. I like to fill ¾ of the way.
- Step 8: Put in oven and bake for 18-22 minutes (cupcakes) or 5-10 minutes (mini cupcakes).
- **Step 9**: To see if cupcakes are done, do the toothpick test. Stick a toothpick in your cupcake. If you get wet batter, they are not ready. If they are not ready, I usually put them back in the oven for 2-5 minutes depending on how wet the inside is.
- **Step 10:** Once your cupcakes are cooled, pipe some frosting on and enjoy! NOTE: See my frosting recipe on the next page.

1 egg

Step 1: Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Step 3: In an 8x8 inch pan, gently press half of the

sugar and egg until well combined.

Step 7: Bake in the oven for 35-40 minutes.


