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
Laptops in Class: Would It Help? By Jenna Thompsett

The 21st century, the "technological age" keeps bringing us ways to enhance everyday activities using technology. So, is it a good idea to bring laptops into the classroom, or is that taking it too far? Let's face it: the world is changing. Technology is taking over, and some people are wondering if it's gone too far. In certain schools around the world, laptops are given to students! Many students across the globe are being given laptops to take notes and even complete assignments. Before you make your decision about whether this idea is totally awesome or totally unnecessary, let's get down to the facts.

Many students and even teachers endorse this idea, as laptops can help you take notes twice as fast as normal handwritten notes. Typing out notes is also more organized, saving you from having to decipher your messy handwriting the night before the big test. However, educators argue that allowing students to type out their notes will lead to "mindless note taking", which basically means writing sentences without reading or comprehending them. When you write down notes by hand, you have a better chance of taking the time to read what you just wrote instead of mindlessly typing sentence after sentence. However, mindless note taking isn't the biggest argument people against laptops in class. The main problem is multitasking. Students will often open other tabs while listening to a lecture or taking notes. This means some people could be playing their favorite computer game or watching a YouTube video instead of listening to their teacher. Faria Sana, an assistant professor of psychology, is mixed on the use of laptops in class. "You're responsible for your own learning, but your actions in the classroom can affect your peers' learning even more," says Dr. Sana.

Despite the negatives, education professor Robin Kay believes laptops in the classroom shouldn't lead to students being blamed. Instead, he believes the laptops can and will cause teachers and lecturers to embrace our new reality and teach more effectively. "Encouraging students to use laptops and other mobile devices to collaborate in and outside of class, such as through Google's suite of free education apps, is where professors and lecturers could be focusing their energies in a more meaningful way," Dr. Kay says. Computers have many helpful resources for students, such as Google Classroom and Office 365. These programs allow students to complete online assignments sent by their teachers. Students can ask their teacher questions at any time while online and teachers can send out important messages such as the big test's date or the extra help schedule. However, if we really want laptops in class, we need some restrictions. Experts say that monitors can be structured so it's harder to switch back and forth. The teachers can also monitor the students' screens if necessary.

So, should we really have computers in class? Whether you think it's a good idea, it's up to the teachers and other school officials to decide. There are multiple pros and cons, and it all depends on whether students can handle the responsibility. Laptops and technology in general can be helpful if used correctly. If students can learn to not abuse the privilege, computers in class may become the tangible future ahead of us.

New planet discovered, and it might be habitable By Jake Thompsett

Everyone knows that making cities on Mars or space-stations on Jupiter is a far-fetched idea. All of that is stuff of the future. Although scientists want to place an extra-terrestrial base on the Moon by 2020, other planets are a bit over our heads. Or maybe not. A new scientific breakthrough has revealed that a new planet, titled LHS 1140b, is very similar to our Earth.

At first, a planet possibly habitable that's close to our very own sun (our sun is called Proxima Centauri) could exist. Then, we found a solar system only 39 light years away. The length of a light year would take a year to traverse at light speed. Yes, light years are a unit of measurement, not time. In other words, it would take one year traveling at light speed to travel one light year. Now, our subject, discovered in this very year, has been revealed to us. It revolves around an M-dwarf star which lies only 41 light years away from us. It takes exactly 25 days to revolve once. The planet is larger than Earth, and by very much. Experts say it could be as much as 8.5 times larger when we're talking about mass. The type of star that it revolves around is a red giant. Red giant stars are expected to survive multiple trillions of years, longer than how old our Universe is currently. LHS 1140b receives half of the sunlight which Earth receives from our Sun.

Although a new planet seems amazing, some are quarrelling over whether it really is "habitable" or not. They say that, from a distance, any planet can look "Earth-like". Venus looks pretty similar to Earth, but we aren't exactly sending space ships there. However, it is the right distance away from its respective star, meaning it could contain water and good conditions. It also likely holds a habitable atmosphere. In that case, although it might look different on the surface, we might have a new planet.

Although there is debate on whether this possibly new and habitable planet is truthfully livable, it sure is cool to think that new planets are out there. A few years ago, Nintendo developed a game based off of sitcom drama called "Tomodachi Life". The game was...ok. 5/10. I will not lie. But the game starts to get boring as nothing progresses. And the soundtrack is more of elevator music. Because, let's be honest here guys, sitcom drama and comedy is BORING after a while. But then fast forward to 2017, summer vacay.

Nintendo made a new video game featuring the 'Mii Characters' which are characters you can add in your 3DS or Wii U, that represent people in real life, or fictional characters. They are also the citizens of Tomodachi Life. But Nintendo took that idea to a whole new level and created an RPG Adventure.

At the start of the game, you have to assign a Mii character to the role of the main protagonist. This is the one character that you will be able to have full control over in battle, so choose your protagonist wisely. Throughout the game you may have to assign other roles, such as allies, royalty, elves, villains, travelers, etc.


When assigning a role for an ally or your protagonist, two things you should keep in mind are Personality and Classes. Personality affects how a character acts in battle, like a stubborn person wouldn't be satisfied with attacking once so they attack twice or a kind person would spare a monster, causing the monster to flee battle. Classes define the role of someone in battle, like Healers, Fighters, Magic Users, or others. Most are obtained as the game progresses but two (Elf and Vampire) have to be earned by completing quests.


There are also perks in battle, like sprinkles, which are little jars that have special sprinkles! They come in 5 varieties, HP Recovery to recover HP from getting hit, MP to restore points for magic attacks, Life to recover dead teammates, Hyper to upgrade attack strength and anyone inhabited by the sprinkles will go first next turn, and Shield makes a barrier to protect a person until the barrier gets broken. There are also Weapons and Armor which are either found in chests or bought with money found in chests. There are certain weapons and armors reserved for each hero class. There is also grub. Grub is food you pick up after killing a monster, they can raise the stats of anyone's HP, MP, Speed, Magic, Attack, and Defense. The increase of stats gets a boost if the consumer likes the food, but a decrease if they don't like it. Relationships help in battle, like two people attacking at once, someone sacrificing themselves for another, avenging a fallen one, and so on.

All in all, Militopia is a riveting journey that I recommend you play, available now for the 3DS!!!






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
