

The Outreach House is an adolescent residential treatment facility. All of them had used drugs in their past, and they were willing to speak about how they got into drugs. They were also willing to answer questions about their past. It was interesting to hear how they had gotten into drugs, and how you could avoid them.

During lunch periods on Friday the 28th, the students signed pledges to be drug free. These pledges were then posted on a banner which hangs in the cafeteria hallway. Music was played on the loudspeaker between periods on Friday with the theme being "tune out drugs".


Review: The Christmas Spectacular! By Melissa Lubitz

The Cost of Owning a Pet By Joseph Graziano

Many people dream of owning a pet, but usually do not factor all the expenses and costs. Some things to count in while buying or adopting a pet are food, cages, vaccinations and shots, leash, collars, insurance, toys and treats. Experts recommend putting aside \$700 to \$1500 to take care of a pet. In the first year, people spend about \$1000 on their pet, and after that, about \$500 per year.

Dr. Louise Murray states that owners should put an emergency fund for unexpected costs. "Owners will likely incur at least one \$2,000 – \$4,000 bill for emergency care at some point during their pet's lifetime". People should assume this will happen during the pet's life and put money away just in case. All pet owners don't want to have to make the decision of saving your pet's life or paying your next month's rent. It is not fair to you and your pet. People should learn that a pet's cost can be unpredictable and we should not purchase a pet without proper research. Many owners will just think "it won't happen to me..." but it is almost definite that every pet during its lifetime will have a major vet bill.

If you are worried about major vet bills, many families should consider pet insurance. Local vets will know a lot about pet insurance and could help you choose a plan right for your pet. Not all plans and policies are created equal, so be wise when choosing one.

In summary, you should think about these questions: Do you have extra money for your pet throughout his/her life? When will you be you ready to afford your first pet? What could be your largest pet expense? Lastly, do your research on your pet or talk to your local veterinarian.

- 4 ounces of Elmer's white glue
- 3 cups of hot water
- 1 teaspoon of borax
- 2 spoons
- 2 bowls
- 1 carrot (end of a carrot)

black buttons and beads

Pour a 4 ounce bottle of glue into a bowl and add 1 ½ cups of hot water. Mix until combined. In another bowl, combine 1 ½ cups of hot water and 1 teaspoon of borax. Mix till the borax is dissolved. Next, add the borax mixture to the glue mixture and stir until it starts to thicken. When you do this step the glue should turn into slime. To make it a melting snowman you want to take the slime out of the bowl and flatten it on the table. Add a carrot tip for a nose. Use black buttons and beads to make a snowman face. Store the slime in a plastic bag or container and enjoy.

Snowy Slime

You will need:
borax, water, measuring cup,
2 bowls and 1 spoon,
optional: food coloring, confetti,
glitter; blue or silver works best



First, mix ½ a cup of water and ½ a cup of glue. Then, add your optional ingredients into the mix. Finally, add a ½ cup of your liquid starch/borax and mix it all together. After mixing with a spoon, switch to hand mixing for about 10 minutes. All done! You can play with your snowy slime all day long and store it in a sealed container. Have Fun!

<u>Crystal Icicle Ornaments</u> <u>You will need:</u> borax, water, jars/vases, craft sticks, string, tape,

pipe cleaners

Crystallicicles

First, twirl your pipe cleaners around a pencil to form a spiral. Then, tie a piece of string to the top of each pipe cleaner. Next, put borax into hot water and wait for it to melt. After that, tie your icicles to your Popsicle sticks and lay them across your jar/vase so the pipe cleaners are in the solution. Now wait! The science is simple as to why these crystals form. Due to the water/borax solution, particles settle on the pipe cleaners. These icicles are great decorations for a Christmas tree, or to just hang around the house.

So there you go. These are some fun experiments that you can do right at home. Have fun with your family during the holidays by making these awesome winter science experiments! ©



Comic Con 2016 took place October 6-9 at the Javits Center in NY City. Here is a summary of my experience:





Comic Con 2016 is here, and it's time to sit back, relax, and enjoy everything going on at the Javits Center. Maybe a little bit less on the relax part, since there's so much to do here and it almost seems like it's impossible to go and do everything you're going to want to do. Like me for instance. Day one of Comic Con, I expected to walk around, visit some panels, and just take it slow. I expected to be there for maybe an hour, tops. 

The Great Papyrus' Frozen Spaghetti! [clay] By Melissa Lubitz

In the popular videogame *Undertale*, there is a character called Papyrus. At first, he really wants to capture a human by leaving a trap of spaghetti. However, when he lays out the spaghetti, it freezes. I'll show you how to recreate the spaghetti out of clay!

You will need:

1 cup pale yellow clay ½ cup pale red clay ¼ cup light brown clay ½ cup light blue clay ¾ cup white clay Sculpey gloss glaze



Let's make the plate first. Roll out the white clay until it is even and approximately ½ a centimeter thick. Take a large circle cookie cutter and cut in one smooth motion. To make the spaghetti, roll the yellow clay into a super long and skinny rope. Cut into long strands.

Now, lay down the spaghetti strands on the plate in an organized mess. To make the sauce, roll out the red clay till thin and lay on top. To make the meatballs, roll the light brown clay into several spheres. Texture as you wish. Once you do this, you are almost done.

Take the light blue clay, roll it out keeping it kind of thick. Cut into shards. Place on the bottom facing up. Take some Sculpey gloss glaze and coat it. Place in a 350 degree oven for 15 minutess. Allow to cool. Now you are finished! This is a kooky DIY that is super easy to make! NYEH HEH HEH

Field Hockey – a little history By Taylor Sturtz

Field hockey is a very unique sport. Historians believe it was originally played in ancient Greece and Egypt. Drawings were found in the Ben Hasan tomb in the Nile Valley in Egypt. In the early 1900's, only men played field hockey. As this sport developed over time, men competed in the Olympics starting in 1908 in London. In 1932, the men's United States team won the bronze medal in Los Angeles.

For a while, field hockey was considered too dangerous for women. Eventually, women's field hockey came to the United States first but wasn't official. 




