

Amazon is planning on using drones to deliver packages in the near future. They want to have the drones deliver items in thirty minutes or less. These drones will be able to deliver small packages that are less than 5 pounds, such as a 3DS XL or a plushy.

As a trial run this past December, they delivered popcorn and an Amazon Fire TV Stick to a customer in Cambridgeshire, England. The flight took 13 minutes to travel 13 miles. They are planning to have two more trial drone deliveries in this area soon before expanding this service.

There are several things to consider when using drones: aviation rules, weather restrictions and the weight of the package. It will take some time for the drones to become a regular occurrence but this is a big step for Amazon and the world of technology.

Skiing, snowboarding and more By Taryn Kilrain

Do you want to have fun in the snow? You should try skiing, snowboarding or tubing. These activities are very fun to do with your family and friends. I'm going to tell you about local ski resorts and places to tube, including price and trail information.

The first ski resort is Shawnee Mountain in the Pocono Mountains, Pennsylvania. Ski rental and snowboard rental fees during the day are \$35 and at night, fees are \$28. Helmet rentals are \$12 for day and night. If you don't know how to snowboard or ski, take a lesson. Private lessons for 1 hour are \$90 and each additional person is \$60. Group lessons are \$35. Snow tubing is \$22 for a two hour session and \$37 for a four hour session. They have more than 20 skiing, snowboarding and snow tubing routes available.

The second resort is Camelback Resort in Tannersville, Pennsylvania. Regular ski rentals and snowboard rentals from open to close are \$39, high performance rentals are \$49, and night rentals (after 3 pm) are \$29. (These include skis, boots and poles.) Helmet rentals are \$12, ski pole rentals are \$16 and partial rentals are \$25. Snow tubing rentals for all ages is \$25 and for military, the fee is \$23. There are more than 30 trails at this resort.

The third resort is Mountain Creek in Vernon, New Jersey. Ski and snowboard rentals are \$49.99 plus tax (includes helmet). Poles and helmets alone are \$11.99 plus tax and ski boots or snowboard boots are \$25.00. Snowboarding tickets are \$30.00 from 4pm to 8pm.

Enjoy the slopes!

Number Block Puzzle By Markus Higgins


