## **Steered Straight Assembly**

The Steered Straight Assembly took place for all grades on March 15, 2016. There were also presentations outside of school for parents and staff. We heard from Michael DeLeon and Aly Amour who told us about how they have abused drugs in the past but were able to turn their lives around. Both of their stories were heartbreaking.

Michael DeLeon grew up and still lives in New Jersey. He missed very important lessons in life because he didn't pay attention. He had 2 children and a wonderful wife but he let them down by being involved in drugs, gangs and criminal activity. He spent nearly 14 years in prison and halfway houses, missing out on all that time with his family.

The punishment didn't end when he got out of prison. His job opportunities are now limited because of his criminal record. He has been a drug counselor for the past several years, counseling 26 kids. At one point, he lost 4 of them due to a heroin overdose over a 10 day period but he refuses to give up. He is committed to changing the future for as many youths and adults as he possibly can. He has also helped to produce many documentaries with the goal of trying to prevent kids from getting started with any substance abuse.

Aly also grew up in nearby New Jersey. Sadly, when she was in 4<sup>th</sup> grade, her father committed suicide. Her mother brought her and her brother to a therapist to deal with the loss. Aly made her first bad decision - she lied to the adults in her life claiming she was fine when in reality, she felt abandoned by her father. Over the years, everyone thought she was ok because her grades were good and she was still involved in school.

Sometime during high school, she started smoking marijuana and drinking alcohol. She thought she was fine because she wouldn't touch the "hard stuff". The pressures of high school were hard to handle. She thought she always had to be perfect and get invited to all the parties.

One day her friend Chris and best friend Al were outside smoking marijuana. Al was on the hood of the car and Chris was behind the wheel. Chris thought it would be funny to scare Al by starting the car and moving it forward a short distance to scare him. Unfortunately, Al lost his balance, fell off and died from a head injury.

After losing her friend, Aly was so upset. She started thinking of ways she could die. The next time someone offered her heroin, she tried it which eventually led to led to problems with school. She quit high school and ended up going to night school for her diploma. Despite becoming a student at a local community college, she just kept feeling sorry for herself. Her drug use increased. One day she drove out of town, got some heroin and on the way home ended up in a car crash, killing a man. She was sentenced to prison for six years. That's when she realized she had to turn her life around.

# Why are you giving this presentation to MS students?

# *Is the drug problem really that bad on Long Island?*

That's a really good question. Yes, the drug problem is very bad on Long Island. Don't think it is not happening here. Heroin use had doubled in Suffolk County since 2010. (~Michael)

\*Surround yourself with people that make good choices.

\*When someone offers something that looks suspicious, walk away.

\*People may say drugs are cool but they could end up ruining your life.

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# **Mother's Day DIYS**

Most kids want to show their mother how much they mean to them in a great gift, but they don't have the money. Try doing DIYs (do it yourself projects). You can show how much your mother means to you with something you can afford. You can also make something special for an aunt, grandmother, stepmother or someone special.

The first DIY is a hand-shaped card. You will need colorful paper (preferably cardstock), scissors, glue and printed words (or you can draw them). Trace your hand twice on a piece of paper and cut with scissors. Make a long strip so you can fold

accordion style. On one of the hands write "I love you…" and on the strip of paper, write "this much". Take the long strip of paper and glue to the back of the hand. Next, take the other hand and glue the long strip to the back of that one. When you are done, you have a lovely card that you can customize to your own style.

The next DIY is really simple – a "mom" mug. You will need a white or plain color mug, metallic gold paint pen (not a sharpie) and an oven. Grab your mug or cup and draw a nice picture or some special words. Allow to dry for a few minutes, then place in the oven at 350 degrees for 30 minutes to set the paint. Hand washing is recommended instead of placing it in the dishwasher.

Finally, the last DIY is a coupon book. You will need colorful paper or cardstock, scissors, string/ribbon and a hole punch. Cut out rectangular sheets of paper the same size and hole punch each one in the same spot. On each paper, write coupons like "free hug" or anything you would like. When all your papers are filled in, tie a string in the holes you made or use a metal binder ring. Your mom can use them whenever she likes. Printable patterns are also available at the website listed. Good luck making a DIY craft!

### Keyboarding at the Middle School By Emily Gargano and Joelle Tomossone

We asked Mrs. Frend and Mrs. Zeffiro some questions on the new class, keyboarding. Keyboarding was brought into the middle school just this year, replacing Character Development for the 6<sup>th</sup> grade and reducing health for the 8<sup>th</sup> grade. After next school year, only 6<sup>th</sup> graders will have keyboarding class. Mrs. Frend came here from EIHS after teaching business classes there for many years. She teaches 8<sup>th</sup> grade keyboarding and Mrs. Zeffiro teaches 6<sup>th</sup> grade. Mrs. Zeffiro used to teach Character Development for 6<sup>th</sup> graders.

#### What is keyboarding?

Keyboarding is a fun-filled, educational 10-week course designed by Mrs. Zeffiro and Mrs. Frend for middle school students who have little or no training in typing or keyboarding. This course introduces students to techniques that will allow them to progress past pecking at the keys. Students memorize the order of the keys and practice typing for speed and accuracy. The course stresses typing without looking at the computer keyboard or backtracking to fix mistakes. The course also incorporates music, exercise, ELA skills, and educational games into the curriculum.

#### Why do kids need to take it?

Today, efficient keyboard and computer operation is a necessary skill for the majority of occupations and an expected tool for communication throughout one's life. It is considered as important a skill as being able to print and write well. Touch typing allows students to key much faster, and they don't tire as quickly. Learning to use the keyboard competently should be viewed as learning to use a tool that assists a student to work in the technological framework of the 21st century. It is a natural extension of the writing process.

#### What are the benefits?

Keyboarding skills are necessary for much of the data entry done with computers. Advances in voice recognition and scanning technology are still not to the point where use of a keyboard is unnecessary. Good keyboarding skills will aid students as they write, do research, solve problems, communicate with others and achieve competence throughout their educational career.

#### Have you taught keyboarding before?

We have both taught keyboarding at East Islip High School. We are excited to teach it middle school students.

# Do you think kids like keyboarding better than character development?

We believe the all courses offered to EIMS students are challenging, motivational, and highly educational. Former students have told us how much they enjoyed character development, and current keyboarding students constantly express to Mrs. Frend and Mrs. Zeffiro that keyboarding is one of the most enjoyable classes they have.




## Will driving in the future change our lives? By Sarah Haanraadts


#### St. Baldrick's Day



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
