Atacama Desert blooms pink after historic rainfall By Robert Camlet

The Atacama Desert is considered one of the driest places on Earth. It is located in northern Chile, South America. At this time, it is full and bursting with a variety of colors. A rare flower blooming occurred after record amounts of rain earlier this year. The rain watered seeds that had been in the sand for years.

The Atacama Desert usually gets 0.6 inches of rain per year. Some places in the region, such as Arica, receive even less, experiencing between 0.04 and 0.12 inches per year. Back in March of 2015, rain fell in the amount of 2 inches.

Most of the time, the desert is a forbidding place of rocky landslides, salt lake, and lava flows. These rare rain showers (that often occur in the winter), nourished the seeds in the ground. As a result, the landscape of the desert turned into a carpet of pinks, oranges, yellows and purples as far as the eye can see.

Korean sisters find each other after 40 years By Robert Camlet

Holly Hoyle O'Brien, 46, told reporters she had searched for her little sister for more than half of her life. She and her sister were separated in a Korean orphanage when they were 5 and 7 and later adopted by American families. O'Brien was adopted by a family from Virginia in 1978, while Hughes was adopted by a New York family in 1976.

It wasn't until earlier this year that they found each other at a hospital in Sarasota, Florida. They became instant friends and became suspicious of their strong bonds. "One of the patients," O'Brien said, "told me there was another nurse, named Meagan, who was from Korea. She said "You should talk to her, maybe you're from the same town". After connecting, they realized they were not only from the same South Korean city but they shared the same Korean last name. They also had "abandonment" listed on their orphanage paperwork.

The sisters ordered DNA testing kits from Canada and submitted mouth swabs as samples. When the results came back this past August, they were left astonished by the positive results. "I'm like, this can't be," O'Brien said. "I was trembling; I was so excited, I was ecstatic."

Q: What do you like most about 6th grade?


A: Classes being in one place.

Recipe: Italian Rainbow Cookie Recipe

Have you ever wanted to make delicious rainbow cookies? Well with this recipe now you can!

Standard Recipe Ingredients 1½ Times Recipe [About 100 Cookies]

8 oz of almond paste 12 oz of almond paste

1½ cups of butter 2¼ cups of butter [room temperature]

1 cup of sugar 1½ cups of sugar

4 large eggs [SEPARATED] 6 large eggs [SEPARATED]

1 tsp of almond extract 1½ tsp of almond extract

2 cups of all purpose flour 3 cups of all purpose flour

½ tsp of salt 3/4 tsp of salt

8 oz of raspberry preserves 12 oz raspberry preserves

6 oz of semisweet chocolate 9 oz of semisweet chocolate

red and green food coloring red and green food coloring

Crisco [pan spray] Crisco [pan spray]



Here's How To Make Them!!!!

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees.
- **2.** Separate the eggs and put the whites in the fridge. Break up the almond paste. In a large bowl, beat the butter and then add the broken up almond paste, sugar, egg **YOLKS**, and almond extract. Beat with an electric mixer on med/high until fluffy.
- **3.** In another bowl, stir together flour and salt and then gradually beat into the batter. In another separate bowl, beat egg **WHITES** until stiff [make sure batter is clean and dry and egg whites remained cold until this step]. Fold stiffened whites into the batter with wooden spoon.
- **4.** Generously grease three $10\frac{1}{2}$ " x $15\frac{1}{2}$ " x 1" pans with Crisco, line with parchment paper and then grease the paper.
- **5.** Divide the batter into thirds in three small bowls. Color one bowl of batter red and another bowl green. Leave the last bowl untouched. Transfer the batter into the pans (1 pan for each color).
- **6.** Bake until lightly golden on edges [about 8-12 minutes], checking frequently. Invert pans over wire racks. Peel off parchment paper and let cool.
- **7.** Heat raspberry preserves in a saucepan on low. Spread ½ the preserves over the red cake layer. Carefully place the white cake layer on top of that and then spread the remaining preserves over the white cake. Next, carefully place the green cake layer on top and then wrap the whole thing in plastic. Chill in the fridge overnight with weight on top. [I put the whole thing on a cutting board with a cookie sheet and phone book on top].
- **8.** The next day, remove cookies from fridge, unwrap and trim edges. Melt the chocolate pieces over medium heat in saucepan that is in a larger pot filled with water [a double boiler]. When chocolate is completely melted and smooth, spread evenly over the top and sides of the cookies. Once chocolate dries, slice as needed. Store in refrigerator.

- 4. Fold in 1/2 cup mini chocolate chips and 1/2 cup milk chocolate chips.
- 5. Store leftovers in the refrigerator. Freeze for up to three months.



WALRUSES

Walruses are adorable sea creatures. They live in the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans. There are two types of walruses: Atlantic walruses and Pacific walruses. As you can see, they like the cold hemisphere. Walruses have



large tusks. The male walrus has thicker and larger tusks than females because they use them for fighting, while the females and young stay behind. Their overgrown tusks help them pull their chubby bodies from the water. Walruses are related to all types of seals.

Walruses are sociable animals. Their herd is led by the stronger males. The females and their young follow. They break into groups of at least 10 walruses so there is less competition. Walruses commonly breed in the months of January and March. When baby walruses are

born they don't have their tusks because they haven't grown yet. They have to drink milk for six months, and then eat solid food.

Walruses eat mostly clams and organisms from the sea floor. They spend 8 minutes under water searching for food. Then they come up for air for 2 minutes and continue in different spots looking for food.

They spend several hours searching for food. Walruses have fur, which covers all their body except their fins. Under their fur they have a thick layer of blubber (body fat). This protects their body from cold water and cold winds when they lay on the ice.

Walruses love to be around each other, and make sure that they're okay.



When walruses are in captivity their tusks are removed so they won't get bacteria or infections since the waters don't get

clean that often. The walruses that are in captivity are injured. Sadly when they are in captivity their life span will shorten. Millions of dollars are spent to make their habitat more comfortable, to get the right medication and to get special milk for the calves.

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
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
