These teachers will collaborate all year with the Civic Education Center on significant projects designed to elicit some student voice focused on addressing local issues and needs. Students will work with community partners, experts and ultimately decision-makers. We look forward to seeing some of the amazing student work and teacher collaboration. Again, you can always engage in civic engagement projects and work without being part of this group and the Civic Education Center.



The Farber Educational Campus will host our **Farbers Market** - a monthly Full Choice Food Pantry in partnership with the Central California Food Bank. It will be the 3rd Wednesday of the Month from 2:00 - 5:00 pm. This will be coordinated by Executive Director Michael Niehoff, Campus Culture Director Elva Carlos and Logistics Instructor Jonathan Hinojosa. A Full Choice pantry offers

community members the opportunity to choose items they need from a variety of offerings. In addition to non-perishable food items, The Farbers

Market will also feature fresh fruits and veggies along with dairy products. We are excited to have our Leadership and Logistics students involved in this effort and welcome the entire Farber staff to support this effort.





Having started at Cambridge High School under the direction of **Campus Culture Director Elva Carlos**, the Farber Educational Campus will have an expanded **Farber Closet** as a means to support all students in order to acquire professional dress for the world of work and professional situations. Ms. Carlos and her

students will be getting out more information about how we can support the program through our donations and volunteering.





The Farber Educational Campus will have both Women's Alliance and Men's Alliance Programs. Women's Alliance will be led by Adriana Alcocer from Farber Independent Study and Meliza Gonzalez from Farber Credit Attainment. The Men's Alliance Programs will be led by Shaun Brown from Farber Independent Study and Robert Vega from Farber Credit Attainment. Remember that Robert Vega was named Teacher of the Year from Region 3 of the California Continuation Education Association. Mr. Vega was chosen for his instrumental work with the Men's Alliance. Additionally, the program was named an Exemplary Program from CCEA.

These programs will have lots to share this year, but one of the earliest opportunities comes from one of our partners. The **San Joaquin River Parkway & Conservation Trust** have selected Farber to be the first campus in FUSD to participate in a new program called **Youth Parkway Ambassadors**. YPA is a 3-month, 60-hour program in which high school students learn about the San Joaquin River and its role in our community, share memorable outdoor experiences with new friends, access and explore multiple Parkway properties, and gain experience planning events, creating outreach materials, and leading outdoor activities at free public open house events. YPA participants will receive outdoor and naturalist skills training at sites along the San Joaquin River Parkway, potentially including (but not limited to):

- Boating (kayaking, canoeing) and Water Safety
- Plant Identification
- Wildlife Track/Scat Identification
- Leading Outdoor Activities for Youth and Adults
- Team Building Facilitation

A new component for these cohorts is an overnight camping trip at **Millerton Lake** (2- day, 1-night). All camping gear and food will be provided. Some skills that participants will learn on the camping trip include:

- Setting up and taking down a tent
- How to use a camp stove
- Know what to pack when camping
- Learn new hiking trails at Millerton Lake

The Cohort of students will then plan and implement two free public open house days at properties of their choosing, during which they will practice the skills they have learned by teaching them to others. During the planning process, they will be able to practice skills in the following:

- Leading effective discussions
- Event planning and Time management
- Graphic/marketing materials design
- Community outreach and engagement
- Problem solving

Participants will also receive complimentary camping and outdoor clothing and gear, as well as **Season Park Passes for Millerton Lake State Park**. 10-12 students from the **Women's & Men's Alliance Programs** will be selected to be the first Farber and FUSD Cohort. Students will learn valuable skills through unique experiences while also being introduced to career paths in natural resources and outdoor recreation. Special thanks to **Molly Schnur-Salimbene** and her team at the **San Joaquin River Parkway & Conservation Trust** for providing students at Farber this unique opportunity.



The Farber Educational Campus would once again like to thank our partner **Daniel Wilson** from **Current Culture H2O**. Daniel is working with **Science Teacher Jadrian Ejercito** on establishing the first complete

Hydroponics Lab at Farber. Daniel and Current Culture H2O are donating all of this initial equipment, as well as advising Mr. Erjercito and the program. Hydroponics Farming and Gardening is instrumental in the future of sustainable agriculture and the market for hydroponic products is growing at 26% per year. The plan is to invite other science teachers to get involved.



Since school has ended, **Jonathan Hinojosa** has been working on a multitude of things in preparation for the upcoming school year. He has been on campus daily getting his facility and program ready. Here is a summary of some of those activities:

- Hosted Inaugural Advisory Meeting with Farber and FUSD Staff along with several key industry partners from Amazon, Central California Food Bank, The Gap, Pape, Total Industries and others.
- Worked with vendors to acquire equipment for classroom
- Continued discussions with industry partners about the program
- Assembled Classroom Furniture, Storage and Equipment
- Cleaned and prepped warehouse for rack installation
- Setup and staging receiving and shipping departments
- Set up classroom and program technology

- Collaborated with other CTE instructors at Farber
- Designed Curriculum with CTE and Farber Support Staff
- School and Community Project Design and Planning
- General Classroom Set Up
- Received and shipped supplies and curriculum coming in from the warehouse
- Assisting Farber with general site and facility needs

Additionally, Jonathan has been working with staff on supporting both the **Farbers Market** and **Farber Closet**. He has also been checking to make sure his facility and equipment are meeting all OSHA Safety Standards. This has included getting the addition of an Eye Wash Station and Shower Station. Jonathan has already been a successful advocate for his program and students and he is just getting started. Stay tuned for much more.





Cyber Security Instructor Peter Fortuna has had a busy summer in both preparing his program for the beginning of the school year and advancing himself in a variety of ways.

students hands-on experience, and they can share the edited video (which will be completed by other students) with the online class as well as the other in-person class.

For the back-to-school night, Mr. Cook intends to teach his students about making commercials. They will play the commercials in the classroom while others come in and out during the program.






During the summer, Mr. Cook has also

arrived books and supplies ready. The library has furniture for staff and students to come and hang out, read, and do research. There are also two copy machines for students to use for school purposes.

The library will be open at lunchtime and they intend to play movies, music, and tv shows during that time for students and staff. All are welcome. #### PROFESSIONAL LEARNING



**15 teachers** from each of the three programs participated in a two-day training focused on problem and project-based learning. Facilitated by **Michael Niehoff**, teachers learned about the pedagogy, experienced high quality Exemplars and began to design a new project. Teacher worked for two days on designing a project they intend to implement this school

year. There were primary and secondary teachers representing a diverse set of

subject matter and students. Some examples of the driving questions were the following:

What lessons can we learn from history on how to support today's veterans? How can we determine the effectiveness of a revolution? Are we ready for a natural disaster?

How can we create an ideal ecosystem for organisms in a failing ecosystem?

How can we slow down the emigration from Latin American countries?

How can we increase voter turnout for elections in Fresno County?

What is the impact of misinformation from the media in our society?

How can we make our class a kinder place for everyone?

How can we come to understand extreme weather in order to preserve human life?


