

# SENIOR PLANNING TIMELINE



# **ALL YEAR**

- ➤ Register and take the SAT/ACT as appropriate. Students must register for these tests independently.
- It is important to be aware that many colleges/universities have embraced a "Test-Optional" policy, which allows the applicant to decide whether or not to forward their SAT and/or ACT scores to college admissions offices. These colleges assure that the absence of standardized test scores will not affect admissions decisions; nor will the absence of those scores affect decisions regarding merit scholarships. Emphasis will be on the nature of the academic courses chosen by the student and grades achieved in those courses well as other holistic factors.
  - We strongly recommend that students check the websites of each college in which they are interested to determine their standardized test policy.
  - Every school is different!

- ✓ Information Sessions, tours, and all necessary information are readily available on the college's websites—so many virtual options, as well!

- ➤ Seniors and parents should keep in frequent touch with their counselor. Email is best. DON'T HESITATE, BE PROACTIVE......COUNSELORS ARE HERE TO HELP YOU!!!
- Essays for college applications should already be in progress. Keep in mind that Early Action application <u>deadlines</u> begin *October 15* and continue through *November 1 & November 15*, so completion of required essays is necessary by the required application deadline.



<u>NAVIANCE</u> is a fantastic resource to help you initially make, and then narrow down your college list while also providing contact information for any college or university in which you may have an interest.

Another year-round use of <u>NAVIANCE</u> is the local and national scholarship search engines found in the "Colleges" tab. Students/parents should continually monitor these sections of <u>NAVIANCE</u> to find and apply for various scholarships



<u>ATHLETES</u> interested in playing for <u>Division I or II</u> schools <u>MUST REGISTER</u> <u>ONLINE</u> with the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Clearinghouse. The address is www.ncaa clearinghouse.net.

- After registering, be sure to complete the <u>Athletic Release Form</u> found on the School Counseling webpage so that your transcripts will be sent to the NCAA
- <u>SAT/ACT scores are no longer required by NCAA to determine initial eligibility</u>



Students need to continue to achieve at their highest level! Students must maintain a solid academic course schedule and strong grades throughout their senior year.

Colleges will be requesting mid-term senior grades (in February) and final transcripts (June/July). College acceptances (<u>always conditional</u>) have been reversed in situations where seniors did not maintain the quality of their academic performance.

Test dates, deadline dates, and testing locations are found on these websites

- ☐ Students should consult with their counselor if they are planning an <u>EARLY</u>

  <u>DECISION</u> application (binding) or an <u>EARLY ACTION</u> application

  (non-binding). Deadline dates are October/November depending on the college.

  Make appointments earlier rather than later!
- ☐ Students should start, continue, or complete working on college applications.



If you want to save some time, find out what colleges are on the <u>COMMON</u> <u>APPLICATION</u> and you will complete only one application, which you can send to your desired schools (over 800 colleges/universities). For those colleges that are not on the Common App, you may visit the college website and complete their applications online.

Students can begin submitting the UC Transcript Request and Release Form to the
School Counseling Department (transcripts@unioncatholic.org) to meet Early
Decision & Early Action deadlines
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Be careful of DEADLINES! 🚨

☐ Work on application **ESSAYS/PERSONAL STATEMENTS:** it is critical that you work on these <u>early in the fall</u> if you are considering applying Early Decision or Early Action.

If applying for financial assistance to attend a PRIVATE college or university, you may be asked to complete the <u>COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP SERVICE FINANCIAL AID</u> <u>PROFILE (CSS Profile)</u>. This is a special filing requirement by a number of PRIVATE colleges and universities especially if you are applying EARLY DECISION (binding) and usually by October 1<sup>st.</sup>



# **JANUARY**

☐ Continue to fill out and complete FAFSA and CSS Profile (if applicable)
<b>Pro-tip:</b> College Financial Aid offices are great resources! Even if you
don't end up attending that college, you can still reach out to them and
they're happy to help!
☐ Avoid Senioritis! Your mid-year reports will be sent to your colleges soon, so
make sure you finish the first semester strong.
☐ Continue to apply for scholarships! Submitting scholarship applications doesn't take as long as you may think and has a huge pay off!
☐ <b>Another pro-tip:</b> Reach out to the School Counseling office of your community's <i>public high school</i> for a list of your community's
scholarships; remember that you are a taxpayer in your community and
entitled to apply for and receive scholarship awards if you meet
scholarship donor requirements.
FEBRUARY, MARCH, APRIL
☐ Students begin to receive decisions from colleges (although some colleges wait
until April 1st)admissions decisions are often sent via emailCHECK YOUR
EMAIL REGULARLY!
☐ Compare financial aid award letters and reach out to your college Financial Aid Offices, if needed. They're there to help!
Important: Keep copies of your admissions decisions and
scholarship/financial aid awards to be submitted to the counseling office
☐ Once the <i>final decision</i> has been made as to which college/university you will be
attending, it's always helpful to inform all other schools that you have been
accepted to that you will not be attending.
While you don't have to officially decline college offers, the sooner you let
a school know that you will not be attending, the sooner that school can
offer your spot to a student on the waitlist. It's the kind thing to do
☐ Mark your calendars with important dates from your colleges: registration
deadlines, housing deposits, and orientation
☐ Line up summer jobs, internships and volunteer opportunities

# **MAY**



- May 1<sup>st</sup> (National College Decision Day) is generally the final date by which you must notify the college that you are going to attend.
   Check your email for important deadlines for registration and housing deposits!!
   Be aware of any summer orientation sessions that you must attend at the college in which you will enroll—plan accordingly :
- ☐ Be on the lookout from an email from School Counseling with directions on how to report what college you'll want your *final transcript* to be sent
- ☐ Advanced Placement Exams administered this month

#### **Transcript Request Deadline Reminders:**

Any students planning to apply Early Action (non-binding) or Early Decision (binding) with November 1st or November 15<sup>th</sup> application deadlines must submit online transcript request forms by <u>October 11th</u> to allow time for processing

Any student that would like their high school records to be sent to the college *before* Thanksgiving must submit online transcript request forms by **October 31st** 

Any student that would like their high school records to be sent to the college *before* Christmas/winter break must submit online transcript request forms by **December 1st**
