Welcome back to AIG and Advanced Services. I hope you are as excited as I am about facing the new challenges that the 2024-2025 school year brings. Working together, we can ensure that this school year will be enriching, challenging, and success-

The Academically and Intellectually Gifted (AIG) program exists to ensure that the academic, intellectual, social, and emotional needs of gifted and potentially gifted students are met. It is my goal, as the AIG Specialist, for your child's school to inspire the love of learning in your child, to promote critical thinking and creativity, and to provide the support needed to reach his/

her full potential.

Middle school AIG is different from elementary. In elementary school, your student was pulled to the AIG Specialist's room at set times during the week. In middle and your student this school year! school, we typically DO NOT PULL the students from classes to go to a separate class. Instead, the specialist PUSHES INTO the classroom and works with the classroom teachers co-teaching, planning, extending, and enriching lessons. Students are in clustered classes and work with advanced peers and the specialist on activities that promote problem-solving, critical thinking, collaboration, creativity, and reflection in their core subject classrooms.

This year I will also meet with students in large groups throughout the year to complete their Academic Blueprints (DEP). I look forward to working with you
