DISTRICT ACHIEVEMENTS

The Calcasieu Parish School Board was recognized as one of the top ten districts in score growth for the 2022-2023 school year. The district showed growth of three points over the previous year. CPSB elementary and middle schools grew overall in ELA, math, science, and social studies, while also outperforming the state in all four categories.

The Calcasieu Parish School Board announced the addition of a Graduate Record Examinations (GRE®) and PRAXIS® testing site in the district. The site, located in CPSB's Curriculum and Instruction Building at 600 S. Shattuck St. in Lake Charles, is now an approved ETS Certified Test Administrator Services.

The Calcasieu Parish School Board experienced another year of district growth and significant improvement in schools across the district. The district's overall score improved to an 86.1 (B), up 3.3 points from last year's results and nearly ten points above the state's performance. Out of all CPSB schools, 45 of those grew over performance from the 21-22 school year, and 48 of those schools are now labeled an A, B, or C campus.

Following the release of Advanced Placement results from the Louisiana Department of Education, the Calcasieu Parish School Board proudly announced increases across the board in results for local students completing tests in the 2022-2023 school year. Nearly 900 Calcasieu Parish high school students, representing all 11 CPSB high schools, took a total of 1,274 AP exams last year. Of those students, 57% scored a three or higher, earning credit towards their collegiate educational journey. CPSB students scoring a five, the highest possible score, increased by 42%. The Calcasieu Parish School Board experienced an enrollment increase for the 2023-2024 school year, marking the second consecutive year the number of K-12 students in the district is on the rise. Following the natural disasters of the 2020-2021 school year, seeing students return to the district is a promising sign for Southwest Louisiana.

A Virtual Learning Summit took place at the Lake Charles Boston Academy. Special guests from school districts across visited the Calcasieu Parish School Board's Virtual Instruction Program. The event, "The Future of Learning Summit," was created by the Louisiana Department of Education to showcase the Virtual Instruction Program as an excellent model of virtual learning.

We began full implementation of weapons detectors at high school campuses as part of the district's ongoing commitment to student and staff safety. Students and visitors are required to pass through these weapons detectors upon entry to each school site. This move was just one additional security measure that went into place for increased campus security.

The Calcasieu Parish School Board received a \$500,000 school security improvement grant from the Department of Justice's Office of Community Oriented Policing Services. These grant funds were used to purchase additional weapons detectors and radios to facilitate communication between campuses and law enforcement.

ADVANCED STUDIES HONORS NIGHT

The first Advanced Studies Honors Night event recognized AP Scholars and gifted high school seniors across the district. Students, parents, AP teachers, and high school administrators were invited to an evening banquet to celebrate their success.

Students received awards for AP Scholar, AP Scholar with Honor, and AP Scholar with Distinction. Gifted seniors who actively participated in gifted coursework throughout high school received Gifted graduation chords to signify their dedication and accomplishment. AP Capstone Diploma Candidates also received honor chords.

SUMMER CAREER ACADEMY

This year, we had 68 students who earned a total of 81 credentials, 83 seniors seniors who participated in the Career and Technical Education College Signing Day, and 3,950 industry-based credentials have been earned

This initiative provides high school students with work experience, certification opportunities, and a chance to earn a wage. By offering a range of courses with multiple certification options, it gives students the flexibility to choose areas that align with their career goals. The Advanced State Credentials create an extra layer of recognition and credibility to the program.

These students earned industry-based certifications and were accepted to universities, community/technical colleges, post-secondary training programs, or they gained employment in their area of certifications.

- Increased confidence and employability upon graduation
- A more comprehensive understanding of the workforce and industry standards

CHILD WELFARE & ATTENDANCE

DEPARTMENT HIGHLIGHTS

- The percentage of students present rose one point to **93%** for the second consecutive school year.
- 87% of at-risk students did not become chronically absent following interventions.
- **6,798** students improved their attendance rate after receiving intervention.
- In collaboration with EveryDay Labs, 15,046 CPSB families received personalized attendance nudges, 23,016 mail nudges, and 42,491 text nudges.
- Staff members were asked to provide Hearing Officer Training for current and prospective Hearing Officers at the 112th Annual IATDP Conference. This organization is made up of members from throughout the United States and several foreign countries.
- Staff has presented information on the Expulsion Diversion Opportunity Program (EDOP) at multiple state and national level conferences.



EARLY CHILDHOOD



Monthly "Nap and Knowledge" sessions were conducted with teachers and co-teachers. This job-embedded professional development included topics such as technology for little ones and Canva. Waterford Family Academy was conducted with families in the spring. Parents learned about student's educational objectives and how to continue the learning experiences at home. Families were provided with lessons, materials, and manipulatives.

The Louisiana Department of Education's Division of Statewide Monitoring conducted a desk review during January of the LA 4 Program operated by the Calcasieu Parish School Board. The results of the monitoring revealed that there were no findings that need resolution.

The Calcasieu Parish Community Network 2023 rated overall performance as proficient. The Calcasieu Parish Community Network completed over 750 CLASS observations in the district, which includes infants, toddlers and Pre-K.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL



The Elementary Department has hosted over 40 diverse summer professional development sessions to support teachers in growing their professional practice. Over 340 teachers voluntarily attended Professional Development events in June.

- Classroom instruction focused on students using success criteria to take ownership of their own learning.
- Teacher Collaboration Meetings were intentionally focused on using student work to improve student learning.
- As measured by DIBELS 8th, beginning of year to end of year, kindergarten teachers increased students on grade level from 29% to 54%. First grade teachers increased the students on grade level from 54% to 63%.


INTERNAL AUDITING

DEPARTMENT HIGHLIGHTS

- Transitioned school accounting to a new, improved system
- Implemented Online Teacher Receipting, which removes paper receipts and reduces errors
- Facilitated partnership with Amazon Business to allow for a centralized purchasing function that will enable the district to receive rebates and free shipping.
 - Results in an automated purchase order approval process, real-time reporting, and an interface with eFin
- Piloted and expanded the GoFan ticket process to reduce school's exposure with regards to admissions and program sales.



- Working with Absence Management vendor to expand to Time Management, which will correct deficiencies in the supplemental pay process and increase timesheet accountability
- Through the audit process, enforced the existing law to protect District employees from entering transactions using public resources for private gain.
 - Obtained an Advisory Opinion from the Board of Ethics, which resulted in new legislation changing the law to provide exceptions for coaches and tutors
- Implemented the Arbiter system, which removed the Internal Auditing department's 1099 responsibility for officials compensation
- Implemented coding into the school accounting system to comply with GASB requirements







RISK MANAGEMENT

DEPARTMENT HIGHLIGHTS

As part of the ongoing process of preparing for emergencies, our team is currently updating the Emergency Operations Plan for each school. In each school's plan binder, an updated aerial picture of the school with all buildings labeled is included. In addition, our team is visiting each campus to take pictures of critical infrastructure items, such as water, gas, and electrical shut-offs, to be updated.



The Technology Department and Risk Management Department partnered to undergo a National Institute of Standards and Technology cyber security audit, facilitated by our property insurance broker, Auther J. Gallagher. CPSB scored very well due to our Technology Department's diligence and protocols already in place. Because of some minor changes CPSB made for undertaking the audit, CPSB received a 15% rate reduction on our Cyber Security insurance premium.

With changes that were made and the work that was done by all involved, we were able to save the district a total of \$1,281,538 for this coming fiscal year.

SPECIAL SERVICES



SPECIAL EDUCATION TEACHER DEVELOPMENT CENTER

The establishment of the Special Education Teacher Development Center, located inside the assessment center, signifies a dedicated platform aimed at providing educators with supplemental training and guidance to effectively address prevalent obstacles.

This Teacher Support Initiative integrates collaborative peer assistance, tailored training modules, educational best practices, and classroom management techniques to establish a robust framework for teacher efficacy. Special Education instructors and paraprofessionals will benefit from comprehensive instruction delivered by subject matter specialists, designated program and behavior facilitators, and on-site support coaches, ensuring ongoing assistance with queries and apprehensions throughout the academic year.

THE DINO PRESS

The initiative, located inside the assessment center, was created to provide job-embedded lessons and employment opportunities for students who fall under the umbrella of special services and alternative programs.

This state-of-the-art facility doubles as a classroom, storefront, and gateway to life opportunities for students with disabilities and limitations. Students actively apply for positions and are paid monthly by CPSB, which receives reimbursement from Medicaid. Students play an active role in the day-to-day operations of the Dino Press, and we are planning to expand in terms of space and the number of participants.



CPSB PARA-UNIVERSITY

During the 2023-2024 School Year, a gem was born with the creation of Para-University. CPSB Paras play an active and essential role in their work We aim to support children and youth by providing encouragement, assistance, and support. Paraprofessionals have specialized training to meet student needs and truly understand those needs.

To better support our paraprofessionals, we have created a cohort-style training program to meet them where they are, instead of where they are not. This initiative has resulted in many paraprofessionals finding new excitement for their role and enrolling in university-level programs with the goal of becoming special education teachers in our district. We believe that one solution to our critical shortage of teachers is to develop our own talent from within.

TECHNOLOGY TRAINING

The CPSB Technology Department Makerspace Mobile Bus rolled out in May. The bus is a fortythree foot one-of-a-kind classroom on wheels. CPSB Technology Staff will coordinate with campus staff to develop activities which will include coding, 3D printing, VR experiences and more. The Makerspace Mobile bus will be instrumental in bridging the gap by providing the opportunity for all students to experience activities that focus on design thinking, problem solving, creativity, communication, and collaboration. The engineering process will guide the bus activities and projects. Activities will also expose students to necessary skills and career pathways to enable them to be marketable to industry in the Calcasieu Parish work force. The bus will also be used to educate and promote awareness of STEAM/Makerspace activities throughout the community to provide a connection to job opportunities within our area.



The CPSB Technology Training has been holding monthly 3D Printing Design Challenges. Technology Facilitators worked with school 3D printing teams to create videos to submit to the PrintLab Make: able Challenge, which is a global 3D printing and assistive technology design challenge by PrintLab, Autodesk and partners.

With two state-level certified instructors, we are offering CDL courses in September, December, February, March, and July for those interested in driving for us. There is no cost for this course.

Annual curriculums were received and distributed to all schools. This included curriculum for all grade levels and world languages, as well as school supplies. The Warehouse staff also received over 650 email requests and deliveries for items such as additional books, curriculums, moving assistance, technology pickup, and water deliveries. Staff also completed over 1,300 regular janitorial requisitions, school lunch janitorial requisitions, summer janitorial requisitions, and duplicating requisitions. These were received, filled, and delivered to sites. New inventory policies and procedures were implemented, Fixed Assets files were cleaned, and the cooler and freezer were repaired from hurricane damages.
