Tirow, Alii, Hafa Adai and Hello! I greet you in the languages of my people (alongside English): Carolinian, Palauan, and Chamorro.

My name is Dr. Xandra Peter (she/hers) and I am our Equity and Strategic Engagement Manager. I am Carolinian and Palauan from the islands of Palau and of Saipan in the Northern Mariana Islands, where I was born and raised.

I have spent the last seven years as an elementary school teacher in the Shoreline School District. During my time in the classroom, I was inspired by the energies, curiosities, and passions of students and families. While there, I also developed an interest in how educator practices can influence those, both positively and negatively. To nurture that growing interest, I attended the University of Washington and graduated from the Leadership for Learning (L4L) Ed.D program (alongside Dr. Savannah Milford and Dr. Tim Krieger).

All of that work has brought me to the Lake Washington School District. I find myself uniquely connected to the lives of our marginalized students and families. I moved to the Bellevue School District at the beginning of 8th grade and have personal experiences with being the only Brown student in most of my classes and what it took for my family to navigate the school systems out here.

In this role, I am informed by my personal histories, my Indigenous values, and the knowledges of marginalized communities. I am humbled to be in this position and am excited to support our school district to ensure that equity and justice are rooted into the foundation of all of the work that we do.


River of Mariposas


A Land of Books: Dreams of Young Mexihcah Word Painters

Award-winning authorillustrator Duncan Tonatiuh sheds light on the significance of Aztec manuscripts and culture.




How to Speak in Spanglish


<u>Islandborn</u>


Once I Was You: A Memoir of Love and Hate in a Torn America

Holidays and Observances

In addition to Labor Day, Constitution Day and Halloween, September and October also include the following observances and holidays. This is not a complete list and focuses on underrepresented cultures and communities.

- September 15 to October 15- National Hispanic Heritage Month: Celebrates the contributions, heritage and culture of Hispanic and Latino Americans.
- September 16 or 21 -Mawlid Al-Nabi (Also known as Milad Al-Nabi): The observance of the birthday of Islam founder Prophet Muhammad, which is celebrated in Rabi' al-awwal, the third month in the Islamic calendar. Sunni Muslims celebrate it five days earlier than Shi'a Muslims.
- September 23 Bi Visibility Day: Seeks to draw attention to public policy concerns and foster respect for biindividuals and communities.
- October Full Month- National Bullying Prevention Month: campaign to unite communities nationwide to
 educate and raise awareness of bullying prevention.
- October Full Month- National Disability Employment Awareness Month: Recognizes the contributions of workers with disabilities.
- October Full Month- LGBT History Month: Marks and celebrates the lives and achievements of lesbian, gay bisexual and transgender people in the United States.
- October 2- International Day of Nonviolence: Marked on the birthday of Mahatma Gandhi, leader of the Indian independence movement and pioneer of the philosophy and strategy of non-violence, a U.N commemoration promoting the principle of non-violence and the desire to secure a culture of peace, tolerance and understanding.
- October 3 to 12- Navaratri: Nine-day festival celebrating the triumph of good over evil. It worships God in the
 form of the universal mother commonly referred to as Durga, Devi or Shakti, and marks the start of fall.
- October 3 to 4- Rosh Hashanah: Beginning of the Jewish New Year and first of the High Holy Days, which marks the beginning of a ten-day period of penitence and spiritual renewal.
- October 11- Coming Out Day: Encourages honesty and openness about being lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender. Commemorates October 11, 1987, when 500,000 people marched on Washington, DC, for gay and lesbian equality.
- October 12- Yom Kippur: The "Day of Atonement" marks the end of the Ten Days of Penitence that begin with Rosh Hashanah.
- October 12- Dussehra/Dassera: Anniversary of the day when Rama killed the evil demon Ravana. Also known as Durga Puja, which celebrates the goddess Durga.
- October 12- Dia de la Raza: "Race Day" is commemorated on October 12th in recognition of the mixed Indigenous and European heritage in Mexico and among many Latin American communities.
- October 14- Indigenous People's Day: Celebrates and honors Native American history and culture. [The second Monday of October is also marked as a U.S. federal holiday, Columbus Day. Many people are opposed to the celebration of a man who led and committed atrocities against Indigenous people. Some states and cities in the U.S. have officially changed the day to Indigenous People's Day. Similarly, it is celebrated as Día de la Raza, "Day of the Race", in Spanish-speaking countries and communities.]
- October 17 to 24- Sukkot: The week-long "Feast of Booths" commemorates the 40-year wandering of the Israelites in the desert on the way to the Promised Land. (October 17) -
- October 24- Shemini Atzeret: "The Eighth [Day] of Assembly" observed on the day immediately following Sukkot.
- October 24- United Nations Day: Commemorates the founding of the world organization in 1945.
- October 25- Simchat Torah: "Rejoicing in the Torah" celebrates the conclusion of the public reading of the Pentateuch (first five books of the Hebrew Bible) and its beginning anew.
- October 31- Reformation Day: Commemorates the beginning of the Protestant Reformation in 1517.
- October 31- Bandi-Chhor Diwas: A commemorative occasion having no fixed date which occurs in October or November and celebrates the release of the Sixth Guru Har Gobind Sahib from imprisonment and coincides with Diwali, the Hindu festival of lights.
