


Special Education Monthly Board Report Emmett School District September, 2024

Special Education Demographics:

• Three weeks into the school year, as of Sept. 6, 2024 the home page of our IEP platform (Edplan) shows 344 students receiving Special Education with an additional 8 Referrals, and 16 Consents for Evaluation.

- We continue to evaluate our current Paraprofessional assignments and projected needs.

Department Projects:

- SLD Training: Heather Hynes, Alec Smith, and Vanessa Ghiglione the Emmett School District School Psychologists, along with Nicole Thomas, Special Education Director attended the Idaho State Department's training on the updates to the Specific Learning Disability eligibility determination process. This training occurred Sept. 5, 2024 in Nampa. This information will be shared with each building team during MDT meetings and implemented as eligibility determinations are conducted. These changes were well communicated by the state early last spring, upcoming changes were reviewed, and our teams have already started to implement these new considerations.

Additionally, I have a younger cousin with Autism, and my lifelong involvement in activities like the Special Olympics further solidified my love for working with individuals with disabilities. I initially pursued a bachelor's degree in Speech-Language Pathology, but while working as a paraprofessional in another district, I realized my true calling was in Special Education, which led me to pursue my master's in this field.

What is your favorite part of your job?

My favorite part of my job is addressing the emotional and behavioral difficulties of children. This is something incredibly close to my heart, and I find that when we take the time to focus on these areas, the students progress much further in their academics. Working in the extended resource room allows me to work with a smaller group of students, giving me more opportunities to build close relationships with them and their families.

I am blessed to live close to my parents and my three sisters, whom I spend time with frequently. My younger sister, who has Autism, holds a very special place in my heart, and caring for her has shaped much of my life.

Describe an interesting hobby or pastime that you have.
