Hispanic Heritage Month

When talking about the history of Hispanic Heritage Month, which is on September 15 - October 15, you have to think about the things people of Hispanic Heritage had to go through until they got recognition. According to hispanicheritagemonth.gov, Hispanic Heritage Month's purpose is to "celebrate the histories, cultures, and contributions of all American citizens who have ancestors who have come from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean, and Central and South America."

Hispanic Heritage Month was created in 1968, but it was originally established and it was called "Hispanic Heritage Week". The meaning

behind the date September 15 is significant because it's the anniversary of independence for Latin American countries; Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua. The observation started in 1968 as Hispanic Heritage Week under President Lyndon Johnson, and it was expanded by President



Ronald Reagan in 1988 to cover 30 days starting on September 15 throughout October 15. It was enacted into law on August 17, 1988 on the approval of Public Law 100-402. In addition, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on September 16 and September 18. The reason for Hispanic Heritage Month is to recognize the contributions of minority populations in America towards the end of the Initial Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s.

According to latino.si.edu/ "during Hispanic Heritage Month, many cities will host concerts, parades, runs, festivals, art exhibits, and more in celebration." Some very popular Latin celebrations here in America are Cinco de Mayo and the Day of the Dead (Dia de los Muertos). According to nbclosangeles.com "The first American Cinco de Mayo celebrations date back to the 1860s, when Mexicans living in California commemorated the victory over France in Puebla."



However, you can also celebrate these traditions by watching awards, hosting concerts, or having festivals! Their traditional food plays an important role in the Hispanic Heritage Month since Mexican and almost all Caribbean food tends

to have more spice to their food and most Americans tend to add cheese on most of their traditional plates. The exotic dishes and exclusivity of Latin food spices brings people's attention and enforces Hispanic culture.

Jacqueline Savorgnan lived in Latin America for 18 years (South America). Some of the ways she honors her culture throughout her life is by identifying & recognizing important famous people (music, acting, politics). She encouraged her students to participate in projects, such as randomly selecting Hispanic artists/actors during Hispanic Heritage Month. However one of best memories from her childhood is

when her mother would play and sing Enrique Iglesias. Her knowledge of South American dishes Arepas, empanadas de chile, arroz con frijol negro and much more. She also likes to incorporate Hispanic and African students, to recognize what Latinos have offered to the United States like how the African descendants have mixed with the Latin race and the




Afro-Latin race has been created. However, Baseball has mainly played a major role in the United States because of the fact that its

had an amazing summer because it was a hot one. We're back again with your monthly weather report like usual and we have a two-for-one deal this month so without further ado, lets jump right back into it.

Before we dive into the next month's weather, how about an overview of what August was like. In August, the temperature reached up to as high as

101°F and bottomed out at around 72°F, this means that the average temperature for August was 89°F on the high end and 78°F on the low end. As for rain, we got a decent amount with around 8.82 inches of rain. August was pretty boring in terms of storms, the most we got was a rain storm and a power outage for some which only lasted a few hours.

Now let's talk about what we can expect in September. September is a hot and rainy month. Because of this, you may feel hotter than it actually is. The highest temperature is around 89 degrees and the lowest temperature is around 77 degrees. This means that the average temperature for September is around 83 degrees. Mrs. Williams comes from a generation of highly educated teachers, and she was lucky enough to

University and UNO, and while there Mrs. Williams earned 2 degrees, which were a Bachelor's in History and also a Master's Degree. These were the first steps of her goals to be the type of teacher she is today. Mrs. Williams also attended and graduated from Salmen High. Speaking of high school, she has also been happily married to her high school sweetheart for 13 years now. They are a power couple, one might say. Mrs. Williams now has a 13 year old daughter and an 11-year-old son, and part of the reason she is a great teacher is because she has kids herself.
