



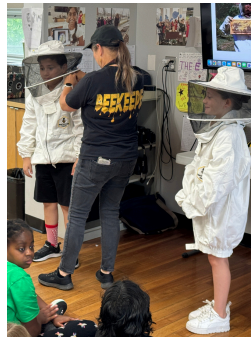

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# Forward Together

The New Albany-Plain Local Schools (NAPLS) are ever grateful for a community that believes, embraces, and supports the core purpose of our schools - "To create a culture of accountability that achieves the best academic and developmental outcomes for each student." This focused purpose enables everyone in our school district to put students first and implement measurable outcomes for continuous improvement that enhance student achievement, student growth, and student well-being as our community expects.

The New Albany-Plain Local School District (NAPLS) is located 10 miles northeast of downtown Columbus, in the beautiful City of New Albany. The school district serves over 5,100 students, preschool through twelfth grade, and the district is 23 square miles, including the City of New Albany, Plain Township, and neighborhoods within small portions of other central Ohio communities. NAPLS features a unique learning environment for its students, with all of its schools and support facilities located on a 120-acre college-style campus. Our schools are designed in a Georgian architectural style, connected by tree-lined walkways and surrounded by an 80-acre nature preserve.

The learning campus is built on donated land geographically in the center of our community. Other campus features include the Easton E3 (Energy, Engineering and the Environment Lab) and a performing arts hall, The Jeanne B. McCoy Center, featuring a professional theater with seating for 750 as well as a Black Box Theater. The learning environment is as unique as it is functional, creating outstanding educational opportunities for our students.





# A Year in Review

Successful communities support student achievement in a number of ways and New Albany is no exception. More than 5,100 students in grades PK-12 in our care are championed by nearly 700 teachers, administrators and staff, in addition to their parents/guardians. Additionally, we value our partnerships with The City of New Albany, Plain Township, the New Albany Company, the New Albany Community Foundation, our civic leaders, the Chamber and its business partners, resident taxpayers, and many others for their support.

This support is evident in our collective achievements. New Albany - Plain Local Schools continued to experience a level of achievement high in 2023-24.

As we look ahead, the New Albany - Plain Local Board of Education has been collaborating with me and our Treasurer/CFO Rebecca Jenkins, alongside Schorr Architects Inc., Community Design Alliance, and Harrison Planning Group, since their selection in March 2024 to reimagine our campus. Similar to the Campus Master Plan completed in 2010, which shaped our current campus, the 2024 Campus Master Plan offers a vision and direction for current and future needs of our school district.

Our Culture of Accountability has been built on the foundation that we are each responsible for our behavior, that we “own” our responses to challenges and circumstances, that we are stronger when we work together, and that we will strive to be better every day. Go Eagles!

# Continuous Improvement Plan

The New Albany-Plain Local School District is committed to creating a culture of accountability that achieves the best academic and developmental outcomes for each student. The District aspires to become and remain the best rated public school district in the State of Ohio.

All employees will be accountable for implementing research-based practices including a rigorous and aligned curriculum, common assessments, focused instruction and data-driven decisions to achieve the best academic and developmental outcomes for every student within a fiscally sustainable budget.

## Benchmark 1: Increase achievement

- Earn a District Performance Index Percentage result of 95% or greater on the Local Report Card. ✓

## Benchmark 2: Facilitate a year or more of growth for every year of instruction

- Earn a Progress Component Rating of Four Stars or greater on the Local Report Card. ✓

# Arts, Athletics & Extracurriculars

In 2023-24, we commemorated remarkable accomplishments in academics, fine arts, performing arts, and athletics as our talented students thrived in various areas:

- Our students excelled in band, choir, orchestra, theatre, visual arts, and twenty-nine interscholastic and club athletic teams.
- Middle and high school theater students were showcased in *Oliver Jr.*, *Seussical the Musical Jr.* (middle school), *Puffs*, *Mean Girls*, and *All Shook Up* (summer).
- Beyond academics, student engagement in extracurricular activities enriched lives, fostered school culture, built community, and improved academic performance.
- The Robotics and Rocketry Clubs achieved national recognition at competitions with grant support from Meta.
- HS Field Hockey State Runners Up, HS Girls Golf State Runners Up.

Additionally, student artists received top honors in the Scholastics and Governor's Youth Arts Exhibition at both the high school and middle school level. As well as being recognized by Nationwide Children's Hospital by being featured in the Growing Gallery.





# Access & Opportunity

NAPLS Students have access to a wide variety of events and opportunities throughout the school year. The New Albany Lecture Series featuring national and international figures in politics, world affairs, media and more is made possible by The New Albany Community Foundation. In 2023-2024 our students had the opportunity to hear from actress Laura Linney with a focus on arts and advocacy; Misty Copeland Principal Dancer with American Ballet Theater; New York Times Bestselling Author with a focus on diversity and the arts; and Ezra Klein, New York Times Columnist; “Ezra Klein Show” Podcast Host; Bestselling Author and Jonah Goldberg, Syndicated Political Columnist; Co-founder and Editor-in-Chief of The Dispatch; Former National Review Senior Editor; Author with a focus on Civil Discourse.

Jeanne B. McCoy Center for the Arts grants provide opportunities to enhance exposure to the arts for students. Grants in the past have included working with classical crossover string trio Simply Three, African Drummer in Residence, Sogbety Diamonde, Carnival of the Animals (grade 1), The Journey of Orpheus and Eurydice (grade 2), Guest Composer/Conductor for MS and HS Choir Nate Terry, support and production of the annual Black History Month celebration, and more.

Once again the District hosted the Author-in-Residence series for students in the 2023-24 school year. The New Albany Community Foundation through the Roberto Family, New Albany Women’s Network and our Parent Teacher Organizations funded this program through generous donations of over \$20,000. Featured authors visiting in 2023-24 included Steve Sheinkin at New Albany Middle School. The Middle School also awarded \$1000 to one student selected as the winner of the Author Scholarship Contest. Additional featured authors included Chris Grabenstein at New Albany Intermediate School and Josh Funk at New Albany Primary School.





# Access & Opportunity, Cont.

NAPLS students have the opportunity to participate in Global Learning. We partner with Education First (EF) to offer New Albany students the opportunity to follow their passions and learn in locations around the globe. In 2024 teacher-led student trips included: Iceland: Glaciers & Geysers (Grades 4-5); Italy & Germany (Grades 6-11); Greece (Grades 6-11); Dominican Republic - Service Learning (Grades 6-11) and Berlin - Global Leadership Summit (Grades 7-11).

Our student population continues to evolve as the district now has 30 languages spoken within our learning community with students proudly representing 25 countries of origin. The district continues to host an English Learners celebration night each year to create meaningful opportunities for students and families to learn from each other as they celebrate and share their cultural traditions, foods, language, dance and music.

New Albany High School is committed to service with a 25 hour service learning requirement for students for graduation. Our students serve the community in a variety of ways including the New Albany Food Pantry, Healthy New Albany, the New Albany Chamber of Commerce, New Albany Parks and Recreation, New Albany Special Olympics and more.

New Albany High School and Middle School students participate in a number of athletic opportunities and clubs at each school. Students participated in 29 athletic teams and 52 clubs and activities at New Albany High School. Students participated in 17 middle school sports and eight clubs and activities at New Albany Middle School. In the Class of 2024, 31 students signed to take their education and game to the next level by committing to play collegiate athletics.





# Community Partners

The successes that have been realized by New Albany - Plain Local Schools are a result of the unique partnership that has been formed between the school district and the entire learning community. This partnership has yielded benefits for not only today's students, but for generations to come. Many of our community partners help to provide funding for student groups and organizations, scholarships, competition opportunities for groups and teacher grants.

## Campus Culture & Student Belonging

We continued to implement The R-Factor for students and families to build upon our culture by instilling common language and behavior expectations necessary to promote student achievement, student growth and student well-being. We challenged students to understand the power of their “R” (Response) when navigating “E’s” (Events) to create desired “O’s” (Outcomes). Our efforts to infuse E+R=O into our continued daily school culture and lives continues in 2023-24. The six disciplines are: Press Pause, Get Your Mind Right, Step Up, Adjust & Adapt, Make a Difference and Build Skill.





# Building an Inclusive Campus Culture

NAPLS is focused and committed to Building an Inclusive Campus Culture (BICC). This work involves staff and students, building administrators as well as building facilitators. The district strives to develop a culture of belonging that builds trusting relationships with all students and their families. The BICC work encourages and supports cultural awareness, knowledge, and skills creating opportunities for connectedness that lead to inspirational learning experiences. The focus of these experiences is to motivate all students and staff to achieve their best academic and developmental outcomes.



Other student well-being supports and programs for students include Sources of Strength (SOS) both at the middle and high school, our school counselors and mental health specialists, prevention clinicians and programming through the Well-Being Initiative including the ROX “Ruling Our Experiences” program, Operation Street Smart and Drug and Alcohol Prevention Awareness.



# Focus on Finance & the Future

The District's latest Five-Year Forecast projects financial stability, a positive ending cash balance through the fiscal year ending 2028. Increased State funding, federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds along with fiscally responsible spending decisions allowed the District to not only maintain excellent academic programming but add additional services to address pandemic learning loss and increased mental health needs.

Like most suburban schools who are heavily reliant on local tax dollars, revenue flattens while expenditures continue to grow thus drawing down the unreserved cash balance. District administrators work diligently to consider each expenditure to maintain fiscal responsibility while positively impacting student academic and developmental outcomes.

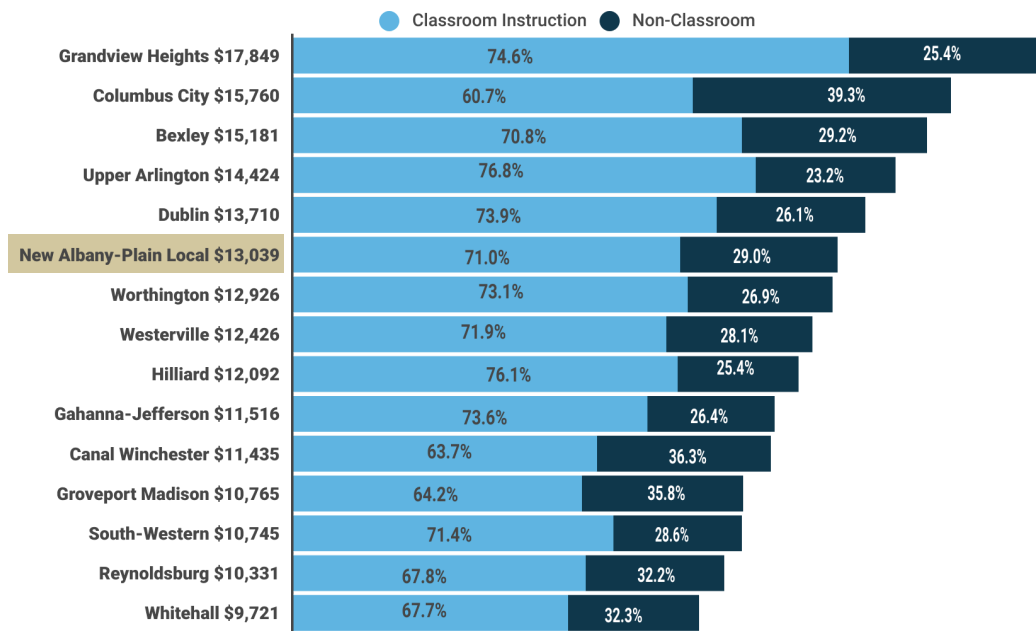

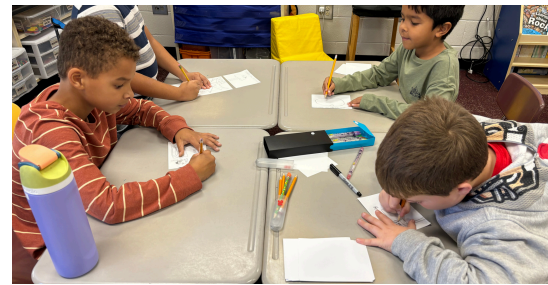
