## Dr. House's Classroom Highlight

"If you multiply by a fraction, will your original amount get greater or lesser? How is that different from when you multiply by a whole number?" These are questions you might see from your 5th grader, but did you know that this lesson actually started way back in Kindergarten? Before students can understand how mathematical operations impact the relative size of a quantity, they must develop a sense (a number sense) of what quantities are greater or lesser, and to what relative degree. As an adult, we might take for granted that 40 and 50 are relatively close together whereas 4,000 and 5,000 are further apart. But that sense had to be learned and developed over time. Fortunately for our students at Episcopal, our teachers are well-versed in strategies for building number sense at every level. Here, you see Kindergarten teacher, Ms. Beaudoin (aka Ms. Beau!) starting that process as she has students jump between standing on the SAME color as their partner and a DIFFERENT color from their partner. Simple (and fun!) as this may seem, this lesson is carefully crafted to help students learn to process 2 or more pieces of information simultaneously, assess equal or non equal values/characteristics, and flexibly change from one set of characteristics to another.
